Dear friends and neighbors,

If April showers bring May flowers, and May brought us snow, what will June bring? My prayer is that June will bring us lots of sun, opportunities to get outside and on the water, and familiar faces with smiling eyes (since we'll be wearing masks). It has been a joy to hear the peepers at night, to see the daffodils, tulips, and rhododendron in bloom, to smell the freshly cut grass, to feel the breeze off the lake, and to taste the earthy fiddleheads. But one of my colleagues (Rebekah Simon-Peter) recently wrote about an idea that intrigued me: post-pandemic depression.

Over the last few months, we have had to adjust to a new way of working, learning, and living. There have been many inconveniences, but we have also been able to introduce and reintroduce traditions we could not have enjoyed with our previous lives of busyness: family dinners, game nights with friends over zoom, time spent in our gardens, reading for enjoyment, walking our dogs, catching up on movies and television we've been wanting to see, writing letters and cards, and delivering groceries for neighbors. But as the economy opens up a little at a time, there is a concern that we will once again return to our ways of being busy and will miss the new ways we had of enjoying the things that matter the most to us, thus bringing on a kind of depression.

So here are her suggestions for staving off those "Post-Pandemic Blues:" First, consider and make a list of those unexpected blessings you received while sheltering in place. Second, choose the practices that you want to continue. Third, create intentional changes and make a plan NOW to continue those life-giving habits. Put them in your calendar now, so that as it begins to fill up again, you have already allotted yourself time to breathe and do the things that bring you joy.

I pray that this Messenger finds you well. Please let us know at the church if there is anything your neighbors can do to brighten your day or to help you as we continue to do our best to keep one another safe.

Please be courteous of your neighbors and drive responsibly. The Town has contracted with Kennebec County Sherriff's Office for rural patrol this summer. Police will take notice.

Several years ago, the Town adopted a Consumer Fireworks ban. Please respect this ban for everyone's safety and peaceful enjoyment of town. The Town will enforce this ban.

This month the Selectboard will be meeting on June 2 and June 10 at 6:30 PM remotely.

The Town's Assessor Agent Rob Duplisea from RJD Appraisal will be available by appointment on Monday, June 15, 2020, between 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM to answer any questions you might have about your assessment or tax bill. Please contact, the Town Office to schedule an appointment.

Governor Mills is mandating that all travelers arriving in Maine or returning to Maine, regardless of where they are from, to self-quarantine for 14 days to help slow the spread of the virus. If you have to self -quarantine, the Selectboard wanted to let you know that the Town has resources available to you. We will do our best to help assist you during your quarantine period. Thank you for protecting your neighbor and yourself.

Significant changes have been made to the dates, times, and locations of regarding election deadlines, polling locations and meeting times in response to the coronavirus pandemic. More changes may be forthcoming.

If you have not registered to vote, please stop by the Town Office to register to vote.

Absentee ballots will be available on Monday, June 15, 2020, at noon at the Town Office.

In observation of Independence Day, Friday, July 3, 2020, the Town Office will be closed. It will re-open on Monday, July 6, 2020, during our regularly scheduled hours

Reminder, RSU #38, Annual Budget Meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 17, 2020, at 7:00 PM at the Maranacook Community High School Gymnasium. Members of the RSU #38 School Board will explain the warrant articles within the budget, and the citizens of the four towns will vote on those warrant articles. The warrant articles will be explained in the RSU #38 Annual Report, which should arrive in the mail within the week. The RSU #38 budget represents 63% of your property tax bill in Wayne.

- Enhanced Cleaning Practices (clean surfaces regularly);
- Vital Records (by appointment only);
- Code Enforcement Officer (by appointment only);
- Town Manager (by appointment only);

Safety Precautions When the Library Reopens: This will be a "soft opening." When open, it will be with safety precautions in place, so that you know you are safe and I know I am safe--as best we can. Other area libraries in surrounding towns expect to open in some limited way at that time as well. We will limit the number of people at any time, ask that you wear a mask, don't come if you are sick, and stay alert to social distance from others. An acrylic shield will be in place at the front desk. Returned books will be quarantined 5 days before being re-shelved. For the first two weeks or so I would ask informally that you come to select and check out your books, magazines, and DVDs, but don't stick around. If you need a library computer, request an appointment. And remember, please plan to wear a mask. If you cannot wear a mask, your items can be delivered curbside.

Reminder: If you have had books signed out for the duration, it is time to return them. Please don't drop off donated books for the near future.

People and the Land: Pete and Marjorie Lovejoy, Wayne

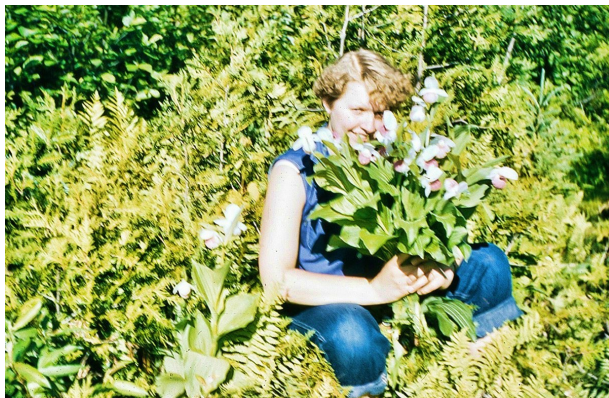

In 2019, Kennebec Land Trust intern Jonah Raether interviewed five Kennebec County community members about their relationships and connections to the land and natural spaces; below is one of his essays. Jonah, a recent graduate of Clark University with a Master of Health Science degree shares, "my research project taught me about the unique conservation ethic embraced by Kennebec County residents and encouraged me to center my final year as a graduate student around community conservation, resilience, and climate change mitigation." The Kennebec Land Trust works cooperatively with landowners and communities to conserve the forests, shorelands, fields, and wildlife that define central Maine. Pete and Marjorie Lovejoy look out from their home onto the same forested property where Pete's father had fifteen cattle in the middle of the twentieth century. They watch an assortment of birds coming to their feeder, and they enjoy the space and separation between themselves and their neighbors. They both grew up in Wayne and have spent most of their lives there, so they've seen it change over time. They both remember spending much of their childhood outside, helping out on their families' farms, cutting wood, and exploring the region on snowshoes and cross-country skis. Pete also remembers picking fiddleheads, fly fishing, and occasionally hunting for deer and rabbit. Part of what made all these activities possible was the lack of development in the area – fields, ponds, and forests were accessible, and there was never a feeling of encroaching on someone else's property.

Perhaps their fondest memory, though, was the time they spent enjoying a plot of showy lady's slippers near their home. This plot of orchids was found by Pete's grandmother, Mary E. Lovejoy (b. Dunn in 1882). From the day she found them in the early 1900s, the family realized that they were something special. The rare native orchids would bloom around the 4th of July each year, and the Lovejoys would enjoy them from a distance, recognizing that they shouldn't be bothered in any way and keeping their exact location a secret. Enjoying the orchids was a yearly tradition, and Pete will still occasionally take family and friends to see them. Today, that same group of flowers is recognized as a High-Value Plant Habitat and is protected by the Native Plant Trust.

AAH News June 2020



How's everyone doing? Tired of trying to stay safe? Or more used to the tension of concern about being exposed to Coronavirus? What can Aging At Home do for you?

One thing you may be tired of is hearing how to stay safe. It is mid-May as I write this, and I am reporting about what I see as UNSAFE, especially for us Elders and those with pre-existing medical conditions. Face Masks first. The volunteers for AAH have created close to 350 masks free for people in town and family members. THANK YOU SO MUCH!!

How to wear your mask: I have observed a number of problems with wearing masks. Use the wire on the top side of your mask (not all masks have wires) to form fit the mask above your nose. The trick is to make it fit as closely to your face as you can. You want it to filter all the air you take in as well as what you breathe out. If the mask has pleats, aim the pleats downward, to shape the mask around your nose and face. Try to decrease the gaps on the sides of the mask as much as possible. **DO NOT** put the mask over only your mouth. You must cover your nose as well. If you have trouble fitting your mask to your face, call me and I will come help you figure it out.

After a trip out, wash your mask in hot soapy water.

Wear your mask whenever you encounter people...at the grocery store, gas station, any time. Coronavirus infects people for a couple of days or more before they know they have it.

Hand washing is key in keeping coronavirus from spreading. Wash your hands often while at home, before and after meals, before and after using the bathroom. Use hot soapy water. Wash for 20 seconds or more. When you are out, use hand sanitizer and use it often.

Shelter in place. Don't go out unless you really need to. Each trip out potentially exposes you to coronavirus.

If you would like help with chores like grocery shopping, we have people who are EAGER to help. Let's give them something to do.

The Bellafonda Porch has more masks and food supplies for the taking. There are puzzles and books for the taking also. Please make use of it. It is for EVERYONE. If you have extras you can contribute to the porch, they often need pasta, tuna, peanut butter and other items. Monetary donations are accepted also.

Shopping: We suggested having only one person from a family go to the grocery store at a time. This would not take a place away from someone else. One person commented that instead of this one person idea, she and her husband take the list and split it into sections of the store, enter together and shop each from their section, checking out separately. That way they each are only in one part of the store and spend perhaps 15 minutes apiece, instead of 30 minutes, with backtracking because they forgot something in another part of the store. You decide which way you like best.

The food kitchen in Winthrop is run by Steve Dodge and a board of directors. A big THANK YOU TO STEVE!! They are presently serving meals Monday through Thursday through June. You can not enter the building (The St Francis Xavier Hall, 20 Lake St Winthrop,) but you can pick up meals for yourself and your family there at 12 noonish. Our volunteers also deliver meals to families in Wayne. If you could use meals or know someone who could use them, just go to the hall, or if you would like them delivered, call AAH and we will sign you up for delivery.

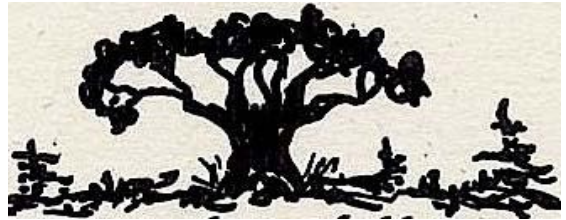

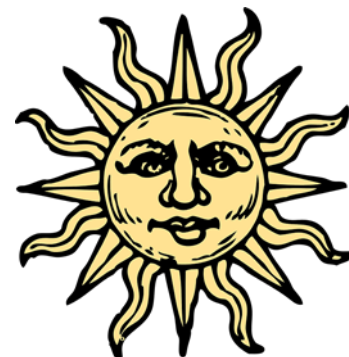
