Dear Friends and Neighbors,

While the pandemic has meant less in-person contact, it has broadened my ability to get to know many of you who do not attend regular church services with us. I have connected with so many people who give to this town out of their love of their neighbor and the shared values of what it means to be in community with each other. 

Hello to all in this time of CORONAVIRUS.

It seems most people are coping well with the restrictions we are faced with. Elders have figured out how to carry on with life while still staying safe. We are so glad to be living in Maine, with competent leadership and a relatively low incidence of illness and death. One death is sad and too many, but our incidence is lower than many other states. Let us know if we can help you with the logistics of errands or other tasks. And hang in there!

VOTING On July 14 we vote in the primary election for national, state and town offices. A big change this year: we will VOTE ON A BALLOT for all the items we usually discuss at the Annual Wayne Town Meeting: roads, schools, Aging At Home, and all the usual budget items. There is no IN-PERSON TOWN MEETING. You may vote in either of 2 ways. Inperson voting will be held at the Wayne Elementary School, 8 AM to 8 PM. Or you may vote by absentee ballot, and we encourage you to do so, especially those of you who are elders and those who have a medical condition which makes you more susceptible to illness. It is easy! To request a ballot to vote absentee, just call the Town Office number to speak to the Town Clerk. phone 207-685-4983, then option #2. Or there is a link on the town website to request a ballot. Don't delay!

CENSUS 2020 There is NO citizenship question on the 2020 Census. Fill out your Census form by hand, or go to Census 2020 online to fill it out there. It is quick and easy.

Thank You Lois Ault

While we all appreciate the charm and beauty that surrounds us here in Wayne, we may not know the people due thanks for preserving this treasure for our enjoyment and that of our children.

Lois Ault was chairman of the Wayne Planning Board in the 1970s, when land use was becoming an issue for the state and a number of Maine towns and cities. At that time in Wayne, an out of town landowner was considering using his land for a manure dumping site. Also, a development was being considered on Wayne shoreland that concerned many residents.

The Wayne Planning Board was responsible for developing a Comprehensive Plan for the town that was required by State law. Development and approval of a plan took approximately three years, as there was significant opposition as well as support from the town's people. Thanks to Lois Ault's, patience, perseverance, and respectful management of this process, Wayne's original planning ordinance was adopted by a close vote at a town meeting in 1973.

Thousands of Americans were stranded abroad during the worst of the global crisis. During Maine's "shelter in place", many of us watched the news closely, reading and listening to stories across the world. One of the more interesting accounts was New Zealand. Jacinda Ardern, the young prime minister, made the bold move to lock down immediately, while continuing to communicate positively through daily briefings and guide her citizens to diligently keep the virus at bay. There was apparent trust as the New Zealanders followed rules and ultimately became know worldwide for their success.

When I learned that our own local residents, Ken and Sue Spalding, were isolated in New Zealand during this crisis I asked if they might share their experience with us and this is their narrative.

After months of planning, we left Wayne on March 12, anticipating a 5 week trip to New Zealand followed by 2 weeks in Hawaii and San Francisco. Our two sons were supposed to meet us for 3 weeks in New Zealand. The day after we arrived in Christchurch, a two-week quarantine was imposed for all new visitors to the country, making our sons' trip untenable. The two of us were able to travel for 10 days, before it was announced that a "lock-down" was going to happen and we would have to "shelter in place" for an indefinite period of time. So we hustled to Queenstown, thinking we would be able to fly out from there, to get home. But shortly after we arrived there, the Queenstown airport closed! To make a long story short, after several flight cancellations and changes, we ended up being "stuck" in Queenstown for 7 weeks. But what a spectacular place to be stuck! Queenstown is beautiful, and there were many great hikes and walks we could take. "Lock-down" in New Zealand meant no driving, unless it was for essential business. All restaurants, non-essential businesses, and all stores but grocery stores, pharmacies, and gas stations were closed. There was no take-out, and nearly all construction projects were stopped. It felt a bit like a ghost-town. We were very impressed with the fast and decisive direction of the Prime Minister. Her strategy was to eliminate the virus - to go hard, go early, move swiftly, and act decisively and she encouraged people to be strong, be kind, support others and unite against COVID 19. We were also impressed with the willingness of the people to follow the strict government guidelines. As you may have heard, they have been rewarded for their cooperation, as New Zealand is now considered "virus -free." After our 7 weeks in Queenstown, the country started to open more for domestic travel and we actually re-booked our flights home to have a couple of weeks to see more of the country before we returned. For a relatively small country, New Zealand has some very diverse eco-systems, and dramatic and beautiful landscapes. After 11 weeks there, although happy to be home, we do wonder daily if we should have stayed!

30 Mile River Watershed Association

Boating season has begun and on Memorial Day weekend the 30 Mile River Watershed Association (30MRWA) kicked off the start of the summer season with the return of its Courtesy Boat Inspection (CBI) program. Invasive species pose a serious threat to our lakes and ponds in the watershed and boat inspections are an essential first line of defense. With the sunny, warm weather, boat launches were busy, and on this first weekend our team of six staff conducted 157 courtesy boat inspections at four launches from Wayne to Vienna. During these challenging and unique times, the safety of boaters and our staff is our top priority, so this season we have made some changes to our protocols, following guidance from the CDC and the Maine DEP, such as wearing masks, keeping physical distance, and not touching boats or equipment.

If you launch your boat without a CBI present, please remember to do your part to protect our waters from invasive plants and animals and **clean, drain, and dry**. <u>Clean</u> plant debris, mud and algae from all boating and fishing gear and dispose of it in the trash or on high, dry ground where there is no danger of it washing into the water. <u>Drain</u> the live well, bilge water and engine water away from the water

body. <u>Dry</u> anything that comes into contact with the water. Drying your boat, trailer and equipment in the sun for at least five days is recommended if rinsing your boat, trailer parts and other equipment with hot, high pressure water is not an option.

As more people are getting outdoors this season, our mission of working as a community for clean and healthy lakes, ponds and streams in our watershed is as important as ever. 


