NORTHSHORE CONCERT BAND MALLORY THOMPSON ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Immerse yourself in the captivating symphonic journey of Northshore Concert
Band's 2023/24 Season — an exploration of transformation and transfiguration in music.
Revel in a rich tapestry of wind band masterpieces, be enchanted by dazzling works from living composers, and find solace in contemplative pieces that resonate with people from all walks of life.



The excitement begins with **Treats & Tricks**, a mesmerizing survey of Halloween's magic and mystique, featuring pillars of the wind band repertoire, alluring melodies from the silver screen, and selections from Gustav Holst's *The Planets*. Join us in February as we celebrate our 20th annual **Lifetime of Music** concert with compositions that have transformed over time into fascinating music for winds, including Paul Hindemith's *Symphonic Metamorphosis on Themes of Carl Maria von Weber*. Witness the brilliance of middle school musicians as they join us on stage for our annual side-by-side performance, showcasing music by Omar Thomas and Kevin Day.

Renowned saxophonist Taimur Sullivan joins us in April for a performance of William Bolcom's Concerto for Soprano Saxophone and Band on **Making Waves**, alongside exciting and thought-provoking works including Jay Kennedy's *Catapult*, two disparate settings of "Shenandoah," and Frank Ticheli's big band-inspired *Blue Shades*. Our season ends on a high note with **Life Cycles**, delving into pieces influenced by one's passage through life with music by David Biedenbender, Jennifer Jolley, and Leonard Bernstein.

Our 2023/24 Season features a remarkable number of inaugural performances by the Band. In total, fifteen works will receive their Northshore Concert Band premiere this season, including Joe Hisaishi's *Howl's Moving Castle* (2004/2010), Florence Price's *Adoration* (1951/2022), Carter Pann's *Hold This Boy and Listen* (2008), and James Beckel's Symphony for Band (2008).

TREATS & TRICKS

Our season begins with **Treats & Tricks**, an enchanting exploration of magic, mystique, and transfiguration through music. Johann Sebastian Bach's ominous Toccata and Fugue in D Minor opens the program, the winds masquerading as a grandiose pipe organ through virtuosic passages and bone-rattling chords. Enigmatic works from the cinema offer brief respite, including *Howl's Moving Castle* — a spellbinding suite from Joe Hisaishi's score for Miyazaki's anime film of the same title — and *Music for a Darkened Theater* — a medley of tunes by Danny Elfman with snippets from *Edward Scissorhands*, *The Nightmare Before Christmas*, and *Beetlejuice*. Indulge in audience favorites throughout, from selections from *The Planets* to Richard Strauss' *Allerseelen* and *Barnum and Bailey's Favorite* two ways!

A LIFETIME OF MUSIC

FEBRUARY 18, 2024 | 3:00 P.M. PICK-STAIGER CONCERT HALL

Centuries of music are transformed into works for winds in **A Lifetime of Music**, beginning with Cindy McTee's dynamic and whirling Notezart. Hidden inside are diverse musical styles: 12-tone passages are interwoven with guartal and guintal harmonies, quasi-Renaissance courtly dances, and even a nod to Mozart's Eine Kleine Nachtmusik. The resplendent tones of the organ are emulated in Florence Price's lush and romantic *Adoration*, a serene, introspective masterpiece written during the twilight of the composer's life. Paul Hindemith's magnificent tour de force, Symphonic Metamorphosis on Themes of Carl Maria von Weber, concludes the first half of the program with its thunderous March, the culmination of four movements that collectively showcase the vitality and virtuosity of the wind ensemble. Exceptional middle school musicians from the Chicagoland area join us on the second half of the program for our 20th annual Lifetime of Music event featuring a new work by Omar Thomas, Frank Ticheli's meditative Earth Song, and Kevin Day's energy packed Rocketship!




MAKING WAVES FEATURING SAXOPHONIST TAIMUR SULLIVAN

APRIL 14, 2024 | 3:00 P.M. | PICK-STAIGER CONCERT HALL

Catapult, Jay Kennedy's exuberant theme and variations in reverse based on Haydn's St. Anthony Chorale, launches us into an afternoon of dazzling music for winds. In stark contrast lies Carter Pann's graceful and gestural *Hold This Boy and Listen*, emblematic of the composer's distinct harmonic language. Lauded for his "supreme virtuosity" (The New York Times) and "superhuman ability" (American Record Guide), acclaimed saxophonist Taimur Sullivan makes his NCB debut in William Bolcom's quirky Concerto for Soprano Saxophone and Band. Amanda Aldridge's spirited quick-step march, On Parade, sets a lively tone for the second half, followed by captivating interpretations of the beloved American folk song "Shenandoah" by Frank Ticheli and Omar Thomas. **Making Waves** culminates in a splashy finish withw Ticheli's *Blue Shades*, playfully mimicking the sounds of a big band with its jazzy episodes, blues harmonies and idioms, and a wailing, Benny Goodman-inspired clarinet solo.





LIFE CYCLES

Our season concludes with **Life Cycles**, a revitalizing journey through timeless works and an examination of the cyclicality inherent in human life. The program features David Biendenbender's *Luminescence*, a scintillating transformation of *Break Forth O Beauteous Heavenly Light*, where fragments of the source material emerge amidst vibrant woodwind flourishes and metallic percussion sounds. Jennifer Jolley's *Ash* muses on her upbringing in Southern California, a place lacking snow but often blanketed in falling ash from nearby wildfires, contemplating the beauty arising from these powerful and destructive fires through obfuscated melodies and delicate chamber moments. The second half highlights John Philip Sousa's enduring march, *The Thunderer*, followed by Ira Hearshen's reimagining of its trio theme, *After "The Thunderer"*. We wrap up with selections from Leonard Bernstein's *On the Town*, the swinging three-movement suite capturing moments from the hit musical, including Gabey's naive dreams of love, his struggles finding love in the big city, and the sailors congregating in Times Square for a night on the town.


