Organizational records and personal papers

Skip Aiken papers, 1994-29

Skip Aiken was a computer programmer who was very active in San Francisco's leather and uniform fetish scenes; he was also a recovering alcoholic and American Sign Language interpreter who often volunteered his services at his Alcoholics Anonymous meetings. Aiken's collection contains extensive and deeply personal correspondence with family, friends, and lovers, as well as other materials relating to sobriety, sign language, kink, and AIDS.

Julia/Dolphin Trahan papers, 1997-28

Julia/Dolphin Trahan is a lesbian performance artist who uses a wheelchair as a result of injuries sustained in a car accident. Her work often explores sexuality and gender, challenging the idea of the disabled body as asexual and genderless. Trahan's collection includes correspondence, flyers advertising performances, reviews, and zines, as well as several videotapes of performances.

Diane Hugs papers, 2001-26

Diane Hugaert, known in her activist and literary life as Diane Hugs, was a prominent early member of the Wry Crips, a disabled women's theater group with close ties to the disability rights movement. Much of the collection consists of Hugs' detailed and emotional diaries (kept from 1982 to 2001), which chronicle her relationships, her activism, the progression of her illness, and her work to recover from childhood trauma.

ABLE-TOGETHER records, 2002-33

ABLE-TOGETHER was a gay and bisexual men's disability advocacy organization; it published a magazine, also called ABLE-TOGETHER, in which subscribers could connect via personal ads. The collection contains organizational records and correspondence, the latter largely with readers about their ads, though some of it is more detailed and revealing.

Jessica Barshay papers, 2003-04

Jessica Barshay (1940-1998) was a psychotherapist who lived with multiple disabilities, including asthma, Chronic Fatigue Immune Deficiency Syndrome (CFIDS), and Multiple Chemical Sensitivities (MCS). Barshay was a lesbian feminist and identified strongly with both Jewish and Buddhist faiths. The collection includes correspondence, journals, subject files, newsletters, medical records, and professional papers.

Gay Poetry Circle records, 2008-18

The Gay Poetry Circle of San Francisco appears to have been active in the early 1980s and included poets George Berimisa, John Powers, Lloyd Stensrud, Charlie Casey, Wallace Parr, Joe Alderham, Jordan Lee, Don Chan Mark, Loren E. Rhoads, and possibly others. The collection consists entirely of poems and short fiction, most of it photocopied. This collection also contains poems by the poet, academic, and disability activist Christopher Hewitt (1946-2004).

Judy Freespirit collection, 2008-48

Judy Freespirit (Judith Louise Berkowitz Ackerman) was an activist, writer, and performer who lived with disabilities stemming from asthma and environmental allergies. Her work focused on the subjects of women, lesbians, Jewish culture, fat acceptance, disability rights, and incest survival. Freespirit was of the earliest members of the fat acceptance movement, as coauthor (with Vivian Mayer) of the 1973 *Fat Liberation Manifesto*. The collection includes manuscripts and journals; subject files on various activist, therapeutic, and religious topics; and audiotapes, videotapes, and film of various performances, including Freespirit's own.

Laura J. Bock papers, 2013-21

Laura J. Bock was a Jewish lesbian activist and second-wave feminist who advocated for various leftist causes, for fat acceptance, and – after becoming blind as an adult – for people with disabilities. Bock's papers include correspondence, writings, photographs, biographical information and personalia, business records, subject files, ephemera, and artifacts.

Eric Jazman papers, 2017-21

Eric Jazmen was a designer who lived with AIDS-related dementia; he made a film (*I Still Am*) about his condition, and continued to advocate for the destignatization of dementia as his illness advanced. The collection consists of Jazmen's papers and memorabilia, arranged by his partner William Eddelman into scrapbook-like binders which memorialize the different facets of his life.

Cypress papers, 2001-09

Cypress (Susan Rosenthal Glick), 1943-1997, was a working-class Jewish writer, photographer, and political activist who alternately identified as lesbian and bisexual. For most of her life, she lived with a disability variously described in the collection as depression, schizophrenia, or an unspecified emotional disability. The collection contains Cypress' art, photography, writing, and journals, as well as various personal documents, subject files, and biographical material compiled by her friends.
