I. Introduction:

- A. On that first Christmas, the little Baby in that manger was the beginning of the greatest move of God in the history of the world. Literally, God Himself—the second person of the Trinity—was a newborn all swaddled up inside a ragged bunch cloths. Crying, fussing, coughing, there He lay, the Savior of the world. Truly, what an inconceivable way for God to make an entrance into the world. Jesus, who always had been for eternity, had now been incarnated. He was now born a human being just like everyone else who has ever lived. This is a real shocker of a development in redemptive history.
- B. As incredible as this all was—as incredible as what had just been birthed—there was a real person who had to birth it. There was a young woman who was chosen by God to carry this Christ to term—and then raise Him—because she had been found fit to do so. So, tonight, we're going to explore a few lessons that we learn from Mary's obedience to God, which resulted in the most significant development in all of redemptive history.
- **C.** First, just for fun, think of all the stories we're going to hear in the next age. Perhaps Moses will talk about the parting of the Red Sea. Then, maybe Elijah will speak of resurrection miracles. Perhaps someone else in the corner will say something about how their prayers led to Saul of Tarsus' conversion. Then walks in Mary who says, "Well, friends, I gave birth to God!" She may not say it so tongue-in-cheek like I'm imagining, but I'm sure we'll have moments like these in the unending day—in the resurrection.

II. Prophetic promise.

Luke 1:26-37 | ²⁶ Now in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, ²⁷ to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ And having come in, the angel said to her, "Rejoice, highly favored one, the Lord is with you; blessed are you among women!" ²⁹ But when she saw him, she was troubled at his saying, and considered what manner of greeting this was. ³⁰ Then the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹ And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bring forth a Son, and shall call His name Jesus. ³² He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David. ³³ And He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end." ³⁴ Then Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I do not know a man?" ³⁵ And the angel answered and said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God. ³⁶ Now indeed, Elizabeth your relative has also conceived a son in her old age; and this is now the sixth month for her who was called barren. ³⁷ For with God nothing will be impossible."

A. Imagine this being your life assignment. Everyone wants a good prophecy, but few think of the responsibility of what the prophecy means. What a weighty responsibility Mary accepted. She was actually the one spoken of by Isaiah (Isaiah 7:14).

III. Personal plight.

- **A.** Think of the immense difficulties Mary endured in her obedience to God. Here are just a few examples:
 - In all likelihood, almost nobody really believed her. Except for a very small group of people (Joseph her husband; Zacharias and Elizabeth her relatives; Simeon who dedicated and prophesied over Jesus; etc.), the broader community she lived in would have viewed her as a crazy lady for talking about her miracle baby stories.
 - Her Baby was the cause of sudden, dramatic political pressure that led to a vast amount of children two and under being killed by the command of Herod (Matthew 2:16-18).
 - Her life was not normal by any means. Everybody says they want dreams, visions, angels, prophetic words, supernatural
 occurrences, etc., but not everybody thinks of how important obedience becomes when the will of God is so clearly revealed.
 - The Son she raised was crucified, though He truly was (and is) the prophesied Messiah of Israel.

IV. Powerful perspective.

Luke 1:38 | Then Mary said, "Behold the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her.

A. Despite the highly unusual nature of Mary's life assignment, she chose to serve the purposes of God for her with enthusiasm. In doing so, she serves as an example to all who are called to serve God, especially those who a called to serve God in unique ways. Her attitude from the very beginning was to say yes to God.

V. Concluding application.

A. Let's look briefly at Luke 11:27-28. Let's be like Mary who simply heard and obeyed. Therein lies the blessing of God!
