As I reflect on that first Christmas more than 2000 years ago, it occurs to me that Jesus was born during a tumultuous time and to very poor parents who did not have access to adequate shelter or safety. They had to find comfort wherever they could (even in a stable, which was most probably a cave used to house animals at night). Mary had to give birth without the support and experience of her mother or sisters or aunts or neighbors she knew so well. There were no large family gatherings to celebrate Jesus's birth; no extravagant feasts prepared and shared until everyone's waistbands were ready to burst. Joseph had no one to slap him on the back or share a cigar; no one to reassure him that he would be a wonderful father. And yet, no one will ever forget that night. Through it, we have learned what is most precious in this life: family, safety, health, compassion, peace, hope, joy, love. "And the greatest of these is love" (1 Cor 13: 13). No matter what your Christmas season looks like this year, may it be overflowing with love.

Wayne Selectboard Information

Two years ago the Wayne Selectboard voted to join a coalition of towns to evaluate ways to improve internet service in town. Those towns are Vienna, Fayette, Mt. Vernon, Readfield, Wayne, and Leeds.

In each of the towns there is a significant number of households that do not have access to reliable, high-speed internet service. This limits their ability to:

- help students get an education
- work from home
- access information and services
- reduce isolation by connecting with family and friends and accessing health and other supports

Internet access will affect the financial and demographic future of our community by encouraging people to move here and encouraging our young people to stay or return. All these reasons, and more, have been made more significant during the Coronavirus pandemic.



Dear Community, Friends and Supporters,

We want to give you an update on Sustain Wayne's Masonic Hall project.

With Covid-19 and the effect it has had, we thought it was best not to solicit donations during the past several months. As we near the end of the year and look ahead to the future of the Masonic Hall, we are asking for your help. We have a block grant (known as the CDBG Grant) for \$50,000, which will cover exterior work on the building, specifically the roof. The work is slated to begin in May.

Our wish is to raise enough money to replace the foundation, requiring raising the building and also replacing the rotting sill along the General Store side of the building while it is jacked up. The building needs this repair to make it usable. The interior of the building is beautiful but still needs architectural repair to keep the historical footprint. As with any old building, windows, paint, plumbing, and electrical are all needed but will be part of another phase as we raise money. Your support with raising the building would ensure that the old Hall will be around for all of us to enjoy for years to come.

Estimates put the foundation work at around \$90,000. We are hoping to raise this money in the next two to three months so we can get the foundation work done, shoring up the building before any roofing begins.

As we go forward with the project, each phase will be shared with all of you. This building is part of Wayne's history and it is for the whole community. Please consider donating to this very worthy cause. The building cannot withstand sitting idle for much longer without consideration of an alternative plan. Sustain Wayne would like to continue with this project and see it through, but we desperately need your help. Thank you very much. Aging At Home News December 2020



Can it be December already? It seems the world has moved VERY SLOWLY at times, and QUITE QUICKLY at others. We hope you all are staying well.

Corona infections have been on the rise across the country and also in Maine. Since Maine is the oldest state in the US, we elders are especially vulnerable to the infection. We can't get the infection under control without each taking responsibility for our behavior. We must heed the health experts at the Maine CDC and protect others while also protecting ourselves. Covid does not have a political leaning. It doesn't care if you are Republican or Democratic or Other. It knows no boundaries.

For now, the most important things we can do are:

WEAR A MASK, even outdoors. It protects others while protecting yourself.

Stay Home, stay distant, and WEAR A MASK

Wash your hands frequently, and WEAR A MASK

When in doubt, WEAR A MASK

Our Tai Chi practice is suspended for now, because of Covid. Our medical advisor told us we were at risk practicing indoors, even with masks on. We are so sorry not to be able to provide this activity for people. It is so beneficial for all of us, especially for balance. If you want to learn on your own with the DVDs we have been using, it is easy to purchase them. Just get in touch and I will show you how. I hope it is not too long before we can gather together to practice again.

The Maine Community Foundation has given AAH a grant, and it was earmarked for the monthly elder luncheons which we held at the Cary Library. Now that we can not hold these luncheons, we asked the MCF if we could use the money for other things. They approved the following:

Bags with Covid/Comfort/ Emergency supplies for elders. We are collecting items such as Hand sanitizer, gloves, masks, cups by Martha Hoddinott, cocoa mix, flashlights, first aid kits, Christmas ornaments by Wayne Village Pottery, soap by Tammy Birtwell, fleece blankets, pretty napkins, and other items. These items can't be a real replacement for the socialization of luncheons, but they may be a bright spot in an otherwise lonely and unhappy fall/winter. Thank you to the Maine Community Foundation!

Our volunteers have delivered frozen Thanksgiving turkeys and the fixings from the Wayne Community Church to a number of people in Wayne. We also had a woman volunteer to cook extra "turkey and fixings" plates and deliver them to some others. What a great community of Wayne we live in!

AAH has grant money to pay for someone willing to shovel snow or snow-blow plus put down sand or salt for people in Wayne who need it this winter. If you are willing and reliable or know someone who is, please let us know. We are having trouble finding someone.

The holidays will be here very soon. It may be a very difficult time for people. Please think of others especially this year. Do a good deed, call them, send a card, drop off a casserole. You will feel good having done that.




