

I began thinking about classic old Maine houses and the stories they hold. Many families moving in and out, each with their own routines and traditions.




Died 1892, written on the gravestone perched in our new front yard was the beginning of a story left behind. We were never able to meet the prior owner so our curiosity was left unanswered. We were reasonably certain (hmm?) no one was buried there but we did worry that the stone may have been filched from its original resting place and should be returned. I was directed by the town clerk, who is an expert on otherworldly accounts, to investigate the Evergreen Cemetery where records show Constant Hammond was buried. After an afternoon wandering through the hillsides of Evergreen and peering at headstones, which certainly hold stories of their own, I came across Constant and his wife's marker. It became apparent that Mrs. Hammond had died several years after her husband and a new stone holding both their names was erected. We're still unclear why or how the original marker ended up residing with us, but perhaps that holds another tale.

Hopefully, the new Owners of my parents' homestead will not encounter any mysterious activity but instead will overhear the echoes of unrestrained laughter, creative storytelling, and giggles from happy children. With a bit of luck, they'll smell the aroma of home cooking, linen closets scented by wind dryed sheets, and fresh sawdust of proud woodworking projects.

Although it can be difficult to let go of a beloved house, there comes a time we must move on and let the old dwelling create a new life and new stories. Our family memories will live on vibrantly and we will recall them often. There will still be laughter, storytelling, and giggles to be had.
