Dear Friends and Neighbors,

"Darkness, the truest darkness, is not the absence of light. It is the conviction that the light will never return. But the light always returns to show us things familiar: home, family, and things entirely new, or long overlooked." At first glance, this quote looks like it might have come from Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. or Pres. John F. Kennedy. But it is actually a quote from Lois Lane in the movie Justice League (2017). As Dan and I watched it (again) during these strange times of a pandemic, this quote caught my ear and reminded me of Psalm 139 which we studied during our sermon series in August. The Psalmist writes: "If I say, 'Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light around me become night,' even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day, for darkness is as light to you."

Even in these days when we are unsure of the future, unsure of the safety of our children in school, unsure of coming back together inside buildings to worship or eat or celebrate; even in these days when it seems like the future is shrouded in darkness, faith teaches us that darkness is not always a bad thing. It is in the darkness of the womb that we are conceived and nurtured until we are ready to fully enter the world. It is in the darkness of the soil that seeds germinate and reach toward the sun. The Psalmist reminds us that the holy does not differentiate between darkness and light, because the holy exists beyond our basic understandings of such divine concepts as darkness and light. Hope is what we call our conviction that the light will return and that God will guide us if we only listen to the myriad of ways God teaches us.

God teaches us through Scripture – holy texts which point us where to go and remind us that there is nothing new under the sun. God teaches us through science – people inspired with curiosity and hunger for that new creation, that new discovery, that new expression of life. God teaches us through music and visual arts which connect hearts even without words, crossing boundaries of language and age and ethnicity and, and, and... God teaches us through nature when we are mindful of our surroundings, our feelings, our body, our thoughts, our connections with other living things. God teaches us through meditation and prayer when we allow our minds to quiet.

And so, you all remain in my prayers. I'm praying for our schools, our children, and our parents who are doing their best to make the best decisions they can. I'm praying for our churches/synagogues/temples/mosques as we each take a different approach to worshiping in-person, that our faith communities might be able to balance safety and connection. I'm praying for our nation and all the nations of the world as we tackle so many problems all at once: hunger, poverty, war, violence, illness, inequity and injustice. I'm praying for our little town in gratitude for the small business owners, for the artists and musicians, for the animal and nature lovers, and for the kids of all ages at play in the water. Let us together find comfort in the familiar AND attend to the things "long overlooked."

The Town's **Assessor Agent** Rob Duplisea from RJD Appraisal will be available by appointment on **Monday, September 21, 2020**, between 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM to answer any questions you might have about your assessment or tax bill. Please contact the Town Office to schedule an appointment.

New Summer Hours. The Transfer Station will be open **Sundays from 8-12** through the end of the summer. Residents are encouraged to come to the Transfer Station once per week to reduce traffic loads, even though we are open an extra day. **The Transfer Station staff want to thank you all for your patience and cooperation over the past few months and hope this change makes things safer and more comfortable for everyone!**

Please be courteous of your neighbors and drive responsibly. The Town has contracted with Kennebec County Sheriff's Office for rural patrol this summer. Police will take notice.

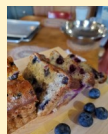


