# A Summer of Sacred Spaces & Belonging

In the fall of 2021, on recommendation from the Personnel Ministry Team, Session voted to approve a sabbatical experience for our church and our pastor and head of staff, Mary Katherine Robinson, in the summer of 2022. It's a common practice in Presbyterian churches for pastors and churches to engage in sabbatical as a mutual time of rest and renewal. The Presbytery of Western NC guidelines for full-time called and installed pastors provide that pastors have "sabbatical leave during the seventh year of service for at least three months." Mary Katherine will be entering her eighth year of service this May 2022.

The goal of a sabbatical, for both pastor and congregation, is to spend a set period of time away from one another, so that both may be renewed and refreshed for ministry together going forward.

Sabbaticals are intended for healthy pastors and healthy congregations. If the pastor is burned out or the congregation is in crisis, it is not the right time for sabbatical.

While the pastor is the one who steps away, the sabbatical is for both the pastor and congregation. Both need time for rest and renewal. It is a "clean break" – during the sabbatical, the pastor does not engage in Sunday worship, funerals, pastoral care, or any church-related work. Arrangements are made for those duties to be covered by others.

Sabbatical is not an extended vacation. The difference centers on the intent. Vacation focuses on relaxation; sabbatical focuses on renewal. The church continues paying the pastor their full salary and benefits during the sabbatical. And a gift will be given to Mary Katherine to help pay for her travel expenses.

## Sabbatical FAQs from Mary Katherine

### How long will you be away?

My first day away will be Wednesday, June 1. I'll be back in the office on Thursday, Sept. 1.

### Are you really away?

Yes. The spirit of a sabbatical is to honor a true "clean break." During that time you won't hear from me through any church channels. I won't be preaching, providing pastoral care, or performing funerals or weddings. I recognize it'll feel weird to be disconnected from me for three months – and if I'm honest, it'll feel weird on my end to be disconnected from you!

### What will you do on your sabbatical?

Since sabbaticals are not extended vacations and instead involve some intentionality to them, I'm focusing on traveling to sacred spaces of belonging, interviewing pastors and visiting churches in these places, resting, and making my family a priority. There will be other things, but that's it in a nutshell.

### What about worship?

Lewis Galloway will be leading worship for five weeks in the summer along with David and Bob and special guest preachers.

### Will we have to wait until you return to make important decisions in the life of the church?

Nope! As a Presbyterian church the big decisions almost always fall to session, not the pastor. Should any important decisions need to be made, we have a strong leadership team in session to make whatever decision is needed.

### Why are you going on a sabbatical now? Isn't it weird to do this right after the pandemic?

The presbytery requires congregations and pastors to take a three-month sabbatical in their seventh year of service, which was last summer, but it wasn't the right time. While it may not be ideal to be gone as things are finally returning to some type of normalcy, the truth is that everything that would happen with me here will still happen with me gone. If churches waited for the "perfect time" for a sabbatical they'd likely be waiting a long time!

### Are you excited?

I am, for both of us. Sabbaticals are for healthy congregations and healthy pastors. It is a good thing that we are able to experience this together!

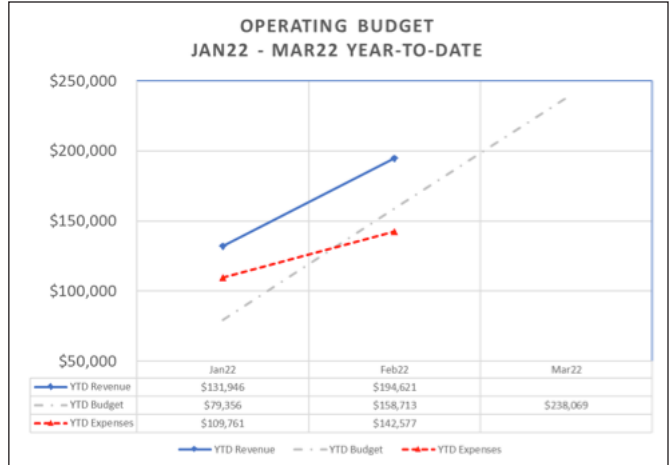

# BMPC Financial Highlights FEB 2022

## Operating Fund

- YTD Operating Revenues of \$194,621 are higher than the \$158,713 budgeted by \$35,908.
- YTD Operating Expenses of \$142,577 are lower than the \$158,713 budgeted by \$16,136.



## Capital Campaign

Progress continues on the church house with an expected completion date of June 1. Drywall is complete and the interior walls and ceilings have been primed. Volunteers will begin painting the interior in late April or early May.

The Facilities Task Force reached a consensus that our phase two efforts should focus on interior renovations before making any final decisions about exterior additions. Efforts are underway to finalize the decisions about what will be included as part of the interior renovations.

Here are highlights from the March minutes

- The EC book group is reading *Our Last Best Act: Planning for the End of Our Lives To Protect the People and Places We Love* by Mallory McDuff, Environmental Education Professor at Warren Wilson College;
- Planning for Earth Care Sunday on April 24, with Mallory McDuff
- Planning for Earth Care participation in worship on October 2, World Communion Sunday;
- Replacing disposable plastic communion cups with glass ones, plus dishwasher racks;
- Working with Mission and Session on possible approval of the upcoming Overture to General Assembly, “The time is now to cherish creation, cut carbon, and speak up”;

- Working on plans for re-landscaping related to the planned fellowship hall/kitchen renovations.

## Plastic-free tips for Lent

- Avoid the big four: plastic bags, plastic straws, take-out coffee cups, plastic water bottles.

# Library News

from Sally Woodard

Three new books for the library! Not just new to the BMPC library but all published in 2021 – contemporary looks at racism, theology, and personal spirituality. Two of the three authors also have other works on our shelves.

One of the topics which we have seen debated this past year has been CRT, Critical Race Theory. Should it be taught in classrooms or not? Bree Picower, a professor at Montclair State University, tackles the

subject in *Reading, Writing, and Racism: Disrupting Whiteness in Teacher Education and in the Classroom*. Picower not only gives examples of the ways educators often choose texts that reflect their own biases, but she also provides helpful suggestions for building racial justice into the curriculum across the spectrum of education.

This is definitely a timely commentary on one of the controversial issues of our day.

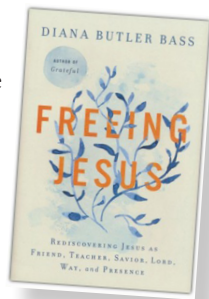
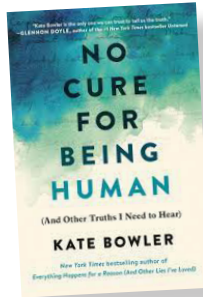
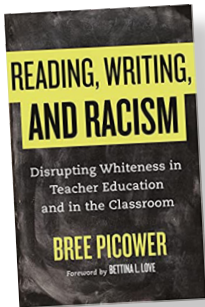
Diana Butler Bass, who has a doctorate from Duke University, is a popular speaker for conferences and workshops in both churches and the academic world. She has been a presenter at the Montreat Conference Center in the past. One of her main topics is the church of today and the faith that she sees expressed in the theology, as well as the actions of Christianity in the twenty-first century. Her newest work is entitled *Freeing Jesus: Rediscovering Jesus as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way, and Presence*. If this sounds like an erudite theological treatise, it definitely is not. Instead the book is an account of how over the years she became acquainted with Jesus in each of these contexts. Her style of writing makes this an enjoyable, as well as thought-provoking, read.

Many women in the congregation may remember

Kate Bowler, who was keynoter for the Women's Conference at Montreat a few years ago. Even more recently, David quoted from her latest book in one of his sermons. Kate, an associate professor of North American Christian history at Duke, was diagnosed with cancer when she was thirty-five. Her earlier work, *Everything Happens for a Reason (and Other Lies I've Loved)*, describes the initial shock of hearing the diagnosis and the attempts to come to terms with the possibility of dying at an early age. In her more recent book, *No Cure for*

*Being Human (and Other Truths I need to Hear)*, she continues to describe how she is learning to live with the reality that being human brings limitations and difficulties. In the process she wrestles with what she calls "the exhaustive positivity" of much of our culture. Far from writing a dour and bitter reflection, Kate employs a sharp wit and a relentless faith which make the book hopeful.

The PW Bible study for 2022-23 is written by Carol Bechtel, author of a previous study on Jonah. She also is the keynote speaker for the Spring Gathering of the PW of WNC Presbytery, April 9, at Upper Anderson in Montreat. The library has two of her books that contain short devotional Bible studies: *Glimpses of Grace* and *Life After Grace*. Carol, who is professor of Old Testament at Western Theological Seminary in Holland, MI, was also Professor of Old Testament at the former PSCE in Richmond (personal note: one of the best Bible teachers I have ever had). I want to recommend these two books as good devotional reading. Each volume contains thirty short discussions of a Bible passage. Some of the titles illustrate that these readings are not dull and stuffy. Here are a few examples: "When God Steps Off the Screen," "What Pirates and Christians Have in Common," "Mrs. Job: A Woman of Few Words," and "Elijah Sees an Analyst." The devotions are insightful and enjoyable. Stop by the library and "check it out."

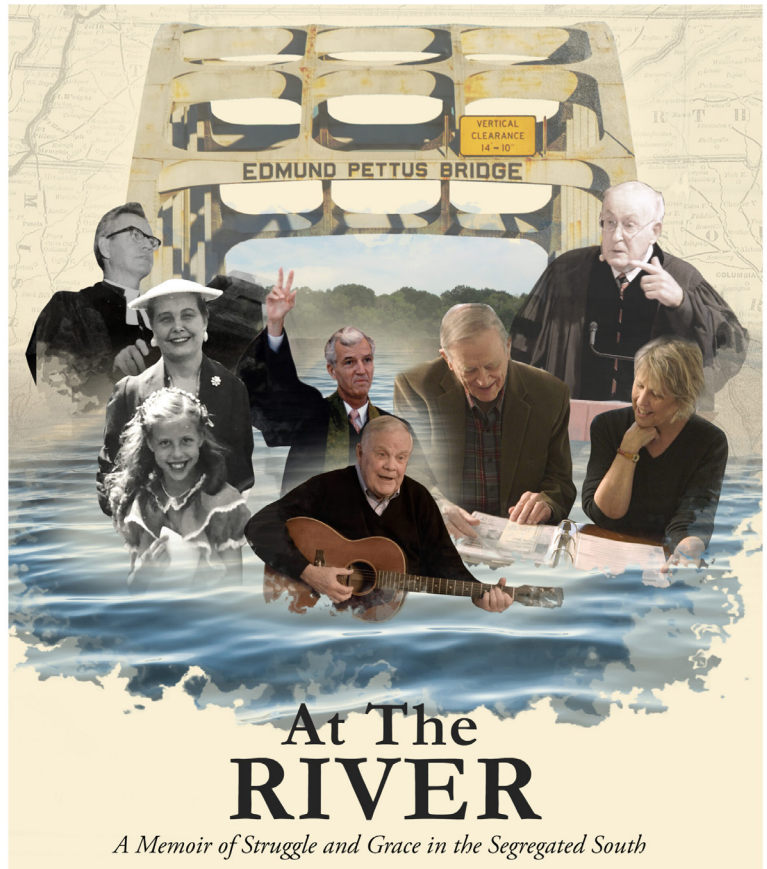
