INSPECTED	O	S	N.I.	Comments
Grounds	x			The grounds are kept in good order with an onsite gardener. Each house has a small area by the front entrance. In some cases this area is planted and cared by the house residents. Due in part to the current drought situation the area in front of C House was bare. In addition to the community garden the grounds contain various areas for recreational activities e.g. volleyball, softball, and playground set.
Building Exterior		x		The exteriors of all houses were clean and the paint in good condition for the most part.
Living Room		x		The living/dining area in House C was well kept. Furniture appeared new or almost new. The dining room table was large enough to accommodate all residents, staff and perhaps some guests. There is a large flat screen TV in the living room.
Kitchen		x		Kitchen was clean and the conditions of the floors noted in previous reports had been remedied. There is ample plates, kitchen utensils and cups for all residents. Staff were preparing dinner. Sharps and spices are locked.

Bedrooms		x		As with all units at this facility this house has one large bedroom downstairs and four upstairs for a maximum capacity of six residents, however, currently there are only four children residence. Each child decorates his/her own room provided there are no inappropriate posters or other decorations. All bedrooms appeared to have adequate lighting. The lighting deficiencies noted in previous reports appear to have been corrected.
Bathrooms		x		Bathrooms were clean with no mold or soap scum build up. There were no missing tiles or cracked or broken fixtures.
Fire Safety --Extinguishers		x		There were two fire extinguishers in the house. One on the first floor and one on the second. Both fire extinguishers were fully charged and the inspection dates were current.
Fire Safety --Smoke Alarms		x		There were smoke alarms in each child's bedroom as well as the kitchen area. The stairwell had a hard wired emergency lighting fixture.
Fire Safety --Evacuation Plan		x		There were two copies of the evacuation plan posted in this house, one on the first floor and one on the second. In both instances the plans were posted at levels so as to be easily read by the residents and the evacuation route clearly marked in color. Policy requires two fire drills each month. As in all houses, the exit doors open inward which might result in difficulties in a panic evacuation.
Food		x		The refrigerator compartment was well stocked. The freezer compartment was empty, but the freezer in the garage was full to capacity, which included; meat, bread, burritos, etc. There were no outdated leftovers in the refrigerator. There was ample dry food stock in cabinets including cereal and rice. Refrigerator contained milk and vegetables. Fresh fruit is available on the counters.
Emergency Supplies		x		In addition to the food supplies kept in the individual houses and in the main building each house has a complete first aid kit for minor scrapes and bruises
Health Services		x		Each child is covered by Medi-cal and Denti-cal. While Medi-cal coverage is adequate dental coverage is extremely limited. Staff indicated that the facility has established relationships with mental health practitioners to provide needed counseling to some of the students at reduced costs. Dental visits are scheduled every six months. All mental health care is delivered off site per the Pre Inspection Report Form.
Medications		x		As in all housing units the medications are kept in a locked room, in a locked closet and in a locked cabinet. Each child's medical history, prescribed medications, future dental and medical appointments are kept on a computer file and in a binder maintained in the closet. In addition another copy of the binder is kept in a backpack by the closet in case of emergency evacuation. Daily issues regarding medication are written on a white board for all staff to see.

Recreation (on site)	x			There were number of bikes, skateboards, scooters and one pogo stick in the garage area along with protective headgear. Besides the library books, television and recorded material available there were a number of board games for the residents' use. Art classes are conducted on site in the recreation hall. This house as well the others had various musical instruments available for the resident's use. There were noticeably fewer books both downstairs and upstairs than in the other houses.
Outings (off site)		x		Children participate at various school functions as well as organized hikes at the nearby Taylor Regional park. This summer several children from the various houses attended Owl Camp, an outing held at Rancho Mark West and sponsored by the Land Paths Organization "In Our Own Back Yard (IOOBY). Residents state that they also enjoy going to the movies, swimming and just going to the mall.
Education & Classrooms		x		All residents attend classes at the public schools in the area. Transportation to and from school is provided by the facility in unmarked vans. In addition art and music classes are conducted on site.
Mail/Phone		x		One landline is available for the children's use while in the house. Cell phones provided when children are offsite on weekends or in evenings
Discipline		x		Rules of behavior are gone over at time child begins residency and are posted on bulletin board. House rules regarding conduct and dress code were posted on the downstairs bulletin board as well as information regarding the Juvenile Justice Commission.
Library		x		While apparently adequate for the wants/needs of this house's residents there were noticeably fewer books available at this house than in in some of the others.

Evaluation of Program		x		Programs seem to vary according to the needs of the individual children. In some cases the goal is the immediate unification of the family in other cases this is not so.

Program Understood		x		The children interviewed seemed to understand their particular situation. Whether they liked it was an entirely different matter. One child interviewed also had a sibling in the house.
Levels (Privileges)		x		All residents get an allowance. Good behavior is rewarded by additional offsite privileges such as shows, shopping etc. One child liked that the chores “changed all the time” so they wouldn’t get bored.
Grievances		x		Grievance procedures are prominently posted on the bulletin board, as is the Contact information for the Juvenile Justice Commission.
Discipline		x		The disciplinary process appeared to be understood by the residents interviewed. When asked what happens if you misbehave one stated that when that had happened to her she was just confined to her room for the evening that the event occurred. One child stated they could lose game time up to 2 days.
Staff Evaluation		x		Some staff are easier to talk with than others, but residents had not complaints about any individual staff members.
Health Services		x		The facility has made arrangements with “Smiles for Life” to obtain braces for a number of residents and those relatively few children who obtained braces in this way were quite thankful. Routine medical and dental check-ups are scheduled twice a year.
Counseling/Therapy				These services are provided by external resources on a referral basis. No on site services are provided per the Pre Inspection Report. Children interviewed felt they could talk to staff about things that bothered them.
Chores & Allowance				A list of chores is posted weekly. The amount of the allowance given each child is not dependent on the chores he or she handles.
Laundry				The laundry room was clean and appliances in good order. Each child brings his/her laundry to the laundry room but the detergent, which is kept in a locked room and is administered by the staff. No cleaning chemicals were in the laundry room. Older children take a more active part in the laundry process e.g. sorting, transferring to the dryer and folding the laundry when completed. In all cases however staff controls the laundry chemicals.
Clothes				There is a considerable amount of donated clothing of good quality available for the children. In addition many bring clothes from home

Food				The weekly meals menu is posted in the kitchen and appeared to provide for a well-balanced diet. One child interviewed that there was always plenty of food at meal time. One child stated they "liked the food" and that "staff can cook pretty good."
Snacks				A variety of fresh fruit is available in the kitchen and there are scheduled snack times in the mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Additional snacks are kept in the locked room to avoid over eating.
School				Students attend public school. Another child stated they were getting good grades and that staff helped them with homework.
Library				Each house contains a variety of books in the downstairs living room and in the upstairs hallway. The number and types of books varies from house to house.
Activities & Entertainment				The residents indicated a variety of activities and interests such as reading, watching TV, bike riding, hiking in the nearby park, board games etc.
Money				Each child receives a set allowance.
