HB2414	End of Diaper Tax and Diaper Stipend: An end to a tax on diapers and other essential items (such as period products) would be a benefit to all of our families in Hawaii. This would also allow for our families in need to get the most of their stipend if passed.
SB2395	Coercive Control: coercive control and litigation abuse by a parent of a child to the list of factors to be considered by the court in determining what constitutes the best interest of the child when awarding custody
SB3111	DHS Family Resource Centers : to establish a Family Resource Center pilot program and a FTE Family Resource Center Coordinator position as well as the appropriation of funds Update : \$300,000 appropriation

Establishes the Malama Ohana working group to seek, design, and recommend transformative changes to the State's child welfare system. Appropriates funds to increase the procurement of contracted services to provide additional support, resources, and monitoring of families receiving benefits from the State's adoption assistance and permanency assistance programs. Put in a clause that the money doesn't lapse. Stretch to FY28 Update: Appropriation of 8M
HB2233	TANF subsidy: Authorizes the Department of Human Services to provide additional rental housing assistance subsidies to landlords of up to \$500 per month to Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families (TAONF) program participants who are participating in the First-To-Work program. Update: Passed with appropriation
