SAVE ANDROSCOGGIN: CAMPAIGN FOR A HEALTHY LAKE

What is a clean Androscoggin Lake with no milfoil and no algal blooms that turn the water green worth to you?

THE HELEN HICKS HEALY 2022 MEMORIAL AWARD


In 1974, Edward Healy established the Helen Hicks Healy Memorial Award, which was to be presented at the Wayne town meeting each year to the citizen (or citizens) who best exemplified the qualities he most admired in his late wife. He described her as a person "who gave so much to others" and "contributed more to the world than she took out of it." The award included a cash prize for the chosen resident or residents.

This year's Healy Award winner is Dallas Folk.

In 1976, the Town Meeting was still being held in the Town House on Main Street. A young Dallas Folk was sitting on the men's side of the meeting when someone in the gathering pointed him out and said, "You're in business; why don't you be on the Budget Committee?" Wayne has benefited from that idea for 46 budget seasons.

And in the mean-time, we have also benefited from his professional skills. Judy Danielson reports that she and Ken Bate had about 35 twohour meetings with Dallas as the project manager in the major effort to convert the Cary Memorial Library into the more beautiful and welcoming place it is today while maintaining its historical appearance.

Dallas fully deserves the 2022 Healy Award and the modest check that accompanies it. We here in Wayne are truly grateful for what he has done to make our town the beautiful village that it is.

Thank you to the over 60 residents and friends who contributed ~\$120,000 to the Ladd Recreation Center Court Restoration Project, to the Rec Center for their \$1000, to the Town of Wayne Residents for the \$40,000 from the Capital Reserve fund. The Rec Center is a town facility that George and Helen Ladd built in 1976 and deeded over to the town along with an annual contribution to help with annual expenses. The town accepted the property and is responsible for upkeep.

Our grassroots group is steering an effort to rebuild the Rec. Center courts that are becoming <u>unsafe</u> and <u>unplayable</u> due to cracking and heaving because of poor drainage. 70% of donations have come from current court users.

We plan to rebuild the courts within the current footprint to include two tennis courts and two pickleball courts, and form a committee to insure maintenance.

The current fundraising <u>unlocks the opportunity for</u> a federal matching grant application administered by the State of Maine Land and Water Conservation Fund, that we are working on with the Town Manager. The grant is due in late June. In 1988 we received a grant from the LWCF for the elementary school playground structure.

At present we are \$20,000 of our 50% goal for the matching grant. The current estimate for a <u>complete and lasting</u> fix is \$324,300, plus 10% contingency. Materials and shipping charges continue to increase the cost. Of course, we will seek several bids and use local subcontractors when possible!

Court Project. Contributions are tax deductible and will be acknowledged promptly. All funds will be used for the courts.
