Enactus at University of Virginia (Enactus at UVA) is a McIntire School of Commerce-affiliated organization which provides students with opportunities to work closely with business-owners and entrepreneurial leaders to develop innovative and sustainable (environmental and social focus) value within the Charlottesville community. At the University of Virginia, our chapter focuses on hands-on social entrepreneurship and consulting projects to empower the Charlottesville community. Enactus at UVA values creative approaches to tackling long-term projects. Through participation on project teams, students will be encouraged to work independently and make use of available resources to further client

needs as necessary. Enactus at UVA values the approach that no ideas are too bizarre or ridiculous to propose en route to success within entrepreneurial and business endeavors.

#### Projects:

- They work with Lytos Technologies to produce green, enzymatic, broad-based bio-fungicides that protect high-value agriculture crops and restore crop yields previously lost to fungal pathogens, which supports increased revenues for farmers.
- They also work with Old Dominion Hemp to distribute industrial hemp animal products, utilizing the bulk of the industrial hemp plant with low processing energy while producing positive financial and environmental returns.

## Materials Working Group

 The Materials Working Group is a group underneath the Environmental Stewardship Subcommittee for the Committee on Sustainability.

- They work primarily to reduce and divert material waste at UVA, and have mostly focused on composting up to this point. So far, two trials have been conducted
- They conducted some popup composting by the food trucks and were successful in collecting large amounts of compost.

- Challenges for this group include a lack of student involvement, as well as a lack in consistency of meetings/emails
- A student you can contact in particular about this activity is Sonali Luthar. She was the 2019-2020 co-chair of the group along with the staff co-chair, Jason Snow.

#### Nitrogen Working Group

- A lot of the work of the Nitrogen Working Group centers around food, and working with UVA dining to both track the nitrogen footprint of our food as well as find ways to reduce it. This has involved sustainable food labeling as well as encouraging more plant-forward meals.

  - Use UVA energy data to generate nitrogen emission values for the University.
  - Tracking and measuring the impacts of all Business-related travel at UVA (e.g. conferences, sports teams). The project is now working to minimize the footprint from these trips.
  - Measuring UVA's paper purchasing and estimating the environmental footprints of these purchases.
  - Community Nitrogen Footprint Project
    - Working with the City of Charlottesville and Climate Action Together to calculate the nitrogen footprint for the city

## Project Peanut Butter at UVA - Food

Project Peanut Butter at UVA partners with the international organization Project Peanut Butter (PPB). This global organization aims to alleviate the issue of malnutrition among millions of children. Children suffering from Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) require fast and efficient attention. The revolutionary therapeutic program provided by Project Peanut Butter currently supports hundreds of thousands of children in sub-Saharan

Africa and other developing countries. With this program, 75-95% of children fully recover from malnutrition compared to the mere 20-40% of children who experience recovery after traditional treatment. Using FDA-approved peanut butter-like compounds, Project Peanut Butter provides nutritional food to children who cannot eat anything else. Clinics have been constructed in Africa for easy family access and informational programs. The main goal of Project Peanut Butter at UVA is to raise funds for the international organization as well as collaborate with similar goal-oriented organizations at UVA to address global public health challenges.

#### WriteClimate - Activism

WriteClimate is an organization of students dedicated to promoting climate change awareness through activist and artistic means.

WriteClimate started in 2017 as a course taught by Professor Deborah Lawrence in the spring semester. Since its inception, students in this course have promoted climate awareness on- and off-Grounds by constructing public art displays out of various materials (physical copies of climate science and policy, single-use plastics, etc.). Inspired by Lawrence's message, former WriteClimate students decided to create a club, WriteClimate at UVA, which aims to achieve that which is limited by the scope of a classroom. This includes more politically-oriented activities, like co-hosting climate strikes and divestment rallies. Students at UVA can enroll in Professor Lawrence's course in the spring semester or get involved in the club year-round.
