


## Equipping pastors to abide in and feed their congregations from God's Word.

## A Tribute to Momo H Senah



Although we do not grieve without hope, it is still with heavy hearts that we report the home going of Momo H. Senah, Liberia's country facilitator since the Romans Project was first introduced to the African continent. Please lift up prayer those left behind, that the God of comfort would be especially near to them. He was survived by his wife Victoria, and his 6 children (Papay, Emmanuel, Al-

fred, George, Favor—his only daughter—and Bishop, the youngest boy).

In his biography *Any Old Bush Will Do*, John Corey recounts meeting Momo and his passion for the Word:

"The Evangelical Churches Union of Liberia selected a Gbandi pastor named Momo to work with me in getting their leaders involved with the Romans Project. He is the pastor of International church in Monrovia. Momo faithfully ministered among his people through the war and he saw the need to help other leaders get established in the Word. We became close very quickly, kindred hearts in the Lord." (Morud 215)

Over these past 14 years, Momo promoted Romans Project in many counties and raised several other Liberians to do the work of multiplication (which is recruiting other pastors to do the RP challenge in the counties where they live). He himself remained active in RP work up until his recent home going.

Here is an excerpt of the RP report he penned just this past December: "The Romans Project is an ongoing project that has brought changes in the lives and

ministries of all the Pastors, teachers of the Word, and teaching elders. Many of them testify that this project has brought significant changes in the way they preach and teach God's word. What brings joy to my heart is that many are from other denominations far from evangelical doctrines. They are saying this project is helping them to minister correctly and to take a different look at ministry."

He ended his report with a call to prayer, that the work would continue to flourish as his countrymen study God's word.
