Motus Theater is seeking 5-8 transgender and non-binary leaders to develop powerful autobiographical monologues that share personal stories about their hopes, dreams, and experiences of negotiating oppression and liberation. Motus aims to reach local, regional, and national audiences with these stories.

Monologues are slowly developed in a Motus autobiographical monologue group workshop over a 17-20 week process. One does not need to be a 'writer' to participate. The only requirement is the desire to share the truth of your experience in order to uplift the humanity of transgender and non-binary people and support cultural and policy shifts. The project builds upon Motus Theater's specialty: developing artfully crafted autobiographical monologues with leaders on the frontlines of violence and oppression in the U.S., putting them center stage as the protagonists in the American drama.
