The Town Office will be open by curbside only. Residents are requested to avoid conducting business in person at the Town Office. Please call or email or utilize our many online services. However, if you must conduct business in person, please contact Town Office in advance or when you are in the parking lot, and we will serve you.

Winter is here! **Winter sand** is available for residents' use at home on Fairbanks Road near the Town Sand/ Salt Shed, only two buckets per storm.

Please take notice, Maine State Law: 29-A, M.R.S.A. §2396, prohibits any person from placing in the public way snow or slush that has not accumulated there naturally.

The Town of Wayne has **posted all Town roads for the mud season**. All overweight trucks will need to get permits at the Town Office to travel Posted Roads. During the spring thaw, please use caution while driving on Town roads, water can be on the road, new potholes can form and thick mud can be present. Cold Snaps Won't Kill the Browntail Moth

Recent cold snaps have got people asking, will these cold nights moderate our Browntail Moth infestation? Tom Schmeelk, Maine Forest Service entomologist, advises: "Unfortunately, since BTM's natural range is basically the same latitude in Europe as we are here in Maine, they are already adapted to the colder winter temps. They have anti-freeze proteins in their blood that help them weather the cold. The cold can reduce populations of hemlock wooly adelgid, though." We might add that the BTM has survived along the coast for more than a century during periods when winter temperatures were more severe than in recent times. In fact, much of the increase in annual average temps over the past century occurred during the winter months.

While we are on the subject, the Legislature is considering a bill (LD 1929) that will provide funding for towns to deal with BTM infestations. Town Office will be watching closely.

Tip: Between now and mid-April before the caterpillar to control the population in the summer it is prudent to clip and destroy the overwintering webs by either soaking in water and detergent or burning.

Thank you to those of you who have responded to our January request for donations to the Ladd Recreational Center Court project. Here are the key points for the project. Wayne's town manager Aaron Chrostowsky oversees the fund and will be sure to send you the necessary documentation for taxes or corporate matches.

Here is the information in a nutshell!

- * The courts are heaving and cracking to the point that they are causing injuries.
- * We intend to remove the existing asphalt on the current tennis and pickleball/tennis practice court area and fencing, install a necessary drainage system and resurface the area and reinstall fencing and posts to provide two tennis and two pickleball courts.
- * The courts provide a valuable town venue for both year-round and summer residents, as well as a place where youth can learn and refine skills before moving on to middle and high school. Tennis and pickleball are life-long sports.
- *We have done the research and brought in a geoengineer who verified that the courts are built on clay and we need to remove the asphalt and install a drainage system underneath.
- *We have raised \$85K
- *We have an estimate of \$250k from a reputable company that is in the court resurfacing business and we have several other potential quotes.
- *There is a possible Federal 50 Percent Matching grant
- * Both the Rec Center Board and the Wayne Select Board have approved this campaign.
- * All donations will be acknowledged and used exclusively for this project!

WAYNE FOOD WASTE UPDATE

Are you interested in:

- Decreasing wasted energy costs associated with food growth, distribution and consumption?
- Providing increased nutritional resources to those in your community who experience food instability?
- Decreasing the environmental impact of Food Waste in our landfills?
- Reducing the cost to your community of disposing Food Waste in landfills?
- Increasing the quality of garden soil by amending it with compost made from material which otherwise would be a costly addition to our waste stream?
- Enjoying the pleasurable feeling of knowing that you are making a difference?
- Being a role model for your family, friends and neighbors in being active with a simple solution to the many concerns related to **Food Waste**?

The communities of Readfield, Fayette and Wayne are providing a program which enables each of us to participate in addressing the environmental, social and financial concerns related to **Food Waste**. This initiative was launched in July of 2021 and we are working to ensure that all of our community will be able to participate in this win-win effort.

If you answered yes to any of the questions above, please take time to watch this 38-minute educational video https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eXDGQBsf07w highlighting the expertise of Mark King from the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. The video provides specific information on the current status of our local community food waste problems as well as simple steps to take that have an immediate positive impact in addressing these concerns. The Town of Wayne and the Cary Memorial Library are providing valuable support to your regional Solid Waste and Recycling Committee by handling the distribution of the mentioned compost buckets and we thank them wholeheartedly for their efforts.

We are also partnering with the University of Maine Mitchell Center for Sustainability Solutions (Food Rescue Maine: https://wmaine.edu/foodrescuemaine/) and the Maine DEP for technical support. We greatly appreciate their support and expertise. Their websites contain additional technical and educational material. Please note the excellent DEP website references at the end of the video.

If you are ready to join us in this effort, or have found that one bucket isn't enough in these freezing cold days, there are free high-quality tabletop or under-counter food waste buckets available which can be used to bring food waste to the Readfield Transfer Station for composting or for use in your own home composting. These are currently available at the Wayne Town office or at the Cary Memorial Library by request.

Additional in-person activities are planned for this summer and will be announced via the Town of Wayne Website, Facebook page, YouTube channel as well as through the Cary Memorial Library. HOW TO FIGHT ALGAE BLOOMS: BE LAKESMART!

Many people were concerned about this past summer's prolonged algae bloom on Androscoggin Lake, and have asked about they can do to preserve and protect the lake's water quality. There is a simple answer: Become Lakesmart!

Androscoggin Lake Improvement Corporation (ALIC) is your resource for participating in the Lakesmart Program. What is Lakesmart? It is an education and assistance program that rewards property owners on or near the lake who manage their landscapes to prevent erosion and keep stormwater runoff that has pollutants such as phosphorous from running into the lake. When a lake has too much phosphorous, it causes decrease water clarity, and leads to algae blooms that create floating mats of green scum on the water. Here are some of the ways that you can benefit from the Lakesmart Program:

- A trained ALIC volunteer will visit your property and do a free landscape evaluation focusing on ways that you can prevent untreated stormwater runoff from flowing into the lake, limit soil erosion, and beautify your property with natural landscaping methods.
- Your LakeSmart volunteer will suggest types of native shoreline plants and vegetation that will work well on your property to create a natural-looking filter to prevent stormwater runoff and reduce soil erosion into the lake. A natural shoreline buffer not only looks great, it can frame your shoreline view, and keep pollutants out of the lake.
- You will also receive individualized recommendations from the LakeSmart Toolkit practices and devices that you can implement or install on your property that will soak up the rain and prevent runoff (and phosphorus!) from flowing over the land and into the water.
- When your property is certified as Lakesmart, ALIC will award you with LakeSmart signs to display on your property, and a

native Maine blueberry bush that not only looks great but is a wonderful addition to your shoreline buffer.

It is never too early to start planning for summer projects. You can start the process of making your property more lake-friendly today. 


