Dear friends and neighbors,

We have now finished two of our three books in the series “Community Conversations on Race” that the Wayne Community Church and Cary Memorial Library developed together. Among all the things we have discussed so far, I wanted to share with you one interesting observation that was made. It has to do with language and the order of the words we use. One of the authors described the difference between referring to people as “slaves” or as “people who were enslaved.” It reminded me of the volunteer work I did while living on Peaks Island with Portland Family Promise, a group that advocates for and supports families who are experiencing homelessness.

One of the first things we learned was that the folks with whom we were in relationship were not homeless families – they were “families experiencing homelessness.” It was all about the relationship first. We all have experience of family – good or bad, though it may be. But we have NOT all had the experience of homelessness. We not only donated meals – we ate with these families, getting to know parents and children. We not only provided shelter – we slept under the same roof with these families, showing our solidarity with them in a tangible way. We walked through their experience of homelessness with them in small and big ways. And everyone was changed in the process.

I wonder what other adjectives we might start turning into nouns and shifting around in our lexicon in an attempt to connect with people first: disabled person or person with a disability; diabetic person or person with diabetes; autistic person or person with autism. I have diabetes, but is that my only defining characteristic? Aren't I a person first? And isn't there so much about my personhood with which others can immediately relate? That doesn't mean that diabetes isn't part of who I am. Nor does it mean that diabetes isn't an IMPORTANT part of who I am. It does mean that I am more than any one word can describe.

I truly believe that Jesus saw the person first. In the Gospel stories of healing miracles, others saw a leper, an unclean woman, a possessed man, a dying child. But Jesus saw people – people who were suffering, who were ostracized, who were chained up, and who were dying both physically and spiritually. Jesus healed them, not with magic potions or a flamboyant “abracadabra,” but with a touch and a loving word. Jesus started from a place of compassion and solidarity. He was fully present with people in whatever they were experiencing because he loved the whole person. It is my prayer that I may learn this important lesson and apply it in my everyday life. I hope you will join me in this journey of compassion and solidarity, too.

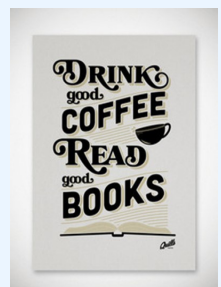

First Saturday at the Cary Library's Williams House

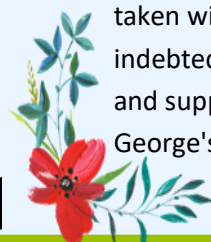

On August 19 we will be holding the last of our summer **Community Conversations on Race**, when we will be joined by author Abdi Nor Iftin for a discussion based on his book *Call Me American*.

Born in Mogadishu to nomadic parents, Abdi Nor Iftin survived famine, war, and child soldiering. Thanks to the movies available to him, he taught himself English by watching American action films. By repeating and imitating the carefree actors, he earned himself the nickname "Abdi American". Through guerrilla journalism, Abdi dispatched stories about his life to a series titled Messages From Mogadishu on American Public Media. His stories were short-listed for Peabody Awards in 2016. These stories were later picked by NPR, the BBC, and later This America.

After surviving a bombing at his house one evening in 2009, Abdi finally said goodbye to his home country and moved to Kenya where he and his brother lived as refugees. In an amazing stroke of luck, he won entrance to the U.S. in August 2014, in the annual visa lottery, though his route to America—ending in a harrowing sequence of events that nearly stranded him in Nairobi—did not come easily.

Now a bestselling and award-winning author based in the state of Maine, he has been featured on CNN, NPR, NYT, Washington Post, and The Boston Globe. Abdi is an advocate for refugee and immigrant rights. He is dedicated to bringing people together through his stories of survival and resilience.

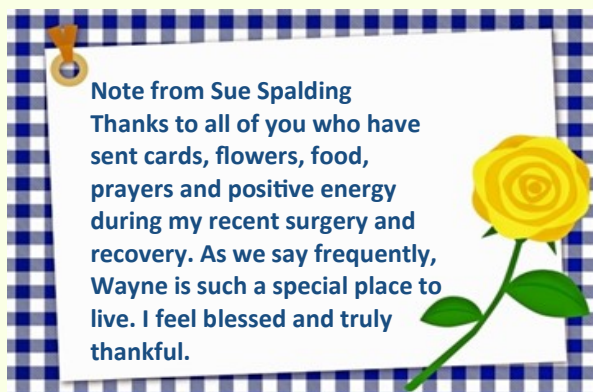

Weston Woods Preserve Dedication **Thursday August 12 , 4:30 PM**

In late December 2020, Kennebec Land Trust permanently protected the 55-acre Weston Woods Preserve Little Cobbossee Lake in East Winthrop. The acquisition was made possible with a generous donation from Bob and Jim Weston, a grant from the Maine Natural Resource Conservation Program (MNRCP), and far-sighted KLT and community members. Weston Woods includes 1,315 feet of undeveloped shoreline; forested, scrub-shrub, and emergent wetlands; 1,500 feet of perennial streams; and land designated as Inland Waterfowl and Wading Bird Habitat. 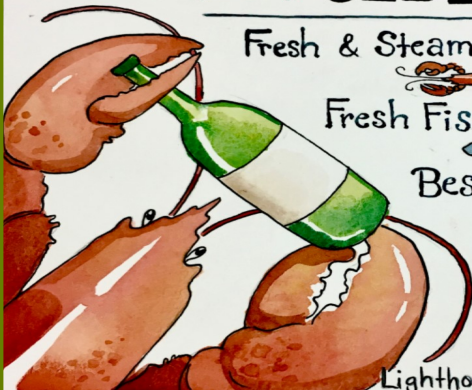
