# Thoughts for the Holy Days

from the Earth Care Team

As we wish each other "Happy Holidays," we are using an ancient sacred term formed from the Old English words halig [holy] and daeg [day]. Although the modern term "holidays" sounds secular and not specific, our Christian holidays are indeed holy days, in the sense that Wendell Berry meant when he wrote, "We are holy creatures living among holy creatures in a world that is holy."

Let us remember that the world is holy when we are tempted to do too much online ordering and throw away too much packaging. There are creative ways to give gifts that are not bought or wrapped, such as gifts of our time, or gifts through



our church's Alternative Gifting program.

Let us remember that we live among holy creatures when we plant our gardens for spring. The photos above remind us that we can support little holy creatures when we let leaves pile up somewhere in our yards so that they can shelter for winter, and reduce our sterile lawns, planting native plants that support pollinators the rest of the year. May your holy days be merry and bright!
