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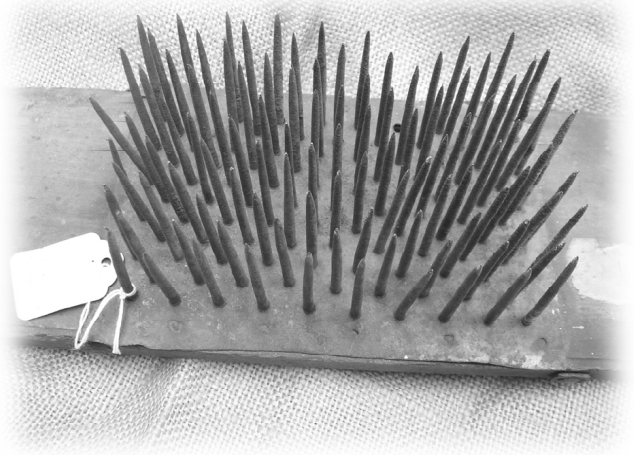
EASTSIDE HISTORY *Turning Points*

The artifact we have chosen from our collection to feature this issue is a hackle. Hackles are the product of a technological advancement that reduced the amount of hard labor needed in the production of linen. With all of the artificial fabrics we have today, it is easy to overlook linen's importance in Western history and culture.

Linen cloth has been around for the last 6,000 years. It is not only a highly durable fabric, but in ancient times, it was believed to have a special purity. It's not surprising then that the mummies of Egypt were wrapped in linen and that the priests of Egypt, Israel and Rome performed their functions in linen garments.

Linen is a product of the flax plant and its production is labor intensive. The long fibers that are used to make the linen thread are found in the main stalk of the plant so the shorter side branches are removed as the plant grows. When the flax is mature, it is pulled by hand, hung and allowed to dry. It is then "rippled" by a rake-like tool, which is pulled through the plant to remove the seed pods.

The plants are then "retted," kept in water until the stalk fibers begin to rot. They are then scraped to remove the unusable residue.

At that point, "hanks" of the usable fibers are taken by hand and pulled through the spikes on the hackle for the final cleaning. We have a large hank in our collection. It has a radiant luster. It is easy to see where the expression "a flaxen haired maiden" came from.

Our hackle belonged to Dale Meriotte. It looks to be handmade and has about 100 1-1/2" spikes. *EHC*

With a passion for building *Eastside Business* for readers and businesses on the Eastside, Kennedy is an entrepreneur, freelance writer, and real estate broker.

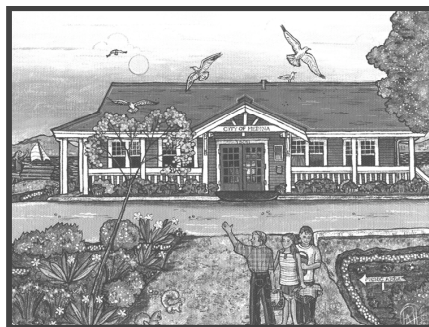

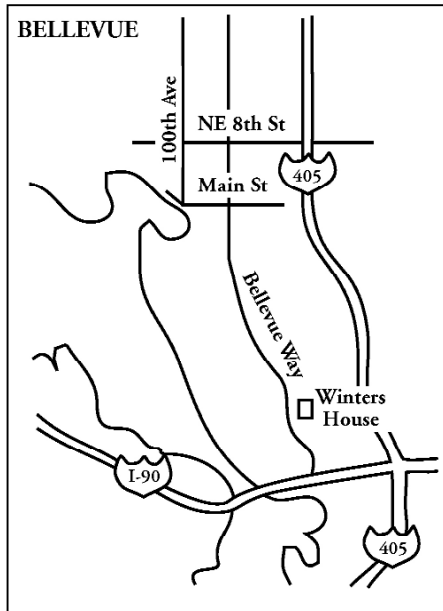
