PADS stands for Public Action to Deliver Shelter. Here, PADS ministry co-leader Kim Green and her husband Rick share their long history with the ministry:

"We have been blessed to participate in the PADS ministry which began at Christ Lutheran Church in Palatine, the initial site in the Northwest suburbs, in the late 1980s. Prince of Peace has been serving meals for more than two decades!

Today, our wonderful volunteers provide and serve a delicious and nutritious dinner for guests at mission partner Journeys the Road Home on the first Wednesday of every month. Our guests, in many cases, work very hard at low-paid jobs that do not allow them to afford full-time housing. PADS and Journeys provide our brothers and sisters with a safe and supportive environment for food, shelter, and a path to additional services.

Clearly Jesus believes in the PADS ministry and has instilled a dedicated sense of caring in the site leaders, shift volunteers, meal providers, and so many others who donate time, materials, and talent to this critical offering in our communities. Our PADS guests are eternally grateful for your love and support!"

Co-leader Tanya Bergman also shared her passions for the ministry:

"My parents, the ultimate volunteers, taught me to be the hands and feet of Jesus. I am personally guided by Ephesians 2:10, 'For you are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God Himself prepared in advance for you to do.'

"It is an uplifting experience to serve the clients at Journeys; they have so little, yet are so grateful! The effort we extend to provide meals is not proportionate to the difference we are making in the lives of those less fortunate.

Thank you, POP members who generously cook and provide food each month! It's like the loaves and fishes: You are so loyal!"

Blessings in a Backpack

Eight years ago, more than 50% of the students at neighbor Lincoln school were receiving free or reduced lunch. Then-Principal MaryBeth Knoeppel sought a way to help meet hunger needs on the weekend for her students. Lincoln became a partner school in the national Blessings in a Backpack network, and Prince of Peace has been volunteering there on Thursdays since the start. Volunteers pack fresh fruit and easy meals to help bridge the weekend hunger gap. Prince of Peace also contributed financial mission grants toward the cost of the food.

In fall 2024, Prince of Peace took full responsibility of the funding and volunteering for the program. Coleaders Krista Spaletto and Susan Klemstein also stepped out in faith and increased the number of students being served from 50 to 65 each week. School social workers select the most critical students to receive the food, and our team of fourteen volunteers take turns serving on Thursdays to pack the meals. Our team also gathers a few times of year for friendship and conversation as we create encouragement cards to add to the meals.

RoniSue Alber volunteers her time with both PADS and Blessings in a Backpack. "Blessings in a Backpack and PADS are two ministries that I have a passion for. Food is something that many of us take for granted, yet many people cannot afford three meals a day. It is a privilege to be able to help provide weekend snacks for young children and a monthly hot meal for adults that are struggling in life. Jesus asks us to care for people in need and these ministries allow me to do that."

Nowhere is this more evident than in the care and dedication of our Funeral Luncheon Team. In one of life's hardest moments, this team serves grief-stricken families with food, comfort, a sense of community, and a powerful ministry of presence and love.

Leah Peszek, Funeral Luncheon Team Leader, shares, "Every single luncheon, many people stop by the kitchen to say thank you and express how much the meal meant to them. That is the number one reason I serve on this team. While gathering enough helpers to prepare food and serve can be stressful, seeing the impact it has on the families makes it all worthwhile. I am filled with joy knowing that we have provided comfort in their time of need." Among other reasons, families appreciate the luncheons for the homecooked meal. "We've heard people say it's the best funeral luncheon they've ever had. The number one reason is that everything is homemade. We could go out and purchase food, but that would take away the special touch that makes the meal so meaningful. Plus, it gives others the opportunity to serve by cooking."

Beyond hospitality, the ministry represents an act of outreach. "A funeral is one of the hardest moments a family will ever experience. This is a time when we can offer hospitality to those who are hurting. Many people who attend funerals may not have a church home. This is our opportunity to share the love of Jesus in a way that might encourage them to return or seek a church near their home." For Patty Bryant, the funeral luncheon ministry was lifechanging. In 2022, she lost her husband, Terry, unexpectedly. Without a church home, she sought a place to hold his funeral and found open arms at Prince of Peace. "Pastor Karl was compassionate and receptive to our specific needs for the service. He allowed me to honor Terry in a way that truly reflected his life and his passion for music," Patty said.

Along with the service, Patty and her family were offered a funeral luncheon, for which she is deeply grateful. "It was one less thing to think about

during such a difficult time." But it was more than just a meal—it was a moment of care that helped Patty and her family feel surrounded by love. "We could feel a sense of community and compassion. Even though I wasn't part of the Prince of Peace family then, I am now! Through this experience, I feel closer to God than ever before, and I am so thankful for how POP supported me in my grief."

The Funeral Luncheon Team embodies the essence of hospitality. By preparing meals with care and serving with compassion, they offer comfort and support that extends beyond the church's walls. Their dedication ensures that every grieving family who enters our doors feels the peace of Christ in a profoundly personal way. I've only been working here a few months, but boy, have I been busy!! My official installation on January 18 and 19 was really exciting! We had special treats (not for me – just humans,) I had my picture taken with lots of people and everyone seemed to be happy. Best of all, LOTS of my brother and sister Comfort Dogs came just to help me celebrate! I was a star!

So, what have I been doing since my installation? I've been to many happy places that are called schools. They all have children in them and they love me! I get tons of pets and all I have to do is look good and let them pet me. I can even do that laying down. You might think I'm not really working, but I am making sure that each child knows that they are loved. Sometimes they read to me and I have to make sure I'm paying











attention. One teacher said that her students do better when they are reading to me, because I take away all their stress!

As much as I like meeting people when they are happy, I know that my job means I am often called to bring comfort to people when they are suffering. I have already been to two wakes for people. One was for a 14-year-old boy who was much loved. That was a hard morning for me, but I didn't have to go alone. Abednego Comfort Dog and Eunice Comfort Dog were also there and they showed me how important my job is. Another time, I worked with Michael Comfort Dog and Nigel K-9 Military Ministry Dog when we went to ease the pain some Illinois Army National Guardsmen felt when they were told that a fellow Guardsman had died. It was quite an honor to serve the people who serve our country. I hope we showed them how important they are to us and how much we all care about them.

I have a GREAT team!! I live with nice people and they take great care of me. I even have a second home I can go to when they are out of town. Eight handlers take me to all my "jobs" and eleven more Ministry Partners go with us to provide spiritual support. There are also team members who pray for us, send cards, write grants, sew bandanas, and keep us organized. Phew! I get tired just thinking about it! You may not know it, but not everyone on my team is a member of Prince of Peace. I didn't get to meet her, but I've heard stories about JoJo Comfort Dog from Living Christ Lutheran Church in Arlington Heights. After she passed away, two members of her team who missed the ministry joined my team. One of them is a member of POP, but the other still goes to Living Christ. I have another handler who met my Top Dog at a Community Wellness Fair. She was working at another table and saw Myra



Comfort Dog who was serving with POP that day. (I hadn't been "hired" yet!) She liked what she saw and joined my team even before I did!

I'm so glad God called every member of my team to this ministry! I know He has a plan for each of us and that He is going to lead us wherever He needs us to go. Maybe God is calling you to join us in our ministry. I could use 2 more handlers. Just think — you could receive training to hold my leash and help me bring comfort to people who need the mercy, compassion, presence and proclamation of Jesus Christ!

I've heard that people wonder what I do when I'm not working. At home, I'm just a normal dog and I have toys to play with. But when I have been working, I get paid! After each visit, I get a paycheck from my Handler. Sometimes that means we play fetch with my favorite ball...it squeaks!!! Other times I might play a little bit and then get a massage. OH MY DOG that feels good! I think the best part of my massage time is that I get to snuggle with my Handlers and I can show them how much I love them and how thankful I am that they love me too!

I hope you learned a little about me. I don't make it to church for every service because sometimes I'm working, but I hope you come to see me when I'm there. You can find me by the Connection Center in front of that pretty blue couch. My vest says Please Pet Me, so you'll know what to do when you see me! If I'm not there, you can see a digital me in the picture frame on the little table next to the couch.

When my Handlers take my leash to go somewhere, they always say "With me." I never know where we're going, but I know it is where I am needed and I'll be ok because it's really God who is saying "With Me." If you listen with your heart, you can hear Him saying the same to you too as you go about your day!





Quilts for North Carolina

n early October 2024, Reverend Chris Singer, President of Lutheran Church Charities, visited POP as a guest preacher and hosted a presentation on Spiritual First Aid. When he shared about using our talents to help people, POP member and Quilting Team Leader Margo Brewer felt a nudge from the Holy Spirit that she needed to do something for the victims of the recent flooding in North Carolina from Hurricane Helene. "When you get that inkling, just do it! It's God planting the seeds," she said.

Tending the seeds that God had planted, Margo contacted POP staff seeking guidance for how to implement her idea of making quilts for the hurricane victims. She spoke with the quilt team members and posted on the POP Share Facebook group seeking other interested volunteers. From there, the seeds grew!

- 1. Margo located a quilt shop in Pinconning, Michigan that was collecting quilts for the 5 Little Monkeys quilt shop in Weaverville, North Carolina to distribute.
- **2.** Eunice Mattes, who had already donated sewing and quilting materials, donated 50 lap-sized quilt tops.
- **3.** When they discovered they needed twin-size quilts, the team used fabric scraps to make Eunice's quilts bigger.
- **4.** The quilters created an Amazon wish list for additional supplies, which was generously fulfilled by POP members.
- **5.** Members who had previously completed quilts donated them, including Becky Reeve, who sent the first quilt she had ever made.
- **6.** A Quilt-A-Thon occurred November 2-3 to complete the quilts.

Througout the week leading up to the Quilt-A-Thon, volunteers came to POP to help finish the quilts, and the weekend brought more than 64 volunteers of all ages! Those with little or no experience tied knots, cut squares, and ironed fabric. During that time, they got to know each other, building community and sharing lessons. Some POP Kids even shared *their* talents by making cards to send with the quilts. Then, on November 9-10, 45 gorgeous handmade quilts adorned the pews as we blessed them before Margo loaded them in her car for the trek to Michigan.

The story doesn't end there. A few weeks after the quilts were delivered we received thank you cards from quilt recipients including pictures of one laid out on a bed used by a young child in their temporary housing after their home was lost. Additionally, one local North Carolina business, Cakes by Jane, sent us two homemade cakes as a thank you!

Judy continued, "We are relatively new to the church, so Tables for Eight is a wonderful way for us to get to know others. Our hosts were friendly and gracious, dinner was delicious, conversation was comfortable, and we enjoyed interacting with everyone there."

Paul Herzog, long-time member of POP remarked, "We had such an interesting group at our first Tables for Eight. We met a new couple to our church and were also with others that we have known for some time. It was the perfect opportunity for the new couple to make connections with some members. We also enjoyed getting to know everyone on a deeper level. Overall, it was such a fun evening!"

When you bring different people from different walks of life together, it can be scary. Will you have anything to talk about? Will the food be good? Will there be awkward silences? The answer to all of this is YES. This is an event in which anyone can participate whether single, dating, or married. Paul continued, "We really enjoyed the time with the other participants, and eight people is the perfect number. The gathering was small enough that everyone had a chance to speak and contribute, and yet not so small that someone might feel pressured to talk. Our group also included singles, so it wasn't just a couple's group." Keep an eye out for this event next January and join a Table for Eight. Groups will meet on the third Saturday of the month January through April.

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First Bible Workshop

The First Bible Workshop allows a time for students to begin their journey studying the Bible. Students and their parents learn the big story of the Bible, how the books of the Bible are categorized, and receive resources to help them begin studying the Bible as a family. At a designated time, students and parents separate to focus on different things. Students spend time playing games that help them remember different stories we hear in the Bible while the parents spend time highlighting important verses in the students' new Bibles and writing a special note of prayer and blessing inside the front cover. The students then receive their brand-new study Bibles from their parents during a special portion of Sunday worship.

Nick and Stacy Haddad attended the class with their sons and shared their perspective upon the experience.

Why do you think the First Bible Workshop is a vital faith stepping stone?

"It supports children's transition from hearing Bible stories to engaging with Scripture on their own. The workshop provided an opportunity to explore God's Word together as a family in a structured and meaningful way. Ike, for example, now sees that the Bible is not just a book, but a personal guide for his faith journey. For Ike, the workshop came at the perfect time. He began to see the importance of specific passages — like our comfort dog's verse, Proverbs 17:17. It helped him understand how Scripture can provide guidance, comfort, and strength. We also feel that receiving his very own Bible made his faith feel more personal and real, giving him a foundation to grow in his relationship with God."

What stood out to you most during the workshop?

"A highlight for us was Ike's excitement when we shared the inscription we had written for him. He clearly cherished the fact that we had chosen specific verses that were meaningful for him and that we had taken the time to highlight them in his new Bible. Seeing how much that personal touch meant to him was a powerful reminder of why this workshop matters. It was more than just a class — it was a moment of connection, faith, and encouragement that we know will continue to shape Ike's spiritual journey in the years ahead."

Confirmation

On April 13, Palm Sunday, we celebrated Confirmation as fourteen youth took a step in their faith journey and confirmed their faith. These students spent two years learning about the foundational beliefs in the Christian faith as we understand them from our Lutheran perspective.

In the class, students learned key lessons through activities, such as Mason Wallin's favorite when they worked together to cross the lava river, each with a different limitation. They learned how valuable it is to work with a team and to share our different gifts.

Simon Thomas and Levi Hooker thoroughly enjoyed activities at the confirmation retreat at Walcamp Outdoor Ministries, including canoeing and a relay race.

One lesson in particular stuck with Levi. As we discussed the Ten Commandments, we reviewed the seventh commandment — you shall not steal. Group leader Gayle Neururer pointed out that this commandment is not only about stealing objects. For example, disrupting class by talking steals time or cheating by looking at someone else's test steals work and knowledge.







Messianic Seder

A Night of Food, Friendship, and Faith

Our recent Messianic Seder was more than just a special evening—it was a powerful, hands-on journey into the story of Jesus' final meal with his disciples. Led by Jennifer Edwards, Director of Family Ministry, and Jeni Walker, Director of Communications and Hospitality, this multi-generational event brought together people of all ages to experience the richness of the Last Supper through the traditions of the Jewish Passover.

Participants were guided through the fifteen traditional steps of the Seder meal, with hands-on elements, storytelling, and reflections that helped connect the dots between the Old Testament story of God's deliverance and the New Testament story of redemption through Jesus. From tasting bitter herbs to hiding the afikomen, every part of the evening was designed to make the experience memorable and meaningful.

"There's a reason Jesus chose food to tell this story," said Jeni Walker. "It's something we all share. When we taste these elements again, we'll remember this meal and the story that comes with it." questions, meaningful conversations, and even a few tears as families and individuals of all ages explored the roots of Holy Communion in a new way. One guest shared, "Thank you for connecting the dots for us—we learned so much!" Another added, "I will never look at Holy Communion or Maundy Thursday the same way again."

Jennifer Edwards emphasized the importance of experiences like this in faith formation: "God's design is that the parents have the responsibility to share their faith, this story, with their children, and that the faith community will come around and support them. This is a beautiful picture of that in action."

"This was a wonderful evening!" said another participant. "I've been looking for a multi-generational Seder I could bring my kids to—and this was perfect."

As we walked through the meal Jesus shared with his disciples, we were reminded again how food, friendship, and faith draw us closer to one another and to the heart of God. Through this experience, we didn't just learn about Jesus' final days—we lived a piece of the story together.

THE GOSPEL UNSPOKEN

Scott Treptow is a senior at Concordia University Chicago studying to be a Director of Christian Education (DCE.) As part of his studies, he has been serving at Prince of Peace since September 2022 where he has gotten hands-on experience in his field. He will finish the academic side of his training this May and head off on a one-year internship to Redeemer Lutheran Church in Peoria, Illinois.

POP Teens shared some of their favorite memories and lessons they learned from Scott over the last three years, including the fun, unique, and new games and the lock-ins he led. When asked about the lessons they learned from Scott over the years, students cited that they gained a greater understanding of the Lutheran view of communion, learned to always ask questions and challenge yourself in faith and life, and learned the importance of not drinking too much caffeine.

It has been a joy working alongside Scott and watching him learn and grow in his skills and confidence as a leader. I know the youth and I will miss him a lot.

Some of our middle and high school students have been able to make core memories with Scott as they prepared his senior project, *The Gospel Unspoken*, presented at Prayer on Wednesdays (POW) on April 2.

Here, Scott describes his project, helping us understand the heart behind it:

What is The Gospel Unspoken?

The Gospel Unspoken is a powerful dramatic portrayal of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection set to contemporary Christian

music—conveying the message of salvation without a single spoken word. Through expressive movement and music, this performance invites audiences to witness Christ's love in a way that transcends language and speaks directly to the heart.

What do you hope people took away from the evening?

I hope that all who attended *The Gospel Unspoken* left with a personal connection to the Passion story of Jesus Christ. Many of us who have heard the Gospel story many times often forget that we are a part of that story. That Jesus died on the cross for us personally. I hope that people are reminded that during Christ's death and resurrection, He was thinking about all of us.

What was your favorite part of putting this together?

My favorite part was working with the youth of Prince of Peace and seeing how excited they are about this presentation. I planned much of the presentation, but many youth have also contributed to the presentation. This project is as much theirs as it is mine.

E stablished in 2006 by member Carol Baker, POP's Hope Shawl Ministry group began meeting at POP to crochet and knit together, creating hope shawls for those experiencing illness or loss. It has since grown to provide other items benefiting several groups and non-profits in addition to our POP community:

- Hope Shawls and Lap Blankets: Available upon request or for pick up in the Prayer Room, distributed to GriefShare members and Veterans groups. Member Pat Bienik routinely checks church prayer requests to determine who might need a shawl.
- **Scarves:** Provided to Foster2Success, a non-profit that helps foster youth to pursue higher education and transition to adulthood.
- Prayer Squares: Available at the Connection Center and in the Prayer Room.
- Baby Hats & Baby Blankets: Provided to several nonprofits including Project Baby Blankets who distribute them to babies in the NICU in Illinois, and Project Linus who shares them with seriously ill children. Additionally, they will soon be gifting these items to Palatine-based non-profit Hopeful Beginnings of St. Mary, an adoption agency who also provides mental health services and case management to new families. Hats and Blankets will be given during regular visits from our LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Shadrach and team.
- Larger Blankets and Chemo Caps: Given to Phil's Friends, a Wheaton-based non-profit who provide Christ-centered support to those going through cancer.

The impact of these items is not lost on the team. Every handmade item is prayed over and a note with a blessing is attached. One POP member shared that she carried her blue shawl everywhere while in the hospital after back surgery, and Hear my prayer, O Lord; Listen to my cry for mercy. In the day of my trouble I will call to you, for you will answer me." PSALM 86:6-7



the doctors and nurses affectionately referred to her as the "Blue Shawl Lady." Hope Shawl member Sheryl Grandt shared that witnessing the impact the shawl had on her brother during his battle with brain cancer prompted her to join the group and help to give back.

The team welcomes new members or anyone curious about knitting or crocheting. No experience is necessary. The members will gladly teach you! In fact, POP mother/daughter duo Sarah and Jamie McBride recently sought out Hope Shawl leader Elizabeth Schuett for lessons and have now started attending meetings. You can even create items on your own and bring them in to distribute. Member Barb Wiwat regularly sends in prayer squares she makes in Arizona.

Did you know? Knitting and crocheting involves both sides of the brain (logical and creative,) promotes healthy brain activity, and prevents dementia?

Hope Shawl Ministry leader Elizabeth Schuett says: "I have a passion for knitting and crocheting. This ministry is a fit because I'm not a real upfront person, I'm more of an introvert. Making something and passing it on is a better fit for me than other ministries and it is a good community of people."

Hope Shawl Ministry, currently at about twelve members, meets three times per month in the Maker Space at POP: the first and third Fridays of every month from 1-3pm and the fourth Thursdays from 7-8:30pm. You are welcome to simply show up or contact Elizabeth Schuett for more information.

Faith in Action

How Jim Beckley Found Purpose in Disaster Relief

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"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

1 Peter 4:10

As POP Member Jim Beckley was preparing to retire several years ago, he focused on planning his retirement lifestyle and volunteering was at the top of his list. Before researching different types of volunteer service, he wisely created a list of things he wanted to achieve through volunteering:

- Learning a new skill
- Physical Activity
- Faith-Based Environment
- Network to Meet New Friends

Turns out that that the Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT), at the direction of mission partner Lutheran Church Charities (LCC), checked all of those boxes!

The Palatine LERT team, comprised of members from both POP and neighbor Immanuel Lutheran Church, have three pillars of support.

- **1. Deployment:** Managed by LCC for assignments in assisting with disasters.
- 2. Community Engagement: Ways to support a local charitable organization. They currently support a local WINGS domestic violence shelter by trimming trees, painting, and building and maintaining a garden. They also help complete projects around POP including tree trimming and removal.
- **3. Personal Support:** Typically a onetime event referred to LERT by the Care Ministry of POP or Immanuel to help members (yard clean up, moving, painting, etc.)

Members do not have to commit to participating in all three of these pillar activities. All LERT team members attend a minimum of half-day basic training. Specialized skills such as chainsaw work require additional training and financial commitment (i.e. purchase of chain saw, maintenance, etc.)

LERT team members do not deploy until LCC is invited to the disaster area, usually coordinated through a church or district office. LCC assesses the site to determine needs as well as housing, food, and shelter for the team members. Often, a local church provides the housing on site, sleeping in classrooms or pews. They also provide daily meals and assess the needs and skills of the LERT team to make daily assignments. According to Jim, "They never put someone in a situation that is over their head. They know their talent level very well and members always work with a team."

Jim's recent deployment took him to Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Church in Hendersonville, NC after the devastation left by Hurricane Helene. During his two-week deployment, he helped to clear debris and downed trees from properties — a job that is not covered by property insurance. This is a valuable service to those affected by the disaster, especially those who are not physically able to do it themselves or who cannot afford to pay for the work to be done. LERT members also distribute gift cards, kerosene heaters, and quilts, among other items.

According to LCC statistics, 97 families were helped and 2,756 volunteer hours were given for the work in North Carolina and more work is necessary as future deployments are being planned for the area. Jim is considering going back to help stating, "I get inspired by the people that go through this and still stay so positive."

Summer was budget season, so it was a time for putting dreams into planning mode.

Additionally, the Northern Illinois District (NID) of the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod (LCMS) offered mission grants to churches who were doing things to reach their community. We could share the cost between the POP budget and an NID grant.

And so we planned An Evening of Music & Poetry with Blake Flattley & Tanner Olson for Saturday, February 1 to bring some hope in the dead of winter. We knew only a fraction of people would be able to attend a Saturday night



event, so we inquired, and Tanner and Blake said, "Yes" to also leading worship that weekend. Beautiful! We sent invitations to our church, neighboring LCMS churches, our Community Leader Network, art show participants, and through other food, friendship, and faith events we hosted, and we put the word out on social media and through personal relationships.

Among the 75 who came out Saturday night for the potluck, music, and poetry event itself, I met people who heard about it through each one of those channels, not to mention other Tanner and Blake fans who live in the area.

It was a glorious and soulfilling weekend. A musician who attended the event and experienced worship that weekend remarked that it was "a real treat, a lovely service and concert. I love how you highlight the arts at your church! My ears perked up when Tanner spoke about distinguishing wishes and hopes."

Another member expressed their appreciation for

Saturday's service, saying, "It was such a pleasant surprise to experience the music, poetry and preaching of the special guests. The message of hope especially resonated with me as January [was] a tough month, with both family drama and the political climate weighing me down. Like Peter, we start to sink when we lose our focus."

A poet who attends our church regularly found fresh inspiration for pursuing her craft and sharing it with others!

Hope is a team sport! Thank you, Jesus, for leading us and giving us timely encouragement. Thank you, Creator God, for creative gifts to share. Thank you for Spirit-led connections, and how we are stronger together in Jesus' name!

SPIRITUAL FIRST AID TRAINING

In October 2024, Prince of Peace invited Pastor Chris Singer, president and CEO of Lutheran Church Charities (LCC) to preach and lead a Sunday afternoon training session on "Spiritual First Aid (SFA)."

After some conversations Prince of Peace decided to host official Spiritual First Aid training and start a Spiritual Response Team for Prince of Peace members and others in the community.

Community member Chris Morkert commented, "Spiritual First Aid has taken the science of trauma and it's impact on the brain, our emotions, and our reactions to our emotions and created a first aid kit to begin to repair that trauma. It allows for space for 'spiritual' without being evangelistic. This non-judgmental approach can change lives and heal communities. Thanks to LCC, the creators of SFA, and Prince of Peace church."

Nineteen attendees came for the two-day training including Gary and Sue Pikora who have taken on the responsibility of leading our Spiritual Response team. Sue said the most meaningful part of training for her is, "having the knowledge to be able to help someone in trauma. Being there...listening...praying. Letting people know they're not alone and serving God with humility." The ministry of presence and humility to serve are two of the foundational principals of SFA. When someone needs spiritual first aid they are likely suffering from one of these areas: Biological, Livelihood, Emotional, Social or Spiritual (BLESS.) SFA is then administered using CPR, but not the CPR you learned in a first aid class. CPR stands for:

Care with Practical Presence

Provide Coping Practices

Refer and Resource

The use of BLESS CPR is a great way to help others find peace in their situation and re-center themselves to continue. Gary summed up his reason for serving and using Spiritual First Aid both for the church and in his personal life, "Sometimes I wonder if I did any good for the world. While small, unflashy acts of service may go unnoticed during my lifetime, God keeps track."

In other words, we don't need to serve in the big ways where everyone can see what we do. We only need to serve and love people because God knows the situation and *He* is who we are serving. When we step out in humility with the love of Jesus, we can then see *other's* needs and love others just like we love ourselves.
