

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INTRODUCTION

The Annual Regional Analysis is a set of facts to inform community dialogue and district planning.

The purpose of the Annual Regional Analysis (ARA) is to support CPS's goal of providing every student with a high-quality education in every neighborhood by giving stakeholders a consistent array of information regarding school quality, enrollment patterns, school choice, and program offering by region. The goal is to ensure every student in Chicago has reasonable access to quality public schools and a variety of schools and programs.

The report includes information on all CPS schools, including traditional neighborhood, selective enrollment, magnet, charter, special education specialty, and Options (alternative) schools.


This document is a common fact base from which to understand the school landscape in communities. The intent of the ARA is not to provide recommendations but rather a set of findings based on the data that serves as an input to inform community dialogue and district planning.

STRUCTURE & ORGANIZATION

The ARA is organized in 16 geographic regions, aligned with Chicago Neighborhoods Now planning zones. The regions were created by the City of Chicago's Department of Planning and Development based on research on housing and jobs. They are defined with natural boundaries, such as rivers and railroads, in mind. These elements, as well as transportation options, are likely considerations for families in choosing schools. With the goal of utilizing a consistent structure year to year, these regions are more stable than city wards and school networks.


In addition to the regional structure, the ARA is organized to better understand what families and communities need in terms of school options. To best answer that question, data is provided in four areas:





KEY FINDINGS



- There are 47 schools, 15 of which are Level 1+/1. 20 are Level 2+, 11 are Level 2, and none are Level 3.
- 38% of elementary students who live in the region attend a Level 1+/1 school, 49% of high school students attend a Level 1+/1 high school, and 38% of Options high school students are enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools.
- There are more than 2,700 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats and more than 1,200 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats.
- 100% of Level 1+/1 elementary seats are in schools with no admissions criteria. Of Level 1+/1 high school seats, 42% are in schools with schoolwide admissions criteria and 58% are in schools that have some programs with admissions criteria.



- The student population in the region is 16,959, which has dropped by 8.8% (approximately 1,600 students) since the 2015-16 school year. This is a greater decline than the decline in the total student enrollment of 7.9%.
- In the same time frame, enrollment in schools in the region had a greater decline (approximately 3,200 students, or 14.0%).
- There are 15.800 more seats than students enrolled in the region.


- 33% of students in this region attend their zoned school, 35% of students attend a non-zoned school in the region and 32% of students attend a non-zoned school out of the region.
- 26% of elementary students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel less than one mile and 34% travel for less than 15 minutes. 53% of high school students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel more than three miles and 24% travel for more than 45 minutes.



- The region has World Language, Regional Gifted Centers/Classical, Academic Centers, Elementary International Baccalaureate (IB) and Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM) programs for elementary students. The region does not have Personalized Learning, Fine & Performing Arts, and Dual Language options for elementary students.
- For high school students, there are IB, Career & Technical Education (CTE), Military
 Academy, JROTC (Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps), Selective Enrollment,
 Personalized Learning, and Fine & Performing Arts programs. There is no Early College
 STEM option in the region.



MAP



The Bronzeville/South Lakefront region is generally bounded by the Stevenson Expressway to the north, Lake Michigan to the east, 67th St to the south, and the Dan Ryan Expressway to the west, and is bisected by the CTA Green Line. The region is home to 127,300 residents and is served by 19 transit stops.





DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION

The Bronzeville/South Lakefront region is consistently majority African American

The racial/ethnic composition of the Bronzeville/South Lakefront Student population is majority African American, although in the past four years the share of African American students has dropped slightly from 93% to 92%. The percentage of students qualified for Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) has dropped from 81% to 78% in the past four years, which is around the district total percentage of 77%.

RACIAL/ETHNIC COMPOSITION






FREE AND REDUCED LUNCH RATES






The Bronzeville/South Lakefront region primarily encompasses neighborhoods with low to medium median household incomes, with pockets of higher-income neighborhoods in Hyde Park and Kenwood.

HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?

There are 30 elementary schools in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region, including 4 Level 1+ schools, 6 Level 1 schools, 13 Level 2+ schools, 6 Level 2 schools, and 1 Inability to Rate school.


There are 21 zoned elementary schools in this region. 20% of elementary students residing in this region live in the attendance boundaries of Level 1+/1 schools.



HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?


There are 13 high schools in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region, including 1 Level 1+ school, 3 Level 1 schools, 4 Level 2+ schools, and 5 Level 2 schools. In addition, there are 4 Options high schools (1 Level 1 and 3 Level 2+).

There are 4 zoned high schools in this region. 30% of high school students residing in this region live in the attendance boundaries of Level 1+/1 schools






HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?



There are currently 47 schools in the region, including 30 elementary schools, 13 high schools, and 4 Options high schools. The number of Level 1+/1 schools has risen from 14 to 15 in the past four years, although last year (2017-18) it was a high of 21. The number of Level 2 schools has dropped from 21 to 11 in the past four years.





OPTIONS HIGH SCHOOL



The decline in number of seats overall from 2017-18 to 2018-19 was driven primarily by the change in how building capacity is determined (see note below). The percentage of Level 1+/1 elementary seats has fluctuated slightly over the past four years and is now at the same level as 2015-16. The percentage of Level 1+/1 high school seats has dropped slightly to 30% in 2018-19. The percentage of Level 1 Options seats has fluctuated greatly and is at 19% for 2018-19.



NOTE: In 2018-19, an update to the CPS space utilization standards resulted in a reduction in the number of classrooms used in the calculation of ideal capacity of a school building. Special education cluster program classrooms, Pre-K classrooms, and small-sized classrooms are no longer included in the number of seats. Due to rounding, some charts may not add up to 100%.




HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?



The percentage of elementary students who live in the region and attend Level 1+/1 schools has fluctuated between 39% and 53% during the past four years and has now dropped to 38%. The percentage attending Level 2 schools has decreased from 41% to 20% in the past four years and the percentage attending Level 3 schools has dropped from 6% to 0% (52 students).

In the 2018-19 school year, 49% of 9th- 12th grade students who live in the region are attending a Level 1+/1 school, up from 43% during the 2015-16 school year. The percentage of students who live in the region and attend a Level 2 school has dropped from 32% to 26% in four years.




In the past four years, there has been a decrease in enrollment in Options high school for students in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region. The percentage enrolled in Level 1+/1 Options schools has increased the past four years. Last year, however, there was a decrease of students who attend Level 1+/1 Options schools, from 47% to 38%.






HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?




DO STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS?



There are 3,120 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 5,676 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 2,102 students enrolled in Level 2 schools. There are 2,760 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region.


ADMISSION TYPE OF LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS

HIGH SCHOOL



There are 3,162 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 1,459 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 2,446 students enrolled in Level 2 schools. There are 1,230 unfilled Level 1+/1 seats.

ADMISSION TYPE OF LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS



Of all Level 1+/1 seats in the region, 42% are in schools with admissions criteria and 58% are in schools that have some programs with admissions criteria. None of the 1,230 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats are in schools that have no admissions criteria.





The number of students who live in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region has dropped by approximately 1,600 students (8.8%), which is greater than the 7.9% districtwide decline. The K-8th grade region population has decreased by 6.8% (compared to the 8% decrease in K-8th grade enrollment districtwide) and the 9th-12th grade region population has decreased by 8.8% (compared to the 4.8% decrease in 9th-12th grade student





The number of students enrolled in the region has dropped by more than 3,200 students (14.0%), which is much steeper than the student population decline in the region. However, for the past four years, there have consistently been more students enrolled in the region than live in the region. K-8 enrollment has dropped by 13.6% and 9-12 enrollment has decreased by 14.4%.








Of the 10,899 elementary students residing in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region, 38% attend a Level 1+/1 school. 21% of students who attend their zoned school go to a Level 1+/1 school; for students who attend a non-zoned school in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region, that number rises to 37%, and for students who leave the region, that number is 64%.





Of students who live in the region, Asian students attend school out of the region at the highest rate (52%). Most students in the region are African American and 27% of them attend school out of the region.

SCHOOL QUALITY OF STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY




African American students who attend school out of the region attend Level 1+/1 schools at a lower rate (61%) than Hispanic students (76%) and White students (86%).




33% of elementary students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1 or a Level 2+ school. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract schools or another zoned school in the region.

28% of elementary students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1+/1 school. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract schools or another zoned school outside the region.

61% of elementary students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 26% stay within one mile of their home and 40% travel more than three miles. The majority of students (65%) travel 30 minutes or less for school.


DISTANCE TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL

TIME TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL





BRONZEVILLE / SOUTH LAKEFRONT: OUT OF REGION "CHOICE FOOTPRINT" (K-8TH)



ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?

In the 2017-18 school year, CPS launched a new high school application process, GoCPS, which created a single application and timeline for all high schools. Only high school programs that require an application for admissions are included. Applicants were asked to rank the schools and programs on their application in order of preference. Students are guaranteed a seat in the general education program at their zoned/neighborhood high school and did not have to submit an application for that program. 
% OF 8TH GRADE STUDENTS WHO APPLIED TO HIGH SCHOOL


% OF STUDENTS WHO RECEIVED AN OFFER FROM ONE OF THEIR TOP 3 **CHOICES**


SCHOOL CHOICE OVER TIME



School choice is currently defined as attending a school that is not a student's zoned school. Over the past four years in this region, high school students attending a non-zoned school (in or out of region) has decreased from 79% to 77%. In the same time frame, students attending their zoned school has increased from 22% to 23%.





Of the 4,525 high school students residing in the region, 49% attend a Level 1+/1 school. For students attending school out of the region, 51% attend a Level 1+/1 school; for students attending a non-zoned school in the region, that number is 42%. 55% of students attending their zoned school attend a Level 1+/1 school.






Most high school students in the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region are African American; however, African American students attend school out of the region at the lowest rate (41%). 76% of Asian students and 69% of White students attend school out of region.

African American students who attend school out of region attend Level 1+/1 schools at the lowest rate – 47% attend Level 1+/1 schools, compared to 95% of White students and 71% of Hispanic students




34% of high school students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 2+/2 schools. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract or Selective Enrollment schools in the region.

43% of high school students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend Level 1+ and Level 2+ schools. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract or Selective Enrollment schools outside the region.

77% of high school students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 53% travel more than three miles for school and 26% travel more than six miles. 52% of students who do not attend their zoned school travel for less than 30 minutes while 24% travel for more than 45 minutes.


DISTANCE TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL

TIME TRAVELED TO SCHOOL IF NOT ATTENDING ZONED SCHOOL





DO STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO THE VARIETY OF SCHOOLS AND PROGRAMS OFFERED?

PROGRAM DENSITY: The Program Density Index measures the "density" of certain academic programs in each region. The index is calculated as the number of program seats per 100 age-eligible CPS students who reside in the region; this index can be used to compare program availability across regions. For high school programs, this index is calculated using the number of seats available for 9th grade via the GoCPS application process and the number of 9th graders who reside in the region. 

DO STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO THE VARIETY OF SCHOOLS AND PROGRAMS OFFERED?

In the 2017-18 school year, CPS launched a new high school application process, GoCPS, which created a single application and timeline for all high schools. Only high school programs that require an application for admissions are included. Applicants were asked to rank order the schools and programs on their application in order of preference. Students are guaranteed a seat in the general education program at their zoned/neighborhood high school and did not have to submit an application for that program. These graphs show high school program choices that were ranked No. 1, 2, or 3 by applicants in Round 1 of the GoCPS application process. This data does not include applications to selective enrollment high schools. These graphs compare the number of applications to different programs and the total number of programs in their region and outside of their region. The applications to programs within the region are contingent on the availability of programs.




Of the Top 3 Choice applications from 8th grade students in the Bronzeville / South Lakefront region, 35% were to programs within region.

Of the applications to programs out of region, general education and CTE programs had the highest number of applications. Those programs are also the most prevalent. The majority of applications to programs outside of the region were to programs in Level 1+/1 schools for all types of programs, except for general education.


HOW MANY PRE-KINDERGARTEN SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT POPULATION?






HOW MANY PRE-KINDERGARTEN SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT **POPULATION?**





In the Bronzeville/South Lakefront region, there has been an increase of 449 full-day seats over the past four years, a 77% increase.








