

BPRA Annual General Membership Meeting, Thursday, November 21st, 7:30 pm, via Zoom

The main order of business during the annual meeting will be the election of three BPRA Board Trustees. We will also present the BPRA Annual Report and the 2025 Budget and have time for questions. The SBPCA Annual Meeting will be held right before the BPRA annual meeting starting at 7pm.

Annual Strathmore Bel Pre Town Hall Meeting, Thursday, December 5th, at 8 pm, via Zoom

The Town Hall meeting is an opportunity to (virtually) get together with your neighbors to share knowledge, learn more about our community and ask questions in an informal setting.

BPRA Annual Elections

The BPRA Board of Trustees is a 9-member body elected at the Annual General Membership Meeting. Each member is elected to a 3-year term. The terms are staggered, so that three members are elected every year. At the time of publication, we have three candidates running for those three seats: TED BECHTOL, JENNIFER DURAN, and PATRICK TAYLOR. Thank you all for volunteering. Profiles for each candidate are available starting on Page 22.

If any additional candidates step forward by the October 7 deadline to notify the BPRA Secretary that they are running for a seat on the board, those profiles will be posted on the StrathmoreBelPre.org Annual Meeting page,

The 2024 BPRA Board of Trustee Elections will be held via mail-in or drop off ballot. Ballots and proxy envelopes will be mailed to each member household with the Annual Meeting Notice in October. Election instructions and additional information can be found on the reverse side of the ballot and at StrathmoreBelPre.org.

Election results will not be available at the Annual Meeting but will be posted on StrathmoreBelPre.org and at the pool within approximately one week of the completion of the election.

Thank you to outgoing Board Member Rod Oo. Rod just completed a three-year term and was instrumental in coordinating snack bar facility maintenance for the past several years. Thank you for your contributions to the community.

My current term is also ending this November. I have been on the Board since February 2018 and have served as President for the last five years. I will continue in my role as eSoft Planner coordinator until a replacement can be found and will continue working with the Long-Term Planning Committee for the foreseeable future. I'd like to extend a big thank you to the BPRA Board, committee chairs and volunteers and to the SBPCA and Village Boards and volunteers. I enjoyed working with you and appreciate everything you do for the community.

The Board elects its officers each year for a one-year term. The BPRA Board will elect new officers at its December 3, 2025 Board meeting.

Please consider volunteering for the community as a BPRA or SBPCA Board member, committee member or in some other capacity. Curious but not ready to take the plunge? 2024 Annual Meeting and Elections - what is the same, what has changed?

Meeting on Zoom (same procedure as 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023)

The SBPCA and BPRA Annual Meetings will again be held on Zoom this year.

Establishing quorum (same procedure as 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023)

For the BPRA to do business, such as elect BPRA Board Trustees and adopt a by-laws amendment, at the Annual Meeting, we must establish a quorum of at least 72 households (10% of member households.) Quorum can be established by proxy, so it is important that each member household complete and return the proxy envelope included in the Annual Meeting mailing before November 21. Completing and returning the proxy allows your household to be counted as "present" by proxy for purposes of establishing or maintaining quorum at the 2024 Annual Meeting and any continuances thereof. Members in attendance that do not return a proxy will also be considered present for establishing quorum. If we do not meet quorum requirements at the November 21 meeting, then the election and by-laws voting portion of the annual meeting will be recessed and will reconvene on Thursday, December 5, at 8:00 p.m., on Zoom, where in accordance with the procedures set out by (1) Maryland Homeowners Association Act § 11B-111(6) or by (2) BPRA By-Laws, Article VIII, § 5: the quorum at the BPRA reconvened/additional meeting on December 5 either will be: (1) those members who are present (in person or by proxy) or (2) 36 households. If we have a quorum on November 21, then our December 5 meeting will be just the Annual Town Hall Meeting.

Election of BPRA Board Trustees (change in procedure from 2023)

In 2023, only ballots submitted by members who attended the BPRA Annual Zoom meeting could be counted. See page 10 of the October 2023 *Bugle* for more information.

At the November 16, 2023, BPRA Annual Meeting, the membership voted to adopt a BPRA by-laws amendment. This amendment authorizes the BPRA Board of Trustees to hold electronic meetings and authorizes mail-in ballots for the BPRA elections and other BPRA business that requires a vote of the membership. The proposed amendment essentially codifies the procedures we used, under emergency authorization, in 2020, 2021, and 2022 for virtual/electronic meetings and mail-in/drop off ballots for BPRA elections. This means that all ballots submitted by members in good standing - provided they are properly completed and received by the submission deadline - can be counted whether or not a member attends a virtual Annual Meeting.

We encourage all members to attend the November 21 Annual Meeting on Zoom and we urge all households, whether they plan on attending the meeting or not, to complete and return the proxy envelope. Doing so helps us meet quorum requirements and shows your support for the Association to conduct business at the Annual Meeting.





Songster in the Garden by Cecily Nabors

What's the only American songbird with "song" in its very name? The Song Sparrow (*Melospiza melodia*). This is a widespread species, found in almost every state. While they do migrate, we in the Mid-Atlantic may see them all year round. Males and females dress alike in suits of reddish-brown and gray, with dark streaks on a pale shirt-front. The streaks seem to merge in a central spot, like a decorative tie tack.

The bird was a favorite with the American colonists, who named it for its musical repertoire. The song usually starts with three long notes, sort of a Now Hear This alert. What follows is a series of trills and short sharp notes of almost infinite variation, usually ending with a trill.





To demonstrate his territorial dominance, the male Song Sparrow proves that he knows many songs. It's not a set playlist—this avian DJ shuffles his songs. Males do most of the singing. Female Song Sparrows have been shown to be attracted to the best musician. Perhaps they think that if he can remember all those songs, he has an equally good memory for food sources and will be a good provider.

The birds frequent thickets, brushy areas, pond and stream edges, and gardens, and may even be seen in coastal marshes. They typically forage on the ground, staying close to cover. Their summer diet consists largely of insects, spiders, caterpillars, and ants, though seeds and fruit are also on the menu. In winter they eat mostly seeds, mainly those of grasses and weeds. One study found that over the course of a year, about half of their diet is weed

seeds—what an excellent garden clean-up crew!

Mates tend to be monogamous, though some males have been shown to have more than one mate. Nests are built in shrubs or brush piles and occasionally in low trees, or on the ground tucked under grassy clumps or bushes. Females are the nest-builders and do the incubation also.

Though Song Sparrows are abundant and a species of low concern, their numbers are decreasing. We can keep our gardens bird-friendly by not spraying pesticides and insecticides indiscriminately.

A water supply will bring many birds to the garden. Song Sparrows bathe frequently and are delighted to enjoy a splash in a birdbath, even in winter.

Lure Song Sparrows to your yard with fruited shrubs, brush piles, and other places of shelter. They will come to feeders, though they'll usually hop about underneath, looking for dropped seeds, and scurry into cover again. If a small streaky brown bird is foraging shyly in your yard, be sure to listen as well as look. It may be a Song Sparrow, our backyard improv artist.







2024 Summer Movies Recap

2024 marked our Civic Association's 12th year of summer movies at our pool.

Gravity Mountain Bike Park Opens in Wheaton Regional Park






