For the past week I have been living in the world of "What's the magic word?"

Elizabeth and I have had the joy, (and exhaustion) of 50% of our grandchildren with us for a week. Three kids that we love to death: Mady, 11; Conner, 8; and Sawyer, 2 (and EVERY BIT a two year old!).

And so, as I mentioned, the dialogue around our house has changed from what has grown to be so familiar; "What sounds good for dinner tonight for the two of us" and "I wonder what the kids are doing tonight?" to "What's the magic word?"

Phraseology around the Dakin household has morphed into;

"What do you say?"

"No...you need to use your words not your hands!"

"One more bite of veggies before you get dessert!"

And, of course, no life with two year olds would be complete without, "Are you SURE you don't need to at least TRY and go?"
And while each night we found ourselves dropping into bed around midnight, I did find time for reflection, and this was one major take away:

What prevents gratitude in a two year old?

I think the answer is easy: the inability to think abstractly (ala Piaget and his theory). In other words, at two it's simply learning that with the reception of something, like Teddy Grahams, comes the reinforced response of "thank you." That's concrete thinking. But when they say that, there's no connection with what it means to be grateful just yet. It's a learned response first, which then, hopefully, gives way to intention and initiation sometime later.

But does it always? Because what's OUR excuse?

Isn't it the case that we abstract thinking and reasoning adults ALSO have to be reminded to have an attitude of gratitude? What was the last thing you thanked God for? When was the last time you, out of nowhere, without being prompted, thanked someone for something more abstract; like a thoughtful attitude or a gracious spirit? Doesn't scripture teach us to give thanks in all circumstances?

We don't have the excuse of the inability to manufacture abstract thoughts; when it comes to giving thanks, we're simply lazy at best, or entitled at worse. Somewhere in between those two polemics I think we're also distracted and preoccupied with so much that our thankful quotient is quite diminished.

How about we change that trend? How about we DON'T have to wait to be prompted with "What's the magic word?" but instead overflow with grateful hearts to one another and most importantly, toward God!

Your elders, at their August meeting, acted upon a recommendation from the Personnel Committee to alter Ben Auger's job description a bit to reflect a greater dedication of time to various small groups and their development within Wabash. Ben's title now is **Pastor of Youth and Small Group Ministries**.

What does all of this mean? Will Ben remain with our youth? YES, by all means! We greatly value Ben's ability to relate to our youth and his great leadership of his volunteer team. However, Ben has shown great interest and ability in helping to develop some of our small group ministries including our greeter ministry, our security ministry, as well as our Life Group ministry. Ben has a heart to see these areas move beyond just involvement to real discipleship opportunities. We however realize that what he is presently doing in youth is a full time job in and of itself. Coupled with a young family, we wanted to be fair to him. Therefore, the Personnel Committee redrafted Ben's job description, in consultation with Ben and Pastor George, and ultimately with Session's approval, allowing for a 75-25 relationship; 75% youth involvement and 25% small group involvement.

Who picks up the slack? Fortunately Ben has recruited and trained over his three years with us a talented and gifted group of volunteers, some of whom have run youth ministries at other churches previous to their involvement at Wabash. In addition, the Session approved a job description drafted by the Personnel Committee, again with the input of Ben and Pastor George, for a part time Assistant Director of Youth Ministries. This person would come along side Ben and be directed by him in filling in some of the gaps, along with the volunteers.

We are grateful that God has so gifted us with someone with the heart and gifts of Ben and we look forward to a long and fruitful ministry! Join us as we commission Ben in worship September 2nd!

Just Reasoning: Discussing Your Worldview In The Midst of Honest Questions

This class provides a safe and fun environment to look at worldviews and belief systems. Whether your views tend towards atheism/agnostic/secular, orthodox Christianity, some world religion, or just the latest in interpretation of spirituality, this class will allow you to verbalize your beliefs and reasoning in a relaxed and fun environment. This is not directly an apologetics or intellectual class but rather utilizes the fact that every human has a worldview about where we came from, why are we here, and where are we going. Even churchgoers have a wide variation of worldviews. Some examples of topics we will tackle include: 1) Existence and nature of God, 2) existence and nature of heaven and hell, 3) existence and nature of an unseen spiritual realm, 4) existence and nature of the ever popular aliens, and other topics. To make this course useful and safe for all, there will be ground rules, training, and modeling in how to listen to other world viewpoints and deal with and verbalize a reasoned explanation of your own viewpoints.
