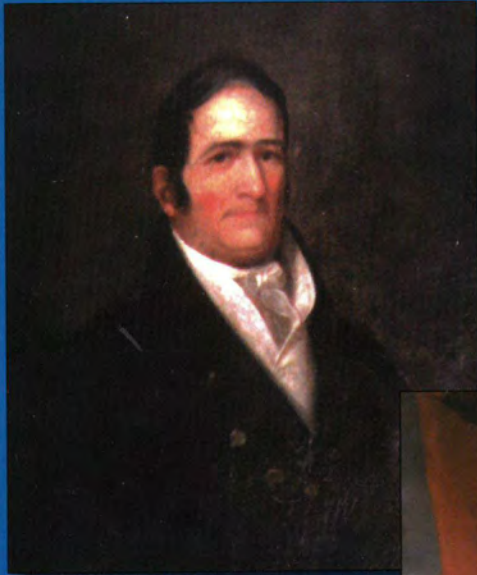
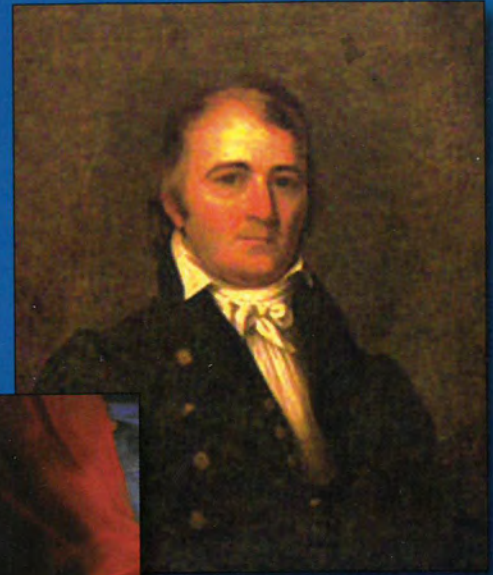

## Editor's Note

This is the forty-first issue of the Williamson County Historical Society's annual journal. For those who are fortunate enough to own all the volumes, the reader will notice an evolution has transpired over the years. The early volumes were produced on manual typewriters and duplicating machines. With the advent of computers, word processing, and the use of commercial printing, the journal has advanced to the 21<sup>st</sup> century. This marks the first time color printing has been used to fully capture the many beautiful portraits presented in this survey.

In 1991 the Williamson County Historical Society hosted an exhibit of local portraits in the present dining-room and office at Carnton Plantation. The portrait of Carrie Winder McGavock had been cleaned by Cumberland Conservators in Nashville and was returning to Carnton after many years in the Hattie McGavock Cowan family. Several portraits of Mrs. McGavock's contemporaries were borrowed and hung in the unrestored rooms to stage a "welcome home party" for the "Widow of the South."

The portraits in this survey were derived from the 1991 exhibit, along with the Colonial Dames' sponsored "Tennessee Portraits Project", and a renewed search throughout the community. This survey contains over 200 oil paintings and over 140 pencil and charcoal drawings. Unfortunately, several of the portraits are unsigned making it difficult to identify the artist. The 19<sup>th</sup> century portrait paintings of Ralph E.W. Earle, Washington B. Cooper, William B. Cooper, John W. Dodge, and George Dury are well represented in this survey. The wealthy families of the county, most notably, the Maury, Perkins, McGavock, Pointer, Cannon, Bostick, Glass, McEwen, Starnes and Watson, treasured the images of themselves and their forbearers. The gold and grained frames also speak to the family's station in society.

Prussian artist Nicola Marschall (1829-1917) was in Franklin in 1877 and 1878, leaving a signed copy of an unidentified lady. The portraits of Robert James Gordon, H.S. and Sallie Ewing are attributed to him as well. A portrait of Gen. N.B. Forrest by Marschall hangs in the Tennessee State Museum.

In 1890, Emma Lundgren, a native of Sweden and trained in Paris, came to Franklin to teach art. Mademoiselle Lundgren, as she was affectionately called, struggled to support herself with 25-cent art lessons and commissions painting portraits and still life. In the same period, Lizzie Galbreath, an art teacher at the Tennessee Female College, worked in pastels, leaving two examples for this survey—Mary Nichols Britt and Robert F. Cotton. Also, Franklin was fortunate to have Maggie Jewell, Mary James Montgomery and Shelley Snow as resident artists in recent times.

From 1966 until 1968, *The Review Appeal* featured each week, *Portrait of An Excellent Citizen*, a drawing in pencil. The artist Bill Duke, as attributed by his signature, managed to draw 136 local personalities. However, the editor failed to introduce the artist at the beginning of the series and, surprisingly, ended the project without fanfare or recognizing Duke. Today, the identity of Bill Duke remains a mystery, beside the fact that he also served as a staff artist for the *Nashville Tennessean*. As you will see, Duke captured their likeness with skill.

A word of thanks is due the portrait owners who have allowed their treasures to be included in this survey. Hopefully, other portraits will be forthcoming and a more complete study of local artists may be realized in the future.

Artist Drops Brush To Resume Her Work No more

Of the series of deaths that have transpired in Franklin this spring, perhaps no one of them has so touched the public as the sudden death of Mademoiselle Emma Lundgren, which occurred at 6:15 p.m. Monday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hendricks on Cummins Street.

During the four weeks of her illness, hopes had been entertained of recovery, and when the end came suddenly from heart failure it was a shock to those interested in her welfare.

The funeral exercises were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday in the Presbyterian Church, of which she was a devoted member, Dr. Lynn Walker officiating, and the body was laid to rest in the family plot of Mrs. Atha Thomas at Mt. Hope cemetery.

The deceased was born in Stockholm, Sweden, sixty-nine years ago, and at the time of her death had no near living relatives.

She came to this country from France with the family of B.F. Wilson, of Nashville, and a year later, 1890, came to Franklin to procure work, and made her home here since.

In early life she left her native country to study in the great Julian School of Art in Paris, France, and remained there twelve years, and knew personally many of the great artists of that day, especially Whistler, the head of the school of expressionists.

She used to visit Rosa Bonheur, the animal painter, in her chateau near Paris, and told many interesting stories about the artist.

Of many of the noble families of Europe in whose homes she painted miniatures, she has talked entertainingly on rare occasions.

In several capitals of the Balkan States she pursued her artistic employment in the palatial homes of noble families. At one time, presumably before she left Stockholm for Paris, she was private secretary to the Swedish prima donna, Christine Neilson.

Indeed, mademoiselle Lundgren was a woman of talent, culture and refinement, whom to once know well was to love and admire.

Here in Franklin are many who cultivated the friendship of her, who, "though a stranger within our gates" was yet akin to all those of refined sensibilities and artistic appreciation.

A monument to her talent are the many oil portraits by her brush to be found in the homes of this county. Among them are those portraits of Dr. and Mrs. Cochrane, Mrs. Atha Thomas, Mr. and Mrs. Lysander Hayes, the life-size portraits of Mr. and Mrs. O'Neil Perkins and many others scattered in Franklin homes are a number of beautiful canvasses of flowers.

In miniature portraits in ivory she was at her best in the days when she was at the zenith of its power.

Lastly, this dear little Swedish woman was also a poet in soul, producing at times the most exquisite bits of verse a few of which remain in the possession of her friends.

And how that she, so long a familiar figure, will walk our ways no more, there comes a sense of loss, as when one suddenly drops a jewel that cannot be found again.

Now that we have seen over 350 portraits of Williamson Countians in a visual form, let us read a word-portrait of our beloved county written by Dr. William Martin Clark, who was also one of the images in this survey. While visiting my friend, Ridley Wills, recently, I noticed on his bookshelf a bound volume of the *Rural Sun*, an agricultural newspaper of 1873 for Tennessee farmers. Ridley kindly loaned me the volume to read and this article seemed worthy of sharing. Dr. Clark may be remembered mainly for his Triune Monster Snake story he wrote as editor of the *Nashville Republican Banner* in 1868. He is credited with ghost writing J.B. Killibrew's *Geology of Tennessee*.

### Williamson County

By W.M. Clark

*Rural Sun*

March 13, 1873

#### Situation and Organization

Williamson County is situated principally in the great Limestone Basin of Middle Tennessee; the extreme western portion is on the Rim or Highlands. It is the third county in Middle Tennessee, and the fourth in the State in point of wealth and fertility of soil, and the citizens are correspondingly intellectual and social. Go where you will, by the way, rich lands make rich people, and rich people make school-houses and churches, and these conspire to make in their turn the people generous, hospitable and intelligent.

The county was named for General Hugh Williamson, of North Carolina, a revolutionary hero, and was cut off from Davidson County under the act of General Assembly, on the 26th October, 1799. Henry Rutherford, after whom was named the well known creek in the southern part of the county, and John Davis, were commissioners appointed for the purpose of dividing the two counties.

John Johnson, Sr., Daniel Perkins, James Buford, William Edmiston, and Capt. James Scurlock, were appointed commissioners to select a site for the county seat. Abram Maury, however, having laid off the town of Franklin on his own land, and having made favorable propositions to the General Assembly, they accepted, and the assembly appointed Abram Maury, John Walthall, Joseph Porter, William Boyd, and Daniel McEwen, commissioners to regulate said town. The first County Court was held on Monday, 3rd February, 1800, in Franklin, at the house of Thomas McKay. John Johnson, Sr., James Buford, James Scurlock, Chapman White, and Daniel Perkins composed the court. Nicholas Perkins Hardeman was elected clerk, Edmond hale sheriff, and Chapman White register. Francis Hall was also solicitor of the court, and Joseph Porter ranger, a necessary office in those days of general pasturage. Joel Dillard and John Harris were the constables for the county, enough then and enough now. In the Register's office the first entry is the stock mark of Wm. Devers, "a crop in the right ear and a slit in the same." The contrast may be better known by stating that now we have W.E. Winstead, Clerk and Master of Chancery Court; Col. Thomas F. Perkins, Jr., Clerk County Court; M.L. Andrews, Clerk of Circuit Court for forty years; B.F. Loftin, Register; Henry Cook, Judge County Court; R.A. McCaul, Tax Collector; H.P. Fowlkes, W.H. House and R.N. Richardson, Notaries Public; and R.A. Toon, Sealer of Weights and Measures; and besides there are three deputy sheriffs, twenty-two constables, forty-five magistrates, a poor house keeper, a jailor, three judges to put them in jail, and a regiment of subalterns—all good and true men, or we would not have them.

The County lost the 23rd and 24th districts, a few years ago, because Murfreesboro had the enterprise to run a turnpike to Eagleville; and, gentlemen of Franklin, you will lose three more districts unless you awaken from your lethargy, for even now, like the great cuttle-fish, Murfreesboro is pushing out her long arms to grasp Nolensville, Triune and College Grove. The census of 1870 gave us a population of 25,328, of which 13,917 were white and 11,411 colored. Like some bragging cities I know of, we don't however believe it is correct, we think it ought to be, and is, at least, 10,000 more.

#### The Surface and the Soil

Although this county is in the Basin, it is by no means level, for it is almost in its whole extent rolling, while in a portion of it hills reach almost to the dignity of mountains, but we call them "knobs." This circumstance gives to the county its peculiar excellence, for while the soil is of the richest throughout, (except the Rim,) it does not lack for good wholesome water, and a great abundance of creeks is the result.

Besides, we want no underdraining, for owing to the great dept of soil a sufficient quantity of gravel (I believe you call it chert) is intermixed to allow all the water that falls to pass off without making gullies. The soil is black loam on the hills, and on the bottoms it is alluvium.

### Rocks and Streams-Productions

Now I intended to give you a learned discourse on the geology of the soil, but the girls have got hold of my paper containing Dr. Safford's discourse on the Basin, and all my knowledge of that science, and so I can only say that our rocks are just like those at Nashville, occasionally we have sandstone, whether "Old Red," I cannot say, and on some of the hills a few slate or shale rocks make their appearance. Across the southeastern corner is a large group of hills called the "Cove," and here on the land of Mr. Robert Owen, (now cut off to Rutherford) rises the Big Harpeth, which, with its family of Harpeths and their tributaries, carries off all the surplus water and empties it into the Cumberland, and you can judge of the energy with which it goes by the shoals it has made across that river. We have Big Harpeth, Little Harpeth, West Harpeth, South Harpeth, and Harpeth itself. Besides these there are a great many small creeks pervading the county in every direction, thus making it one of the very best stock counties in the State. Near Nolensville we have a lead mine that promises much, but pays nothing.

The soil produces to great perfection all the small grains—corn and cotton on the uplands, while the alluvial bottoms, on all the streams, are finely adapted for corn and meadows, and our people are fast falling into the idea of producing their own hogs and stock, but we had no idea of giving up cotton, for outside the great cotton belt of the South, no land is better adapted to the residence of "His Majesty."

There is a large and remarkable range of knobs running through the 18th and 19th districts. They are very steep, so much so that frequent landslides take place, and so tall you can have a fine view of the Capitol, twenty miles away, and the country rolling like waves of the ocean between. The north side drops off at once into the plain below, by the south side sends out spurs every mile, or less, that gradually lead southward until they lose themselves in the broken land. Between these spurs are steep, almost inaccessible "hollows" with a "branch" at the bottom, but no valleys, worthy of the name.

Now one would suppose these, "grim monsters of the skies" were uninhabited, but it would be a great mistake, for this was one of the earliest settled places in the county. The Manskoes and Maupins passed over all the beautiful bottoms on the Cumberland, and perched their huts on these eminences, three or four hundred feet above the surrounding country, like the eagle in his rocky eyrie, for health. And they got it, for Geo. Maupin lived until a few years ago, and died at or near the place where he first settled on his own dear Switzerland at the ripe age of 100 years. The inhabitants devotedly attached to their homes, and when a piece of land is offered for sale, a ready purchaser awaits it. Although they are cut off by the hills form intimate intercourse with the balance of the county, they are perfectly well able to take care of themselves. They are the most independent, social, jovial citizens we have, and hospitable to the last degree. The land does no wash, though hillsides are cultivated up which no horse could pull a plow. On this ridge lives also a Frenchman, Mr. J.G. Didiot, formerly Professor of mathematics in the University of Paris, who had to leave France on account of a slight difference of opinion with "L.N., the 3rd. He is cultivating the grape with great success, and some of the neighbors, stimulated by his example, are doing the same. He is preparing to make brandy. This ridge is so thoroughly suited to the growth of the grape that it will become a great country at no distant period of time. And what better soil could grapes have—a black rich soil, killed with gravel to drain it, with any kind of exposure your fancy might wish, and then so far above the mists and damp of the surrounding country, that no frosts can injure the earliest blooms. Besides apple and peach grow here in unfailling abundance.

On this ridge again lives a plain, unassuming farmer, who is destined to effect a great revolution in the cultivation of soil. He has invented a machine to drill or drop manure, however lumpy or full of straw, just where you want it, and in any desired quantity, thus enabling a renter to manure his ground and exhaust it on his own crops, and besides he can prepare four or five acres in one day. Mr. John W. York has been persuaded to apply for a patent, and I hope he will reap rich reward for his invention. As to the productions of the county, they are all such as thrive in a temperate climate, and you will see from the census report

appended, they are not inconsiderable, and though not claiming to be a "banner county" in any article, let the price of corn, wheat, bacon or cotton take a sudden rise, and you will see the wagons thundering down the pikes leading to Nashville, and filling your streets until your "Nationals" cry "hold enough."

The growth is oak, ash, poplar, elm, walnut, dogwood, etc., but across the eastern side of the county is a large belt of cedar that furnishes the balance of the county with rails.

The county seat, Franklin, is situated on the Big Harpeth, 18 miles from Nashville, in the center of an exceeding fertile country. It contains a population of fifteen hundred and fifty-two. It is on the line of the Decatur Railroad, and though too close to Nashville ever to become a great commercial center, it presents no mean advantages to any one seeking a home. There is plenty of water for all or any manufacturing purposes, its schools are of the very best and every denomination is represented in churches. The "Tennessee Female College," Dr. R.K. Hargrove, a distinguished Methodist divine and experienced teacher, has justly earned for itself a high position as a finishing school for young ladies. The Harpeth Male Academy, under the superintendence of Messrs. Andrew and Patrick Campbell, is too well known to require more than a passing notice. These gentlemen, one a graduate of Bethany, Va., the other of Glasgow, Scotland, both thoroughly qualified as teachers, make their school just what it purports to be, a stepping-stone to a university. Professor McNutt, a scholar rare and ripe, also has charge of a high school, and is rapidly rising in public favor. "The Presbyterian Institute," under Drs. Rice and Neal, cannot be otherwise than good under the management of such distinguished and learned gentlemen. Rector Woolsey, with his "Parish School," is working admirably, and fast meeting with such success as he deserves.

There are ten churches, M.E. Church, South. Rev. Dr. Plummer, a fine church and ably filled; Old School Presbyterian, now negotiating for a pastor; Protestant Episcopal, Dr. Woolsey, who, though a stranger, is giving great satisfaction; Christian, Elder E.B. Cayce, a good jeweler and a good preacher, and brother of the great inventor of spring power; Baptist Church, but no pastor, though Dr. Provine, one of the best and clearest of preachers, holds forth semi-monthly to the Cumberland Presbyterian in it. The colored friends have two Methodist and two Baptist Churches, in which "Meetings" are held day and night through the year. In addition to all these eminent divines, there is a distinguished jurist who, in exigencies as in cholera times files a petition to Heaven's chancery, but if his prayers are as slow in coming before the Courts above as here below, alas and alas!

I have been thus particular in describing the educational and religious advantages of this beautiful suburban town, for I conceive it is destined, so soon as these are known, to become to Nashville what Staten Island and Long Island are to New York. You can have here all the advantages and luxuries of a city without its heat, dust and excessive taxation, while the cost of going and returning, under a liberal regime of the railroad, will not exceed the present cost of living two or three miles on a turnpike.

### Roads

There are but few turnpikes in the county, the more shame. They are the Nashville and Nolensville, the Wilson, a branch of the former, the Franklin and Lewisburg, Franklin and Columbia, Franklin and Nashville, and Nashville and Hillsboro. But being pretty equally scattered through the county, they come within striking distance of every one wishing to carry his produce to Nashville. But one railroad passes through, and that is the Decatur, now in the possession of the Louisville and Nashville road.

Several thriving villages, situated in different sections, give diversity to the scene and afford neighborhood centers of trade and barter. Hillsboro, Thompson's Station, Bethesda, College Grove, Jordan's Store, Williamsburg, Millview, Peytonsville, Arrington, Brentwood, Triune and Nolensville are all pleasant, thriving villages, all furnished with good schools and churches.

### Mills

A woolen mill is being run at Brentwood, and a manufacturing establishment at Franklin, and several very fine merchant flouring mills, but no cotton mill as yet has lent its busy whirl to the county. Our citizens prefer sending their cotton off, and paying for its return in goods. But times have wrought many changes, and all changes come slow, and capital is proverbially timid, so let us hope for the best and not quarrel.



**Smith's Springs**

The coldest and best sulphur water in the south is situated in the 1st district, or barrens, or on the rim. It is fifteen miles from Franklin, and is noted locally as a balm for wounded livers and for indigestion. The water is of the Red Sulphur variety, and is unquestionably effective. It is very cold, and adjacent is a magnificent free-stone spring. It is on the stream called South Harpeth, a brook of the clearest mountain water, and abounding with fine fish, while the woods around are stocked with deer, turkeys, etc. It is a place of great resort for the citizens of the county, and only lacks the magical touch of money to make it a fashionable resort.

**The Barrens,**

or the Rim, comprise several thousand acres of the best timbered land in the State, and are being rapidly settled by Northern men, especially Pennsylvanians—some 200 of them being in one section. They are doing well, and should a way ever be contrived to reach market, they can supply the whole State with the very best quality of hickory and white oak for manufacturing purposes. They propose to devote themselves principally to the culture of the grape and fruit. These barrens produce some kinds of crops well, such as peas, potatoes, etc. and as a range for stock are inexhaustible. The stock requires only salting to grow fat, and even keep well through the winter. But jogs in a mast hit! All you've got to do is to go out and kill.

I cannot close this article without a tribute to the colored population. They have long since found it to their interest to work in harmony with the white man, and many of them are becoming owners of the soil. They generally are doing extremely well, and will in time make good and useful citizens as they are now good and effective laborers for those who pay promptly. Our interests being inseparable, we will, when their jealousy ceases, be one individual people.

We now come to the statistics of the county, which any one not interested in can skip. Land sells from \$2 to \$100 per acre. The latter figure pertaining to lands near the turnpikes and towns. But good farming lands can be readily bought for from \$15 to \$25 per acre. The taxable property of the county for 1871 amounted to the sum of \$7,952,851, and the taxes being reduced for 1872, made the amount \$7,275,220. There are 348,929 acres land, with an average valuation of \$14.01, and this being tax value, would make the selling value, on part time, about \$20 per acre. The following is the tabular statement of the agricultural production of the county according to the census of 1870:

Too much praise cannot be awarded also to the exertions of a few individuals, Mr. Samuel Perkins, James P. Johnson, W.S. Campbell, and others, in introducing fine blooded stock.

We have as yet had no regularly organized free school, but the people are waking up to the necessity of them, and only wait the action of the Legislature to commence operations, and if the Assembly fails, I believe we will at all events be not found wanting in this important step towards material advancement.

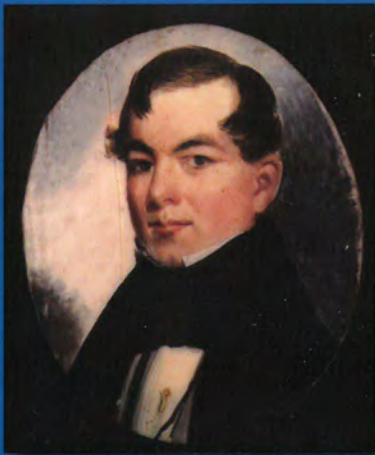
