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Suburban Mom Pens Children's Book Series and Establishes Foundation as Tribute to Her Late Son

Second Book in Ben's Adventures Children's Book Series publishes this summer, Book Donation to Easterseals

Ben's Adventures: Circus Day is in the works and new children's author Elizabeth Gerlach could not be more excited. The book series is a tribute to her young triplet son Benjamin who passed away in May 2016 at Ann & Robert H Lurie Children's Hospital in Chicago. The book concept centers on Ben who has special needs but simply shows he's a little boy first – with friends, an imagination and a joy for life. The first Ben's Adventures picture book released at Book Expo in NYC in May 2018 and now the second book in the series will release this coming summer.

Gerlach wants the primary message in the book to be that kids are still kids, despite medical or physical differences. She says, "it's important for ALL kids to see themselves in books. They should be in the story also." Gerlach hopes to show disability in children's literature and begin to normalize a visible difference such as a wheelchair.

Gerlach also hopes the book will introduce the concept of special needs to young kids and begin to make it a more familiar and less scary concept. "My goal was to show the character in a wheelchair – kids like Ben may see him and be able to relate," Gerlach says. "But the message can also benefit typical families who may not have much experience with special needs in their daily life."

Ben's Adventures: Circus Day will be available for pre-order beginning May 2nd at Kickstarter.com. Gerlach is aiming to raise funds through Kickstarter to help with printing and production of the new book. The Ben's Adventures books are available on Amazon as well as at www.Bens-Adventures.com. And for every 10 books pre-ordered, Gerlach will donate a signed book to EasterSeals Dupage & Fox Valley to be shared with their young clients.

Gerlach has a history with Easterseals and she wanted to find a way to give back and promote their mission. Her son Benjamin received services there for two years. Easterseals DuPage & Fox Valley serves more than 1,000 children each week. They believe in their abilities, help

them achieve their goals and celebrate their progress every step of the way. With leading experts across specialties and diagnoses, Easterseals is where families find clear answers and

a community of support, so their children can realize their full potential.

Gerlach and her husband previously established the Ben Smiles Memorial Foundation, a local fund dedicated to purchasing switch-adapted toys, switches and other devices for kids with special needs. Gerlach says many items are not covered by insurance but kids with motor disability cannot easily access typical toys. These adapted toys enable them to play by the

press of a switch.

"My son Benjamin had cerebral palsy and significant difficulty playing independently. He had several adapted toys and communication tools that gave him a sense of independence. I hope

we can spread Ben's smile through our gifts and impact kids and their families," Gerlach says.

Gerlach's son Benjamin died at just three years old after a long battle with respiratory illness – she believes this was the life they were meant to lead and this was meant to be their story. Her goal is to simply bring smiles to families' faces and spread the joy to others that Benjamin

brought to their lives.

Ben Smiles Memorial Foundation was established by Rob and Elizabeth Gerlach after their three-yearold son Benjamin passed away in May 2016 after a long battle with various respiratory illnesses. Ben was a happy, smart little boy who had severe physical limitations. He was diagnosed with quadriplegia cerebral palsy and epilepsy, was nonverbal and required a feeding tube. Despite his challenges, he smiled every single day.

Ben's Toy Closet is a program where children with different abilities can receive toys, switches or other devices that would give them some independence and make it easier to play and learn. Kids of all ages and abilities need access to their environment. They learn, grow and develop through play, but unfortunately not all children have the typical motor movement (ability to grasp and free movement of arms/legs) that allows them to easily access standard toys and their environment. Special equipment, adapted toys and other tools are out there but they can be expensive, hard to find, and many times, are not covered by insurance or come with large copays.

The Gerlach's mission is to gift as many toys and other important devices as possible to special kids and their families.
