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
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CONFERENCE HOTEL LAYOUT





A Deep Dive into Multi-Modal Transportation Options

Review Committee Comments:

Connecting St. Louis

Project Description:

A vision to create safe and connected corridors in the City of St. Louis through the improvement of pedestrian and cycling infrastructure on the city's streets. The project actively engaged a wide range of stakeholders and residents to develop the framework plan.

Review Committee Comments:

Outstanding Implementation

The District, Phase 1 - Light Hubs

Project Description:

Utilizing a master plan for identity and placemaking in The District, Light Hubs that were designed and fabricated to provide a sense of place and enhance the unique characteristics of each downtown area.

Review Committee Comments:

"The District Light Hubs entry scored the highest because of its creative placemaking designs that celebrated both the academic and community aspects of Columbia, and because of the photos that were submitted showing the implementation of the Light Hubs in their actual settings. City of Billings Visioning Plan

Project Description:

The Practicum class at Missouri State University partnered with the City of Billings, Missouri to complete a Visioning Plan for the community.

Review Committee Comments:

"The Billings Visioning Plan was an outstanding student project that applied planning theory to practice. The students learn that a grassroots approach can provide more insight when combined with citizen input, numbers, algorithms, and data. The students learned that gathering public input has to be customized to the location and population and be flexible on approach. The Billings Visioning Plan is an example of practical planning that can be achieved through basic policy and community collaboration."

New Horizon (Group)


University of Kansas UBPL 710: Intorduction to Housing Policy Students

Honors a group of students who have done work illustrating excellence in planning with attention to comprehensive planning principles and the planning process. The 2018 New Horizon (Group) award goes to the students in UBPL 710: Introduction to Housing Policy, Fall Semester 2017 at the University of Kansas for their work on Lee's Summit Affordable Housing Needs Assessment.

The study for Lee's Summit makes use of time series data from the American Community Survey to identify the mismatches between the demand for and the supply of rental and owner-occupied housing. To analyze the matchup between supply and demand, the report uses market segmentation theory which allows separate analysis of the many individual submarkets serving different income groups.

The project advances the field of planning by preparing students to use cutting edge theory and methods of analysis to address real world problems that confront planners. Executive Director of the Lee's Summit Housing Authority Darrin Taylor stated, "Our community leaders have found the information relevant and it has been helpful to guide our decisions." The City Manager of Lee's Summit Steve Arbo stated, "The report is equivalent in quality to professionally-commissioned reports."

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
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
