

From childhood, I remember Vespers on the hillside over the lake at Camp Massanetta being among my favorite moments when we listened to our Camp Director, Rev. Goodrich, tell stories. As the Director of Camp Buc, I remember our Vespers in the wooded chapel or by the lakeside campfire being a time when everyone's faces were changed and we did indeed see dimly, even as we were face to face. As a Pastor with youth during Montreat evening gatherings, small groups were a place for truth



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telling and reflection on the day – "takeaways" for each teenager that school or homelife rarely could resemble.

Don't expect the same thing each week as we will strive with volunteers to develop these gatherings for the people and from the people. But do expect a welcome, and opening for the Spirit to join us in our lives as we gather to praise and give thanks to God.

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Library News


Probably one of the lesser known events in the history of people of color in our nation is that of Black Migration, that is the surge of Southerners who moved to the North and the West in the first few decades of the twentieth century. In a nonfiction work which reads like a novel Isabel Wilkerson, a Pulitzer Prize winning journalist, has chronicled the lives of three people, each of whom left the South in search of opportunities for a better life. In *The Warmth of Other Suns*, which is based on conversational interviews, oral history, and many printed accounts, Wilkerson has woven an informative, enlightening, and fascinating account of the motives, challenges, and unbelievable courage of Ida Mae Brandon Gladney, George Swanson Starling, and Robert Joseph Pershing Foster. The volume is well documented with copious endnotes so that the reader can ascertain the factuality of the information, but it is written in such an engaging manner that the reader may not want to put it down.

Austin Channing Brown discovered when she was seven years old the real reason her parents gave her a name that sounds not only masculine but also more like that of white person. The reason they did this was their hope that when she was an adult and was applying for jobs, she would be granted an interview before the interviewer saw her. In her autobiography, *I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness*, she recalls trying to fit in with a white world and then learning, as she calls it, "to love her Blackness." One message that comes through vividly is that our actions as white people often do not reflect our lofty words about diversity and acceptance, even in our churches. This was not a comfortable book for me to read, and I expect others will also find that true. Nonetheless, those of us who proclaim that our God has made all of us in the Divine image and loves all of us equally need to understand what life is like for a Black person struggling to find "dignity in a world made for whiteness."

Some of you are probably already familiar with this latest addition to the library, George Thompson's *Welcome to the One Great Story!*. BMPC is privileged to have George offer a course based on this work which, as the subtitle indicates, is in essence a journey "tracing the Biblical narrative from Genesis to Revelation." For those who wish to buy their own copy there is a box on the library table containing copies of the book with instructions for purchasing it. This promises to be a fascinating study.


