Dear neighbors & friends,

Can you believe that September is already upon us?! It won't be long now until leaves start changing and summer folks start packing up to head back to their "other" homes. We will miss all of you! Each season, as it approaches, conjures up memories of the past and hope for the future. This year, it will be no different, I'm sure.

Some of my fondest memories of Septembers in the past include celebrations of my Mom's birthday (the rest of our family all have birthdays in December and January); back to school shopping with money I'd saved from working all summer long; warm days and cool nights by the campfire; getting in that last Labor Day camping trip in the north woods of Maine. Of course, September was forever changed by the events that began 20 years ago on 9/11/2001. I remember we closed the family owned store where I worked and sat crowded together around a borrowed TV set watching in terror as planes were hijacked, buildings came tumbling down, and fires burned. I also remember two other very important things that came out of that day: heroes and love.

I remember courageous men and women running into burning buildings, making their way through ash and debris in search of survivors. I remember cities and towns all across the nation sending First Responders to help: police officers, firefighters, EMT's. All giving of themselves to relieve the traumatized and exhausted folks who answered the very first call for help. I remember churches, synagogues, mosques, temples, holy places of prayer and meditation living their belief in love, opening their doors and offering safe places for people to eat, sleep, grab a bottle of water, and commune with whatever higher power they claimed as their own. September 11 is also my mother's birthday. That year, she and I spent it at church, with heads hung low, tears streaming down our faces, lit only by candlelight – we prayed in fear, in grief, in uncertainty, in anger, and in hope.

This year, to mark the 20th anniversary of 9/11/2001, Wayne Community Church would like to invite ALL our neighbors of every faith tradition and spiritual leaning to join us for a candlelight vigil (Saturday, Sept 11 at 7 pm). We especially want to invite everyone who has ever served as a First Responder to come and allow us to thank you and to bless you. Surely, we will conjure up memories of the past, but we will also point to signs of hope for the future. When we gather together under one roof, WE will become a beautiful sign of hope for the future by showing our love for one another.

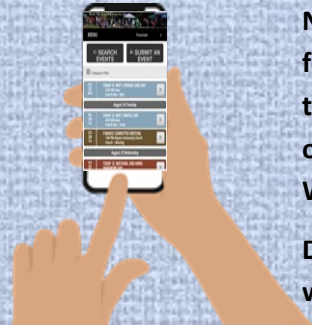


WAYNE, IT'S NOT JUST A PLACE.....IT'S AN EVENT!
