Friends and Neighbors,

There is so much happening in the world as this new year begins, that it is amazing to me the United Methodist Church made headlines in January! But we did and there are a lot of misconceptions, assumptions, and questions floating around out there about a schism in the United Methodist denomination. I appreciate having this platform to try to ease some concerns and temper some emotional responses to a very tender topic which directly affects people whom we love deeply.

Let me begin by saying that some of the headlines were a bit misleading. There is no schism yet. The proposed "Protocol for Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation" is just that – a proposal. Nothing will be decided until the General Conference of the global denomination meets in May 2020 and there are a lot of other legislative hoops that must be jumped through before then. It is safe to assume that there will be several other proposals on the table by that time as well. This particular proposal was crafted by a small group of bishops, laity and other clergy who sit on various boards and committees, yet not as official representatives of those groups. In fact, there has been much critique over who was missing from these discussions.

The good news is that the conversation is happening at all levels (local church, district, annual conference and beyond) and we are seeking creative solutions. Want some more good news? The Wayne Community Church will keep on ministering to our communities, loving all people, and being a sanctuary for anyone seeking acceptance and peace. We will not stop being who we are while difficult conflicts are being resolved. We will keep everyone up to date when we do have an idea of the future of the denomination. The ministry of God to the people of Wayne and the surrounding areas that began with a traveling preacher in 1794 will not end any time soon thanks to your support and care. That's more than good news, that's GOD news!

The conversations and the news coverage will probably continue well beyond General Conference as we try to figure out how to be a global church with such differing interpretations of Scripture and law, such different cultural contexts. So, I hope you will join me in praying that we all keep open minds, open hearts, and open doors throughout this very human endeavor.

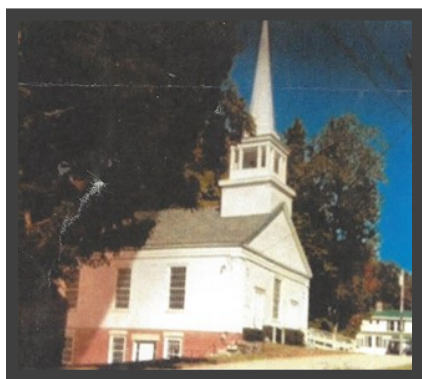

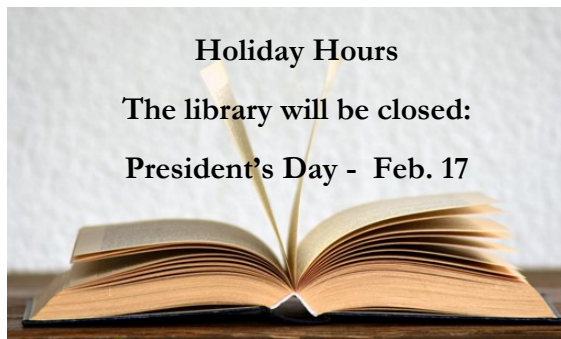
Public Hearing for Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendments

The Planning Board will conduct a public hearing for **Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendments** on **Wednesday, February 5, 2020** at **6:30 PM** at the **Wayne Elementary School – Gym**.

The Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendments include removal of the provision of a no-cut buffer within 100 feet of the high water mark where the Resource Protection Zone is within the shoreland area for timber harvesting and related activities only. This will allow the Maine Forest Service (MFS) to assume responsibility of oversight and enforcement of timber harvesting and related activities under the MFS Chapter 21 regulations in the shoreland zone and resource protection zone where it overlaps with the shoreland area. Other proposed ordinance changes includes clarification of the definition of a for-ester licensed by the State of Maine and minor reference changes.

It is the intention for the Planning Board to submit these amendments to the Selectboard for legislative approval at **Special Town Meeting** on **Tuesday February 18, 2020** at **6:00 PM** at the **Wayne Elementary School – Gym**.

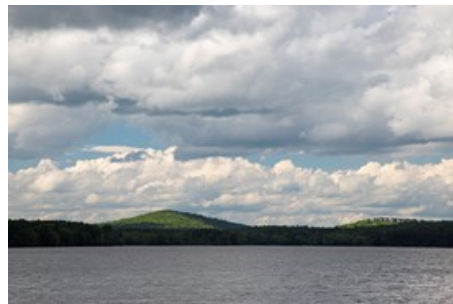

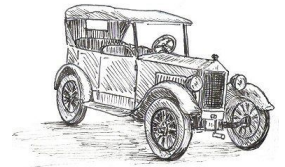

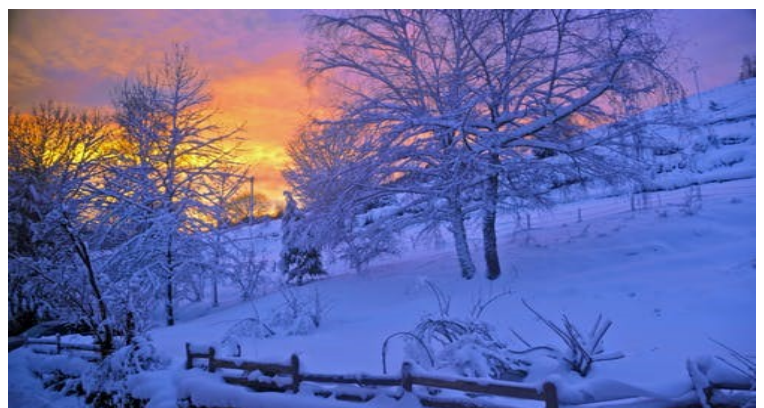
