

We are hard at work updating the draft Master Plan and look forward to sharing it with you later this summer. Here are a few of the updates for the Master Plan:

- Overlaying the EA Certificate Conditions with the initial project layout to ensure the project aligns with the Certificate
- Working with our Squamish Nation Staff and Board Member to respectfully integrate Squamish Nation partnership and stewardship into the project
- Consolidating the project neighborhoods into a smaller footprint to minimize the built area
- Establishing guiding principles for environmental stewardship and expanding on sustainability commitments
- Updating the Economic Feasibility chapter to provide a current and solid context for resort operational feasibility

We are also coordinating and working to install two test wells in the proposed Main Village. This includes investigative site visits to make sure the test wells have minimal impact to the environment and avoid any potential archeologically sensitive areas. Squamish Nation representatives will be joining us in our visits to the project area as we continue this work.


EVERY CHILD MATTERS

IMAGINING THE RESORT



Spring (kw'íyus) is the time of emergence, when herring, shoots, and berries start to appear and creeks and streams begin to fill from the winter thaw. Historically, ooligans were the first fish to emerge every spring. By the spring, winter stores would be depleted, and small fish would be the first fresh feast of the season. The celebration would include harvesting and eating ooligan and herring eggs. Spring and the herring season are a marker for when families would leave winter longhouses and start travelling to seasonal camps to begin gathering and fishing within the traditional territory.

The rendering depicts the plaza in the proposed Main Village, where water from the spring freshet interacts with the public art based on Squamish Nation culture and history.

On April 28, 2021, the Garibaldi Board of Directors voted in favour of eliminating plans for a natural gas network at the resort. This means no natural gas will be used for space heating or hot water, and resort buildings will be zero emissions!

SMART DESIGN

Resort buildings will be built to Step 4 and Step 5 of BC's Energy Step Code, with high performance energy efficient windows, insulation and air-flow requirements. Our green building standards will result in homes that are comfortable to live in and use minimal electricity for space heating and hot water needs.

CABIN VIBES

Where fireplaces are desired, owners and designers are shifting to elegant and contemporary wood fireplaces, or choosing the warmth and ambience of electric options.

SUPPORT FOR SOLAR

The resort will support individual homeowners and builders who wish to install their own clean energy infrastructure, such as solar or geothermal heating systems.
