




Greensboro Project Space Annual Report 2020-2021



Mission:

Created by the School of Art at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 2016, Greensboro Project Space (GPS) is an off-campus contemporary art center in Downtown Greensboro that acts as a bridge between students and faculty in the School of Art and the Greensboro community. Roughly half of our programs are by School of Art students and faculty, and half are split between a diverse range of communities and artists both off-campus and on-campus.

2020-2021 Overview:

During 2020-2021, Greensboro Project Space created and or hosted a total of 55 exhibitions, performances, lectures, workshops, and community events that reached approx. 2,809 people. 52.3% of the activities were by School of Art students and faculty, and 47.7% were for School of Art students and faculty including programs by other departments, schools, colleges, and offices at UNCG, local artists, local communities, and local organizations. 69.2% of the programs were UNCG affiliated, 29.2% were by the Greensboro community, and 1.6% were collaborations between UNCG and the Greensboro community. These programs included 11 artistic disciplines and were made possible through one paid part-time Director, one graduate assistant, and eleven credited interns.

New Location:

In May 2020, Greensboro Project Space moved from 219 W. Lewis St. to its new location at 111 E. February One Place located at the corner of S. Elm St. and E. February One Pl. The new location is 2,000 square feet separated into four galleries. Our old location at 219 W. Lewis St. was also 2,000 square feet but was separated into only two galleries.



Each year around half of the programs at Greensboro Project Space (GPS) are by students and faculty in the School of Art. The other half are split between local artists, community members, organizations, non-School of Art departments, and colleges, schools, and offices at UNCG.


While GPS was created to connect UNCG School of Art students to communities off-campus, there were many communities on-campus to which students didn't regularly have access. Because of this, there has been a large emphasis on inviting other departments, colleges, schools, and offices at UNCG to use GPS as a public and creative platform. Through this, GPS acts as a space for School of Art students to interact with people, communities, and ideas outside of their physical and conceptual surroundings resulting in an increased amount of interdisciplinarity and collaboration within their experiences at UNCG.

In essence, this initiative creates opportunities and space for School of Art students to build larger creative communities outside of their own department and for them to grow their artistic practice by engaging with interdisciplinary concepts and principles, which are integral to being a successful and fulfilled artist.

This endeavor validates the ideas that the arts are, and can be, a thread that connects our institution and that an off-campus art center can be a place to share with the outside world the creativity that is inherent in all our pursuits.











Metrics 2020-2021: UNCG Affiliated Programs vs. Non-UNCG Affiliated Programs




School of Art Programs vs. Non-School of Art Programs




2020-2021: Off-Campus vs. On-Campus Communities




2020-2021: Virtual, In-Person, or Hybrid Programs






Types of Disciplines










