How to Identify and Remove Oriental Bittersweet

If you haven't noticed there maybe, and probably is, a very invasive woody vine growing out of your rock walls and forest edge, and onto nearby shrubs and trees. This is Oriental (Asiatic) Bittersweet, introduced from Asia for ornamental purposes, which is rapidly spreading and dominating the landscape in sections of Wayne. It can be found sprawling over rock walls, forest edges, and old fields. Its woody stem winds up nearby tree trunks and shrubs, and once in the overstory invades the crown, choking its host from sunlight, often resulting in the death of the tree. The spiraling woody vine, often over one inch in diameter, also chokes the flow of essential fluids moving up and down the tree. Younger pioneering plants simply sprawl over nearby ground vegetation. If left unchecked, it eventually becomes a dominant feature of the landscape, and completely disrupts many natural functions.

Control over this very invasive plant is difficult, and eradication is often impossible. It requires concentrated attention to infested areas and may take several years to get things under control. Cutting the woody stems at ground level, will kill the vine above. However, it will quickly sprout new shoots. If you can pull the roots out, all the better, but this is often not possible. Cut stems at ground level and young plants can be treated with a herbicide such as Round-Up. The only other way to starve the roots is to routinely remove any sprouts and pioneering plants as best you can and keep sprouts from growing up into nearby trees and shrubs. Smaller plants coming up elsewhere need to be cut, pulled up, or frequently mowed to bring under control the annual regeneration and starve the roots.

If you have newly established plants, remove them as quickly as possible, including the roots. Repeated mowing will help keep things under control. If you have widespread occurrence of vines in trees, focus on these, especially in areas considered high priority. Don't expect complete eradication, and focus on keeping the vines out of trees, shrubs, and stone walls as much as possible.

The Bittersweet vine may at first appear to be a pretty addition to the landscape, with its colorful red/orange fall berries which are sought after for holiday decorations. However, its very invasive nature will eventually have a significant impact on the landscape. Long-term perseverance is the only way to control this pest. There are no quick fixes.

RECIPE CORNER

Lemon Meringue Pie

Lemon Pie

 1 1/2 C. sugar
 3

 1/3 C. cornstarch
 1/

 1 1/2 C. water
 1

 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 1

3 T. butter 1/4 c. lemon juice 1 T. grated lemon rind 1 9-in. baked pie shell

Mix sugar and cornstarch in saucepan. Gradually stir in water. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Boil 1 minute. Slowly stir at least half the hot mixture into egg yolks. Then blend into hot mixture in saucepan. Boil 1 minute longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Continue stirring until smooth. Blend in butter, lemon juice and rind. Pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue.

Pie Meringue 3 egg whites 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar 6 T. sugar

1/2 tsp. flavoring (vanilla or almond)

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until frothy. Gradually beat in sugar, a little at a time, until dissolved. Continue beating until stiff and glossy. Do not beat! Beat until sugar is dissolved. Beat in flavoring. Pile meringue onto hot pie filling, being careful to seal the meringue to the edge of the crust to prevent shrinking . Swirl or pull up points for decorative top. Bake 8-10 mins. Until delicately browned. Cool away from drafts.

Note: When I baked my first lemon pie, the lemon filling was very "runny" prompting my husband to say, "Tastes great! Pour me another piece!" Turns out there is a difference between corn starch and corn syrup! Be sure to use corn starch.


