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Message from Directors

We are proud and pleased to share with you this report on Latin Stories Australia's work and achievements for the financial year 2019-20. This year the organisation focused on contributing to women's empowerment, sense of belonging, inclusion, and safety. We worked with the diverse Latin American Community in Victoria. It was also a year of expansion and growth as we travelled through this beautiful state to deliver sessions. We also welcomed to the Latin Stories Australia's family, for the first time, an amazing group of committed volunteers.

Since 2015, our organisation has collected over 200 migration stories from Latin American migrants living in Australia. These stories recount the main challenges faced by our community, including for example, the absence of family and social networks, feelings of isolation and lack of sense of belonging. We also identified that the lack of understanding of Australian values and culture could be a barrier to feel welcomed and supported by the Australian community.

In Victoria, only 24% of women of Latin American background have a full-time position and almost 50% are unemployed. This makes Latin American women more prone to isolation, lack of empowerment and lack of participation into the Australian social, economic and civil life. Research suggests these are barriers to safety as it may lead women to tolerate violence. With this in mind, we developed two evidence-based and innovative projects: "Interweaving/Entretejiendo" and "We are all equal". "Interweaving" was a series of nine free workshops for Latin American women delivered between July and October 2019 in nine different areas across Metropolitan Melbourne. These workshops were delivered in conjunction with our partners Casa Cultura and Momentum Psychology.

The "We Are All Equal" project was delivered in collaboration with EDVOS and Unpresentable Ego theatre. Five free workshops for Latin American women focused on learning about gender stereotypes, gender inequality and family violence. These workshops took place between September 2019 and March 2020 in five different areas across Victoria.

Innovation is key to Latin Stories Australia and this year has been no exception. Through this report you will be given insight into our innovative approaches. For this, and previous work, our efforts have been recognised. Thank you for believing in us and supporting this dream of advancing multiculturalism and social cohesion in Australia. We celebrate our achievements with you and look forward to delivering our next project "Nuestras Voces" during the next financial year. This project aims to increase participation of senior groups, and engage-

ment between different migrant generations; which will broaden the impact of our work.

About the project

In 2018, Latin Stories Australia received funding from the Department of Home Affairs Fostering Integration Grants program to develop and faciliate the "interweaving/entretejiendo" project.

The project consisted of a series of workshops aimed to increase social cohesion, empowerment, cultural diversity and sense of belonging among the Latin American women migrant community. The workshops were facilitated in nine different areas in Victoria between July and October 2019 (Brunswick, Footscray, Prahran, Melbourne city, St Albans, Springvale, Werribee, Collingwood and St Kilda).

For this project, we collaborated with Casa Cultura and Momentum Psychology, to co-facilitate the workshops and co-develop a toolkit which was shared with participants and added to our website.




"Everything change within me. Now I feel confident about myself and know that I can do things without fear"

About the wrap-up session

In March 2019, Latin Stories Australia developed and facilitated a reflection and learning session with several organisations with the aim to discuss the findings of the "interweaving" workshops and seek collaborations for future projects.

Due to the coronavirus situation, Latin Stories Australia had to be flexible and adjustable to the circumstances to deliver the proposed wrap-up session. We facilitated an online session in collaboration with Casa Cultura, and supported by AMES Australia. In total, 13 participants from nine organisations participated in this session.

About the workshops

In 2018, Latin Stories Australia received funding from the Victorian Government - Department of Premier and Cabinet to develop and faciliate the "We are all equal" project.

The "we are all equal" project was a series of workshops aimed to increse raise awareness within the Latin American women community on gender stereotypes, gender inequality and family violence and give the participants tools on how to engage in conversations and respond to it. The workshops were facilitated in five different areas in Victoria between September 2019 and March 2020 - including two regional areas (Footscray, Melbourne city, Frankston, Bendigo and Geelong).

For this project, we collaborated with EDVOS and Unpresentable Ego , to co-facilitate the workshops. Latin Stories Australia developed a toolkit which was shared with participants and added to our website.





About the project

In 2019 Latin Stories Australia received funding from the Victorian Government - Department of Premier and Cabinet to develop and faciliate the "Nuestras voces (our voices)" project.

The "Nuestras Voces" project consists of community activities to collect the life stories of the Spanish - speaking migrant communities from the 60s, 70s and 80s.



COVID-19 initiatives

Context

In March 2020, the Australian Government took strong measures to contain the spread of the COVID-19 pandemia. These measures included self-isolating when possible, only leaving your house to buy essential items. This brought several challenges to our Latin American communities; including for example, stress and anxiety due to the circumstances; those on temporary visas couldn't access any Government support; and isolation, in particular to those already vulnerable.



To respond to the needs of our community, we launched three initiatives:

Results

Food relief to Latin Americans with temporary visa holders who are struggling financially

\$1457 was collected this represented 150 free meals through La Tienda restaurante campaign

Through a collaboration with AMES Australia **30 food vouchers** were provided







15 resilience messages on 3 different social media platforms

Reached 8816 people (Facebook & LinkedIn)

729 people engaged (Facebook, Instagram & LinkedIn)

24 books were donated

Supporting the elderly: UNITED - 11 books

Supporting vulnerable women: Women's prison - 13 books





Community Engagement



A community picnic event was organised on a vineyard to encourage **social connection** in the community **between different countries of origin and ages**. In total, 26 adults and 12 children from 7 different countries attended the event.
