Tip: Between now and mid-April before the caterpillar controls the population in the summer it is prudent to clip and destroy the overwintering webs by either soaking in water and detergent or burning.

My introduction as CEO/LPI and Update on Local Water Quality Issues

Hi all! My name is Chip Stephens. I have been the Towns of Readfield and Wayne's Code Enforcement Officer and Local Plumbing Inspector for almost a full year now, it has been enlightening to meet many of you and hear your concerns about Wayne's land uses, code enforcement and improving our regulations. The need to protect Wayne's lakes and water resources is at the top of the issues that I have been working hard to address.

Your team, at Wayne Town Office (WTO), including the Selectboard, Planning Board, Town Manager and the rest of us have been meeting and working on ideas and actions we can move forward with to meet the needs of shoreline preservation and enforcement. There already exists many extremely strict local, state, and federal regulations to work with and I am attempting to enforce them while seeking new ways to address your concerns. As Code Enforcement Officer, my direction and beliefs in enforcement are simple: enforcement by the rules and regulations while listening, encouraging cooperation, and always looking for a better way to accomplish goals. My mantra is "Try to play well together in the Sandbox."

Maine Shoreland Regulations were instituted back in the late 1970s, as were stricter subsurface (septic) regulations by the DEP and the State of Maine and have been utilized by municipalities to accomplish the goal of preservation of natural resources. Many of those regulations are incorporated into the Land Use Ordinances (LUO) of towns like Wayne and are enforced by the DEP and your local CEO/LPI (me). They are far from perfect and are always evolving as new threats are identified and weakness in the regulations need to be strengthened. Over the years the DEP, being stressed, some might say overwhelmed, by its mandate to protect the vast natural environmental resources of this large and beautiful state, many times has left enforcement to local officials.

With that all in mind your town leaders have assembled the following to update and meet challenges of today in Wayne:

The water quality of Androscoggin Lake and others has been challenged by Milfoil, Algae blooms, and other water quality issues. DEP, ALIC and the 30-Mile Water Association groups have played a key role in identifying and bringing these issues to enforcement and by addressing these issues with participation and education. We at WTO are looking to finalize specific efforts and new regulations:

A shoreland septic ordinance to strengthen our oversight over aging and failing septic systems that exist on our lakefront properties. It will require inspection of septic systems on sale or transfer of property with reporting to the local CEO. If all is in proper order in septic system, we will have a copy of the inspection report on file at Town Office, and if not in proper order we will require repair or replacement of the system prior to passing title.

If you have a malfunctioning septic system, there currently exists a grant program called the "Small Community Grant Program" through the Maine DEP to help individuals replace malfunctioning septic systems that are polluting a waterbody or causing a public nuisance. If you are interested in this program, please don't hesitate to contact me.

The Town is the just embarking on the long process of comprehensively updating its currents Land Use Ordinances in order to make them clearer to read and stronger for enforcement purposes.

An education program to enlighten residents and property owners of their responsibilities in maintaining septic, land management and growth (erosion and phosphorus control) and shoreland use. WTO will be launching a new web page on the WTO site which will provide educational links and materials. It should be a dynamic and up to date resource to aid in adherence to the regulations, helping landowners save their property investment and quality of Wayne's water resources.

Working with Lake Associations, Road Associations, and all stakeholders in Wayne to preserve and improve the water quality of Wayne's lakes is a high priority for me. This effort should include public meetings to work cooperatively to identify, isolate and respond to new or ongoing issues concerning our water resources.

I look forward to hearing your innovative ideas and cooperative suggestions in the future. COOPERATION and ACTION and not just COMPLAINING will be key to achieving our goals.

The WTO team has heard you and is addressing this challenge. To effectively meet it we all need to help, volunteer, and participate - not only in the initiatives mentioned above, but also by attending and participating in town Selectboard and Planning Board meetings and other local meetings and workshops, which occur monthly. We can make things better if we all work together positively.

Wayne, we hear you and we ask your help in our work to Preserve, Protect, and have Pride in all the natural gifts we have here for today and the future.

According to Jack Perkins', <u>Illustrated History of Wayne, Maine</u>, years ago our town was divided into 12 school districts, each with a schoolhouse, allowing students to walk shorter distances to school. In 1811 the North Wayne School had 84 students, and the Wayne Village School had 91. In 1864 there were nearly 400 pupils! These numbers included all grades through high school. Today we have only one elementary school in town, grades K-5. Do you know how many students are enrolled today?

PUMP OUT YOUR SEPTIC TANK

Septic tank sludge levels should be checked every two years. A tank should be pumped when it is half full or every two to three years for year-round residents and every three to four years for seasonal residents.

Septic tanks must be maintained to function properly. If settled solids are not removed from the tank, they will wash into and clog the leach field. A clogged leach field will cause the system to fail and require replacement.

Septic systems usually have a life span of 25 years or less. Do you know when your system was installed? If your system was put in after 1974, you can search through the State's records for septic systems here: https://www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/mecdc/septicplans/index.pl

To help prolong the life of your septic system: ·

Conserve water. The less water you use the better your septic system will work.

Be cautious with drain cleaners and use bleach sparingly. Sink plungers or drain snakes are inexpensive and more effective than chemical drain cleaners. Septic systems require living microorganisms to break down waste. Strong cleaning agents will kill these microorganisms and cause your system to fail.

Don't install or use in-sink garbage disposals. Ground garbage and food waste overburden septic systems and slow their functions. Composting vegetable scraps is good for the environment and improves soil.

Stay away from commercial products that claim to clean your septic tank without pumping. These products can contaminate groundwater and may clog your leach field.

Don't put paint or chemicals into septic systems. These hazardous products kill microorganisms and can contaminate drinking and lake water.

Have you noticed signs of a failing septic system?

- Do your toilets flush slowly or back up easily?
- Have you noticed a wet, smelly spot in your yard, especially after doing laundry?
- Is the grass over or around your septic system greener than the rest of your lawn?
- Is the area around your septic system or drain field wet even when it hasn't rained?

DO YOU CARE ABOUT ANDROSCOGGIN LAKE?

Many people were concerned about this past summer's algae bloom on Androscoggin Lake, which lasted more than two months. If you are wondering how you can help, one answer is to volunteer to be part of the first watershed survey of Androscoggin Lake in more than 20 years. With the support of the Towns of Wayne and Leeds, Androscoggin Lake Improvement Corporation (ALIC) and 30 Mile River Watershed have teamed up to plan a shoreline survey of the area around the lake. The survey will be done on May 12th and 13th, 2022. Phosphorus is the enemy of healthy lakes. A watershed survey identifies and prioritizes areas on or near the shoreline where there is soil erosion or stormwater runoff that loads more phosphorus into the lake and can trigger future algae blooms. Volunteers are needed! We will give you easy to understand training and support you need to be a survey volunteer. Parker Pond Headland Preserve Mud Season Trail Closure

Kennebec Land Trust's (KLT) Parker Pond Headland Preserve on Fellows Cove Road in Fayette is temporarily closed to hikers during mud season (mid March – April/May). Currently, the Fellows Cove Road is only open to homeowners to minimize the impacts on the road. During mud season, KLT recommends hikers visit the nearby Ezra Smith Conservation Area in Mount Vernon, Torsey Pond Nature Preserve or Rosmarin and Saunders Family Forest in Readfield or Hutchinson Pond in Manchester instead. However, please help take care of all our local trails by staying off them when they are muddy. 




