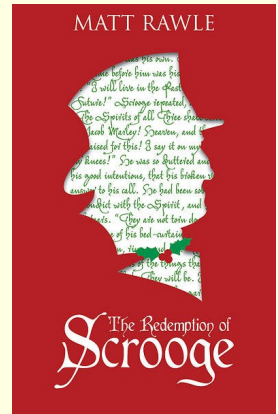

Did You Know?

On a beautiful sunny fall day, I surprisingly convinced my husband that we should venture out and discover the whereabouts of all eight of Wayne Maine's cemeteries. As it turned out they were all interesting and quite easy to find. The two larger sites we were familiar with and pass by frequently, but the rest were unknown to us.

We found the smallest and perhaps the oldest off the main road tucked back in a circular open area in the woods. There were very few stones, most unreadable and it appeared unattended. As I mention in the puzzler below it is often referred to as the Revolutionary Cemetery. Researching one of the deceased, Isaac John Billington, from Wayne, Maine, who died December 16, 1829, revealed Private Billington served with the Massachusetts Militia during the American Revolution. He was also listed in the census of 1810 as a "Head of Families" from Wayne, Maine.

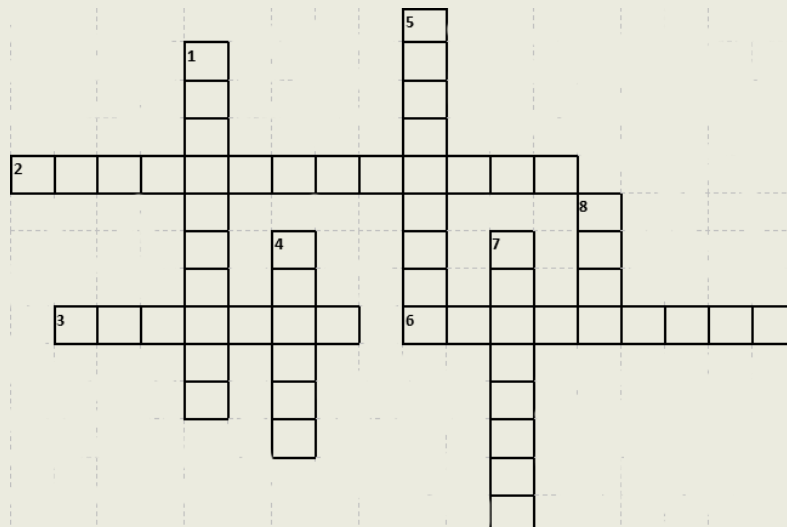
Many of the other sites were small, situated in pleasant surroundings and housed old stones of the 1800's. As it turned out it was a lovely way to while away an afternoon. I've attached locations on the answer page to help you find them all. Take a peek and imagine what life in Wayne was like before we arrived.

Across

- 2. Situated about a half of mile south of the Wayne Village overlooking Lake Androscoggin you will find this resting place. It has *Gott* guests on both sides of the street.
- 3. It is known for being revolutionary, but it is actually *Old*.
- 6. Sloping hillside on a corner. You can pass right on by going out of town, but you must STOP on your way in.

Down

- 1. The first traces of this burial place were graves of unknown persons marked by field stones. Due to the generosity of land donated by neighbors it was enlarged to the pleasant site it is today situated by a winding stream with lakes beyond.
- 4. This resting place was established by two brothers near a family farm of the same name.
- 5. Formerly called Pinewoods, this cemetery is about 600 feet from the Leeds Road intersection.
- 7. This site found on Strickland Ferry Road
- 8. Seven brothers form a circle here near a pond that bore their family name.

Wayne Internet Improvement Project Update:

For the past three years, our Select Board has been exploring ways to make affordable, reliable high-speed Internet access available to all parts of our town. Cable Internet is now available to about 2/3 of our residents. In parts of Wayne, residents can only get low-speed relatively unreliable DSL Internet - or no Internet service at all. We have done several surveys. A large majority of people in town have said they want high speed, reliable Internet service available to all. Reasons include remote work, access to education, access to telemedicine, running a small business, and the many other ways in which the Internet is part of our lives now.

We have worked to identify and study a range of possibilities, including:

- Using Satellite and Cell-Tower based Internet services
- Paying our existing Cable provider to extend service throughout town
- Working with an Internet Service Provider to build a town-owned network, maintain that network, and deliver Internet service through it.

Based on the information we have gathered, we believe that a town-owned fiber optic network would best meet the needs of the town. If we have a town-owned network, we can choose a different internet provider if we are not satisfied with service or rates.

Of all the options we have studied, we believe that a fiber-optic network is most likely to meet our current and future needs. Modern fiber-optic networks are faster and more reliable than cable or DSL networks, and can function even during power outages, as long as your home has a generator or other power source. They do not slow down if neighbors on your street are using the internet.

At present, fiber-optic networks can carry the internet, TV and movies through streaming services, and phone services. This kind of network can meet education and business needs, and support working from home and telemedicine. As technologies evolve in the future, these networks are easily upgradeable to allow them to keep up with new needs.

Our goal is to bring reliable, affordable Internet access throughout every part of our town with as little property tax impact as possible. We seek to bring high-speed internet service to all public roads and to as many private roads as possible.

Based on recent state and federal legislation, and bills currently in Congress, we believe that at this time the town has a good chance of having much of the initial cost of building a network paid for by grants. Local Internet Service Providers have also expressed interest in working with the town to have some of the initial construction cost paid for by customer fees. We do not plan to depend on grants or tax money after the construction phase is finished. The town is using some of the Federal Stimulus money we have received to do the work needed to put this project out to bid. When we have bids and have explored grants available, we will know more about local costs for this project. At that point, the Select Board will decide whether to take the project to Town Meeting for a decision about going forward. No property tax money will be spent without Town Meeting approval. We will do our best to answer your questions and to keep you informed.

To restate our goal:


Our goal is to bring reliable, affordable Internet access throughout every part of Wayne with as little property tax impact as possible.

Tax-deductible donation! The Early Morning Tennis group, composed of both summer and year-round residents and the Pickleball group are actively raising money to rebuild the tennis and pickleball courts at the Ladd Recreation Center! Wayne Outdoor Recreation and Natural Resource Protection Information available at the Holiday Stroll

The Conservation Commission and others will provide information on low impact recreation options and information and opportunity for discussion on various issues including water quality, invasive plants, wetlands, forests, wildlife (including geese and brown tail moths), potential climate change impacts and planning. We hope to start conversations on what Wayne residents might want the town to look like in the future.

OUTDOOR HALLOWEEN FUN IN WAYNE

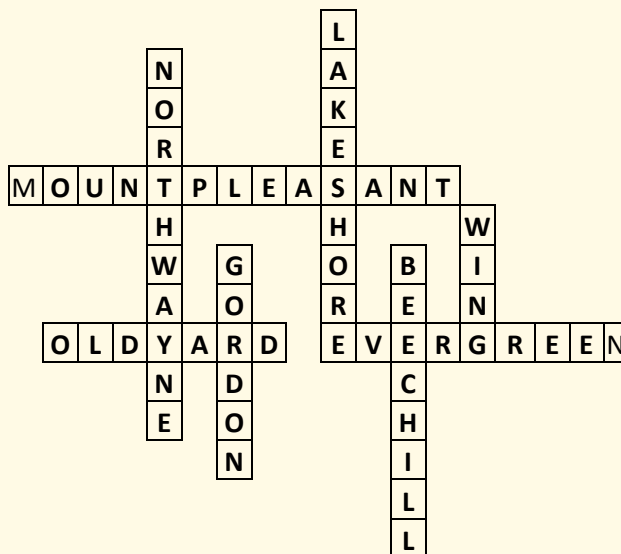

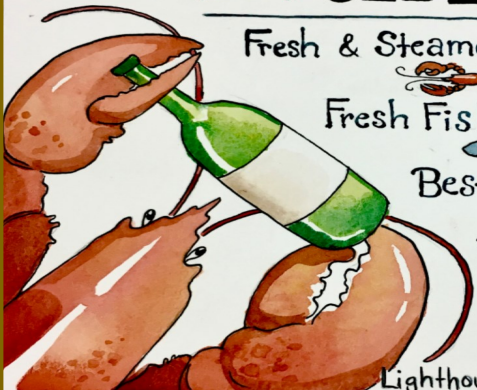

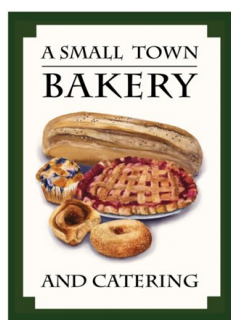
