Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Happy New Year! Actually, the new year in the Christian church started in November on the first day of Advent. Advent is a season of preparation for the arrival of the Christ Child, our Messiah. If you think about it, that's the perfect time to start fresh – preparing for new life – because we all know that a baby changes everything! It just so happens that we get to talk about this baby for 12 days (yes, the 12 days of Christmas is a real thing). But then, the Church shifts its focus to the person that baby grew up to become and everything that he taught and did. Most especially, all the ways that Jesus shows us that true "love" is a verb – it requires intentionality and action.

Now I know that not all of the folks who receive the Messenger are Christian, but I think we can all agree that love requires intentionality and action. True love does not insist on grand gestures or extravagant gifts. In fact, love prefers thoughtfulness and many kind acts shown again and again over the course of time. In the 1st letter to the church in Corinth, (First Corinthians), St. Paul was chastising a church that had become divided over all kinds of things. They were caught in a cycle of quarrels and jealousy; whose teacher was better; who believed the "right" things. They were filing lawsuits against one another. They were having extra-marital affairs. They had lost sight of the purpose of our sacred rituals and the purpose of the spiritual gifts God had given each of them. Finally, in Chapter 13, Paul describes what true love looks like: patient, kind, not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude, not irritable or resentful, rejoices in the truth, bears all things and believes all things and hopes all things and endures all things. Love never ends. He explained that all of our bickering is over temporary things, but love is forever. So, which would you rather spend your time and energy on? Temporary divisions or Everlasting connections?

We get divided by all kinds of things, politics and religion being at the top of the list. And we need to be able to talk about them so that we can do important things together, like care for the Earth and provide for those in need. But we should not allow them to divide us to the point where we cannot act the way LOVE would have us act: with patience, kindness, vulnerability, honesty, truth-telling, hope, and endurance. As you know, at Wayne Community Church, we have adopted a vision: "Building Bridges of Healing and Hope." We don't always get it right, but we hope that you have seen some of the ways we are living out our intentionality to Love our Neighbors through action. In January, several of our projects will come to fruition that we hope will build even more bridges and inspire others to put their love into action. Our new A/V system installation will begin and we will be receiving a new piano for our sanctuary. Gifts from folks in the community have made both of these projects possible. I mentioned the A/V project in last month's Messenger. Today, we share our gratitude for David and Hazel Stevenson who donated the piano in loving memory of two Wayne saints: Priscilla B. Stevenson and Bertha L. Berry. We hope you stop by sometime and ask us about them (or see them for yourself) and keep checking www.waynemaineevents.com so you can join us for the consecration of the piano and a special summer concert being planned!

My prayer for us all in 2023, is that we give and receive LOTS OF LOVE!

It's 2023 already? I'm not yet ready for 2022!

We have a "Tripledemic" going around in Maine and across the country. 3 different viruses you should try to avoid. They are Influenza (Flu), RSV, and Covid 19. The flu is around every year, and it changes each year. It is not too late to get your flu shot. It is important! RSV is Respiratory Syncytial Virus, a virus you want to avoid and that is especially dangerous for older adults and those with chronic medical conditions, plus young children. Covid 19 you know about. It keeps changing. But it is important to be vaccinated and boosted to prevent Covid 19, and to prevent cases of Covid 19 from becoming severe. What helps prevent all 3 viruses? Wearing a mask whenever you are in a crowd. We want to keep you safe this winter season.

As for keeping you safe, we (AAH) have an air filtration system that we run whenever there is a group in our space. It filters viruses, allergens, mold, dust and smoke. The idea is to prevent anyone from getting sick from being exposed to the air here.

Our group would like to apply for a grant which would help cover the cost of increased accessibility for our elders at home. We would ask for things like wheelchair ramps, low-access showers, grab bars, and raised toilets. If you need some of these, please let us know by Sunday, January 1. Call or email. We need numbers before we can request these.

Change date for REAL ID. Just after I told you about the looming deadline for obtaining your REAL ID, they changed the deadline to May 7, 2025. So you have 2 more years than you had before. So keep it on your list, but disregard the urgency for now.

SAVE ANDROSCOGGIN: ALIC REPORT ON FALL 2022 LAKE LEVEL

An essential part of protecting Androscoggin Lake and improving water quality involves ongoing monitoring of and maintenance efforts at the Pollution Control Device located on the Dead River, which is more commonly referred to as the "Dead River Dam".

It is important to reduce lake levels in the fall months through outflow from Androscoggin Lake into Androscoggin River. Doing so is critical to maintaining a healthy lake because a lower lake level in the fall protects against the harmful effects of springtime flooding from the Androscoggin River. Spring floods increase shoreline erosion, threaten septic systems, and cause more debris stored near the shoreline (including docks and small boats!) to enter the lake.

Conditions this fall were especially challenging to keeping Androscoggin Lake's depth at a manageable level. Frequent and intense rains from October through early December kept the lake level higher than normal. These conditions occurred despite the work of a dedicated team to keep the Dead River Dam spillway clear of debris impeding outflow from the lake. At one point this fall, the Androscoggin River overtopped the Dead River Dam by 12-gauge feet due to hurricane-related rainstorms!

ALIC extends a special thanks to Ian Barclay and a hardworking group of volunteers who worked tirelessly throughout the fall to increase outflow from Androscoggin Lake through the Dead River Dam. Their work included frequent trips to the Dam to remove multiple trees and logs and large amounts of debris that prevented lake water from draining into Androscoggin River. Their dedication to this work means that we stand a better chance of protecting the lake from harmful springtime floods.

You can do your part to help protect Androscoggin Lake by making sure that you store boats, docks and other equipment well away from your shoreline and by regularly maintaining your septic system. 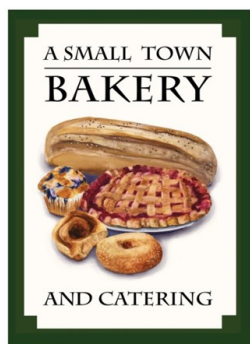
