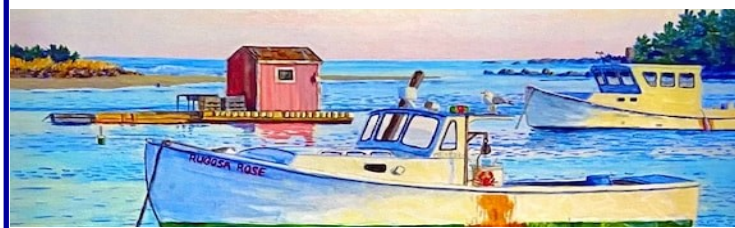

In observation of **Labor Day, Monday, September 4, 2022**, the Town Offices will be closed.

Your **2023 property taxes** will be committed on August 1st, and tax bills will be mailed at the end of August. Property taxes are due on **Saturday, September 30th, 2023**.

Please be courteous to your neighbors and drive responsibly. The Town has contracted with Kennebec County Sheriff's Office for rural patrol this summer. Police will take notice.

Several years ago, the Town adopted a **Consumer Fireworks ban**. Please respect this ban for everyone's safety and peaceful enjoyment of town.

The Town has an Animal Control Ordinance that states no domesticated animal, licensed or unlicensed, shall be permitted on Town property (highways, sidewalks, Ladd Recreation Center, parks, footbridge, Wayne Town House, North Wayne School House, Town Boat Launch, Fire Stations, or old Town Office) without a leash. The Town provides dog waste bags in the parks around the millpond, please be courteous to others

Update on the Property Tax Stabilization Program for Seniors.

The State of Maine legislature decided to sunset the **Property Tax Stabilization Program for Seniors** after one year. As a result, the Town cannot accept applications for the 2024 tax year. However, if you were accepted into the program, your 2023 tax bill will be frozen at the 2022 tax amount, the same as your 2022 tax bill.

If seniors are looking for tax relief going forward, the legislature has expanded the existing **Property Tax Fairness Credit** and **State Property Tax Deferral Program**. Browntail Moth Update

How can I prevent attracting browntail moth adults?

*Turn off unnecessary outdoor lights at night from July until the first week of August to dissuade moths from flying near your property.

*Consider switching to yellow-spectrum lights instead of the traditional cool white-colored lights as yellow bulbs are less attractive to adults.

If you already have browntail moth adults near you, you can put a HEPA filter into a wet/dry vacuum and fill the base of the vacuum with a few inches of soapy water. Vacuum the moths off the side of your house, porch, garage, or other surfaces. Leave them in soapy water for a few days before disposing of the vacuum contents.

Surface Use Restriction on Androscoggin Lake.

With water recreation activities in full swing, please remember to stay well away from the restricted area in the Inner Cove of Androscoggin Lake, not far from the public boat launch. The Surface Use Restriction is in place because invasive milfoil has been found there, and efforts are underway to contain and eradicate it. The area is well-marked, and there is a channel for passage if you need to access the dock for Cobbie's Corner Store. This means not casting fishing lines into the area as well. Fishing lures can catch on delicate stems, and risk spreading plant fragments that can quickly take root in other areas. Please inform your guests and renters as well, if applicable. SAVE ANDROSCOGGIN:

MID-SUMMER WATER QUALITY REPORT

Despite the challenges of persistent rain throughout much of July, the important work of the Save Androscoggin project to combat milfoil and future algae blooms has continued.

Using kayaks and scopes, the 30 Mile River Watershed survey team monitored the Inner Cove lake bottom approximately four days a week throughout July, depending on weather conditions, to detect the presence of invasive milfoil. As of mid-July, the survey team discovered five invasive milfoil plants, which were marked by buoys and removed by scuba divers trained in safe milfoil removal practices. No milfoil was discovered outside the surface area restriction zone.

With respect to water quality testing, clarity readings in mid-July showed a depth of 5.68 meters (over 15 feet). This clarity level was an improvement over the reading taken earlier in July. The 30 Mile River team and Androscoggin Lake Association (ALIC) volunteers are testing phosphorous levels every two weeks. This testing is important because phosphorous levels have a major impact on triggering algae blooms. Due to persistent high water conditions, the water quality testing team has been able to measure conditions down to a greater depth than is typical. Generally, testing shows that temperatures of the bottom layers of water in the lake are cooler than last year.

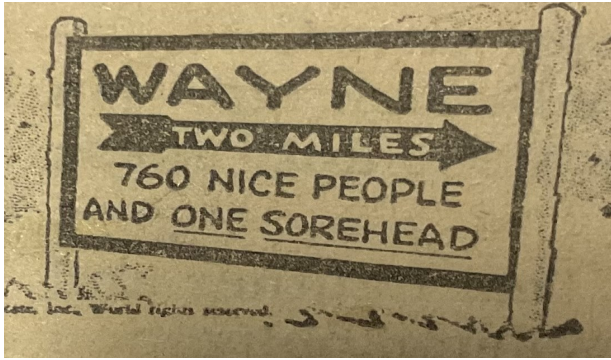
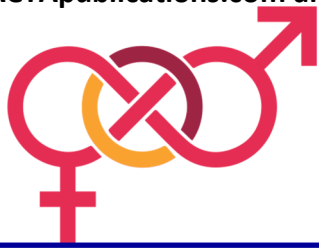

RECIPE CORNER

Bon Appetit!

Moroccan Lamb

- 2 1/2 lbs. lamb shoulder (or leg) boned and cut into 1 1/2-inch cubes
- 1/4 c. olive oil
- 4 sm. onions, peeled and quartered (or 1 lg.onion, chopped)
- 2 T. fresh ginger, chopped (or 2 tsp. ground)
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
- 3/4 c. raisins
- 1 (16 oz.) can chopped tomatoes with liquid
- 1/2 c. fresh parsley, chopped
- 1/2 tsp. salt (optional)
- 1/4 tsp. pepper, freshly ground
- 1/2 c. almonds with skins, sauteed in butter (optional)
- 2 eggs, hard boiled, chopped fine (optional)

Brown lamb in olive oil and set aside. Add onions, ginger, and garlic to drippings in pan and saute for 5 minutes or until onion is golden brown. Cover raisins in hot water and set aside. Return lamb to pot and stir in tomatoes, parsley, salt and pepper. Cover pot and simmer for 1 hr and 15 min, stirring occasionally, until meat is tender. When meat is done, drain raisins and add to the pot of meat. Garnish with almonds, chopped egg, and minced parsley.

Nonprofit Offers Insulating Window Inserts for Energy Savings and a Warmer Home

The nonprofit organization **WindowDressers** provides insulating window inserts that fit inside a home’s existing windows, to let in all the sunlight and views while keeping more heat inside the home. The inserts are high quality and low cost because they are built at barn-raising-style Community Builds across Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire. Everyone who orders inserts also participates in the Community Build.

Local WindowDressers volunteer teams in Winthrop, Manchester, and Hallowell are accepting orders now for the fall Community Build season. The Winthrop Build is sponsored by Winthrop Area Rotary Club and will take place October 27 – November 1, 2023, at Winthrop Middle School, 400 Rambler Rd, Winthrop. The Manchester-Hallowell Build is sponsored by Manchester Conservation Commission and Hallowell Conservation Commission in partnership with Capital Area New Mainers Project, and will take place November 3 – 8, 2023, at the Hallowell Multicultural Center, 20 Union St., in Hallowell.

The inserts are built of attractive pine frames and wrapped drum-tight with two layers of durable plastic film. These layers create an insulating air space while letting in all the light and views. Foam weather-stripping around the outer edges stops drafts and ensures the insert’s snug fit. Depending on the efficiency of your windows and home, you could see fuel savings of up to 20% with inserts in place.

Once you sign up, trained volunteers will schedule a time to measure your windows for the custom-built inserts. Then, you and other community volunteers will gather to build the inserts at the Community Build near you.

For people who are experiencing financial hardship, WindowDressers offers up to 10 inserts per year for no-cost. For middle and high income homes and businesses, the price is a fraction of the cost of similar commercial products. Pricing is based on the exact size of the insert to cover the cost of materials. A medium-sized 30” x 52” insert in pine costs \$48.50 plus tax.

The deadline for having your windows measured is around September 30, 2023, so interested households in any community should sign up right away at www.WindowDressers.org or call (207) 596-3073. Orders will be assigned to the Winthrop or Manchester-Hallowell Build or to a build closer to your home.

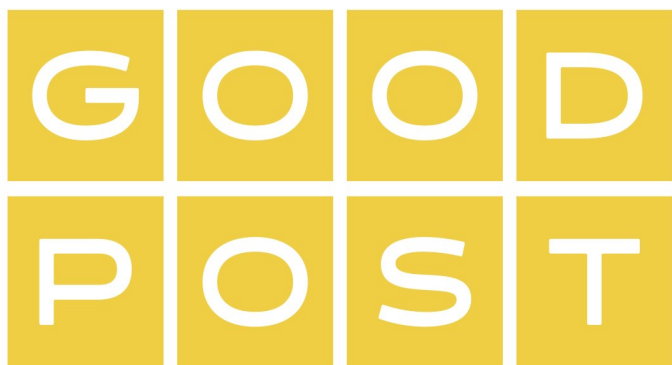

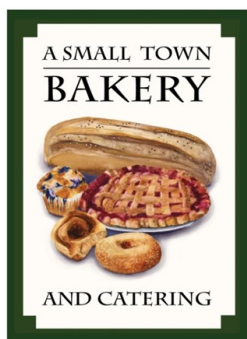
