

INTRODUCTION TO INSULATION

Meet Lily McVetty of Efficiency Maine

This is not a subject you want to be pondering on nice autumn days. But there is some new information that will interest all shoreland property owners. First, it is well known that on transfer of a property in the Shoreland Zone, a septic system inspection must be performed by a licensed professional, and a copy provided to the State. This spring, at Town Meeting, Wayne voters adopted a further requirement: that this report also be provided to the Town office for its files. Over time this will be a benefit, as realtors often ask for this information.

More troubling, though, is this: a leading pumping service tells us that they are often pumping septic tanks that are heavily overloaded with solids. Widely used antibacterial chemicals used in the home are flushed down drains. They are hindering decomposition. This means that more frequent pumping can be needed compared to years ago. Or, perhaps people are just waiting too long to get around to it. Do you know when yours was last pumped?

Recent news articles point out that treatment plants receiving the waste from the pumping services are going to raise their rates. This is due to new requirements for dealing with the "Forever Chemicals" that I'm sure you have read about. These cost increases will not be small change and will be passed on to property owners.

Still, pumping every 3 or 4 years is a good insurance policy, costing you less than \$100/year. There is more -we had ours pumped this spring. During the work, they detected a problem with our system that we quickly fixed. Had that gone undetected it would have had costly and disagreeable results.

Finally, while experts recommend pumping regularly, they advise against leaving a tank empty over the winter. On the Web, you can find ways to estimating how long a 1,000 gal. takes to fill.

Camp Roads and Our Lakes

Private dirt and gravel roads are an important and little recognized part of everyday life in Wayne. They provide access to a large number of year-round residences and seasonal camps on the many lakes and ponds so highly valued by all who live and visit Wayne. They traverse miles of diverse terrain, different soil types, slopes, and wetlands leading to the shoreland. Some are well planned, constructed, and maintained, others much less so, and some follow the same path that has been used for generations, including the cows and sheep that once roamed the hillsides. Those that cross hilly and steep terrain can be and often are severely eroded by rain and melting snow, most often by the combined actions of each, during spring thaws and freshets. In several areas, roads run straight down steep slopes for long distances. Over the years, the frequency of intense storms has increased. In many places, you will see gravel washed over the surface of shorefront roads. This is a clear sign that nutrients are entering the lakes.

The Town road system includes about 4 miles of gravel roads. All of these roads present a variety of environmental issues and maintenance challenges, to say nothing of the recurring cost and impact on the vehicles that traverse them. In a few instances, the roads are muddy and narrow so that modern fire trucks have difficulty getting down to the ends of them.

The 2016 Comprehensive Plan for Wayne dealt with this issue. 1. There is concern that stormwater runoff, particularly along private camp roads (many of which are not paved) may be negatively impacting Wayne's eight lakes and ponds through soil erosion/ sedimentation and phosphorous loading. Winter road maintenance, as well as road and ditch work, may also be contributing to the problem. The State boat launch needs some work. (p. 64)

Many of these roads service multiple shorefront property owners and traverse private land often owned by different landowners, according to right-of-way agreements established long ago. Such agreements are often vague, difficult to locate, if they can be found, or ever existed, and others are verbal permissions that are impossible to track. Few likely contain provisions regarding maintenance and other matters. Some private roads have no association to manage them.

These are among the many factors that present themselves when camp road problems and needs are discussed. The attached links provide some valuable information and address a variety of issues and considerations. The bloom last year on Androscoggin shows us that our lakes are affected by the landscape around them. Any one driveway, path to the lake, or informal boat launch means nothing. But the sum total of all of them is affecting the lakes.
