


Youth Compact Champion's Biographies Phase 1: July - December 2020

Abraham Bobson Turay, 22, Sierra Leone

Bobson is a SDG Ambassador and National Peace Ambassador for his community. As a youth activist he works with people with disabilities. He volunteered in the community during both the Ebola crisis and the mudslides that hit Sierra Leone. He has worked with youth networks including Foundation For Development and International Organization For Human Rights Development and Environment.

She's intentional to improve her skills and has completed a certificate course in leadership at the National Training Academy (NTA) Cairo, Egypt. She is the founder of Ladies Empowerment Goals And Support Initiative (LEGASI).

Tirtharaj is the Program Coordinator at Youth Advocacy Nepal(YAN), a youth-led movement-based organization dedicated to protecting and promoting the rights of young people through advocacy, campaigns and capacity development. He is also the founder of a group named "HerPad" that works on promoting dignified menstruation by providing awareness related to menstruation and menstrual hygiene, which also promotes reusable sanitary pads by providing training on the ways to prepare reusable pads using materials available at home. Besides this, Tirtharaj Koirala is a Public Health graduate and a Public Health Advocate. He loves to interact with young people and spread his knowledge on Public Health. He wishes to see a society that adopts sustainability and promotes healthy life through public health approaches.



Umalekshmi R, 23, India

Umalekshmi is passionate about working in the field of humanitarian actions with a special focus on disaster responses. Umalekshmi's community got badly affected by the Kerala floods of 2018. She had two options, one was to play the role of a mere victim, and the other was to translate herself from a mere victim to a responsible and active change maker. She chose the second one.
