Last summer, Age-Friendly Oxford was awarded a generous grant from the Oxford Community Foundation to produce one year of monthly issues of the O-Town News. That grant ends next month and the June issue of O-Town News will be our last issue.

The O-Town News team has been honored to serve the Oxford area and we are thrilled that the **Oxford Free Press** is starting up this summer to keep the greater Oxford area connected and will be available in both print and digital format. ShareFest is a nonprofit corporation dedicated to the collection and redistribution of items donated by Miami University students and the Oxford community at the end of the academic year. This local collaboration between the City of Oxford, Miami University, local volunteers and area social service agencies aims to redirect tons of materials from the landfill.

ShareFest will take place May 16 - 21 in the Chestnut Fields parking lot.






Older Americans Month

Oxford Aquatic Center Opening Day


