The first Methodist sermon delivered on the Readfield Circuit (of which Wayne was a member) was on February 14, 1794, by Rev. Jesse Lee. Soon after, a Methodist preacher (Philip Wager) was appointed to the circuit and formal classes were established in our area, including one right here in Wayne. By 1820, our faith community had grown too large to continue meeting in homes, fields, and the village schoolhouse. So, the Trustees contracted with John Morrison to erect our sanctuary on November 20, 1820. The building was probably finished in 1821, though we have no record of its dedication.

That means that our sanctuary turns 200 years old this year! Of course, many changes and additions have been made over the centuries, but current and former Trustees can attest to the 200-year-old beams that still run above the sanctuary ceiling. That also means that we have some history to preserve and maintain. This year, our focus is on our steeple – a beacon of light that can be seen from Androscoggin lake to our South, as you come down the hills either on Rt 133 or the Old Winthrop Road from the East, from Pocasset Lake to the North, and as you drive through the village from the West. Our steeple is a sign of welcome and warmth. We need your help to make sure it remains that symbol of comfort for all of us!

In order to complete the repairs and repaint our steeple, we need to raise \$12,000. The good news? The Trustees and members of the Wayne Community Church are forward thinkers and have been setting aside some money each year into a steeple fund so that we can keep up with this maintenance. We have already set aside nearly \$5000! That is a terrific start, but we need your help to top it off. As in years past, we have generously shared our Christmas offerings with other organizations doing good works in our community area. At Easter, we ask your assistance with one of our projects - something that helps us continue to be YOUR community church, living into the values we hold dear as a community: friendship, compassion, acceptance and love.

Will you consider a gift to our steeple fund this Easter season? As signs of spring emerge, as hope for health and safety blossoms, as we breathe deeply the clean air with smells of melting snow and listen for sounds of songbirds, we invite you to open your heart (and your purse strings!) to help us celebrate 200 years of worshiping in this beautiful sanctuary in the heart of the village. Together, let's make sure this faith community remains strong and welcoming for another 200 years. Town Manager—Aaron Chrostowsky

The Town of Wayne has posted all Town roads for the **mud season**. All overweight trucks will need to get permits at the Town Office to **travel Posted Roads**. During the spring thaw, please use caution while driving on Town roads; water can be on the road, new potholes can form, and thick mud can be present. If you have any road issues, please don't hesitate to contact the Town Office at (207) 685-4983 or towmanager@waynemaine.org.

Your third and final installments of property taxes are due by **Thursday, April 1, 2021**, at **5:00 PM**. Interest will begin to accrue on April 2, 2021, at 7% per annum.

Nominations Papers will be available from the Town Clerk for several positions on **Friday, February 26, 2021**. The following positions will be vacant June 30, 2021: two Selectboard (3-Year term, Term Expires 2024); one Budget Committee (5-Year term, Term Expires 2026); one RSU#38 School Board (3-Year term, Term Expires 2024) and one Local School Committee (3-Year term, Term Expires 2024); seats are available. All nomination papers are due to the Town Clerk on **Monday, April 9, 2021**.

The Town Office will continue implementing several new COVID safety measures throughout April 2021.

- Residents are encouraged to avoid conducting business in-person at the Town Office. Please call or email or utilize our many online services at www.waynemaine.org.
- However, if you must conduct business in-person, please contact the Town Office ahead to schedule curbside service.
- The Town Office's new temporary hours of operation will be Monday through Friday from 9 AM to 5 PM. Only one customer will be helped at a time.
- Anyone requesting service must wear a face covering or make alternative arrangements for service.

This month the **Selectboard** will be meeting on **April 6** and **April 20** at **6:30 PM** remotely. Selectboard will be holding a public hearing on Proposed Annual Town Meeting Articles.

This month the **Planning Board** will be meeting on **April 7** at **6:30 PM** remotely. Planning Board will be holding a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance and Mobile Home Park, Recreational Vehicle Park, and Campground Ordinance.

This month the Budget Committee will be meeting on April 13 and April 27 at 6:00 PM remotely.

This month the **Conservation Commission** will be meeting on **April 14** at **5:30 PM** remotely.

RSU Board of Directors will be meeting on **April 14** at **6:30 PM** at the Maranacook High School Student Center to approve the school budget.

In observation of Patriot's Day, Monday, April 19, 2021, the Town Office will be closed.

The Town's **Assessor Agent** Matt Caldwell from RJD Appraisal will be available by appointment on **Monday, April 26, 2021**, to answer any questions you might have about your assessment or tax bill. Please contact the Town Office to schedule an appointment.

The Town of Wayne has an Animal Control Ordinance that states no domesticated animal, licensed or unlicensed, shall be permitted on Town property (highways, sidewalks, Ladd Recreation Center, parks, footbridge, Wayne Town House, North Wayne School House, Town Boat Launch, Fire Stations, or old Town Office) **without a leash**. The Town provides dog waste bags in the parks around the millpond; please be courteous of others who use these public facilities and **pick up after your dogs**.





Hall Renovation Goals



PHASE ONE - RAISE THE HALL

Phase one of the rehabilitation will address the most significant aspects that are currently threatening the building, the foundation and the roof. Lifting the Hall

building, the foundation and the foor, circing the rail out of the floodplain and back down onto a new foundation will secure the Hall for generations to come. Phase one will also complete necessary roof repair with funding from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Sustain Wayne was awarded from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

after phase one is complete, we'll begin

PHASE TWO - FARM TO TABLE

Phase two of the renovation will be renovating the first floor. This space will be used for:

- * Dining highlighting local farmers and producers
- · Winter Farmers' Market
- Educational Programming topics may include canning, preserving, sustainability initiatives
- · A community hub for gathering and learning

PHASE THREE 2ND FLOOR

PHASE FOUR 3RD FLOOR

The second floor will be a mixed-use space, and include office space, a gallery for local artists, and overflow for first-floor activities.

The third floor will be a community gathering space for live music and entertainment


