

PILGRIMAGE NOTICES AND ADVICE

Medical Care for CA Pilgrims

The Pilgrimage is medically supported and there are doctors and nurses travelling from England with the CA. They will be available to offer medical advice for all pilgrims travelling with the CA. If anyone needs advice about a medical problem, please come to Accueil Saint-Frai, 2nd floor.

IN AN EMERGENCY however, please contact your hotel reception or the Ambulance Service on 112.

Some pilgrims believe that in Lourdes they can stop taking regular medication. This is quite wrong and can be most dangerous. So, make sure that you take your normal medication and keep it in your hand luggage when travelling. Please make sure that you bring at least 10 days' worth of medications. If you are taking controlled drugs such as oramorph or morphine sulphate, please make sure that you bring your repeat prescription with you and have this handy at the airport.

Hotel notice boards

See these for details of diocesan and other group gatherings at the beginning of the pilgrimage (Saturday) and check them each day in case of any updates to details of liturgies and other events. There is no obligation to attend all of these events - do what you feel able to.

Wheelchairs and pushers for Assisted Pilgrims in hotels will only be available from 1.00 pm on Saturday until 4.30pm on Thursday.

Visiting Assisted Pilgrims in the Accueil Saint-Frai

Please do visit our pilgrims staying at the Accueil Saint-Frai, on the 2nd floor, during our pilgrimage. Spending time with each other is an important part of what makes a pilgrimage special. Please wear your CA pilgrimage badge as you will need to identify yourself on arrival to a member of the core care team who, additionally, wear heart badges.

Anointing of the Sick

Only those who are registered (and wearing an 'Anointing Card') will be anointed at the liturgy on Thursday. If there are circumstances where it is appropriate for another pilgrim to receive the Sacrament, they should talk to their group director as early as is practical.

Music Group

If you can sing or have brought your own musical instrument, you are welcome to join the group for rehearsals and liturgies. Please come to the first music rehearsal on Saturday (at 1pm, before the Gathering Mass); in general, we try to gather an hour before each liturgy to set up, tune and have a brief warm-up. Subsequent rehearsal times will be arranged following the first Mass.

Altar Serving

If anyone wishes to help Altar Serve for our various pilgrimage liturgies, please see Cn. John Cooke, our Pilgrimage M.C., in the Sacristy 20 minutes before the liturgy starts. If you are under 18 you will need to be accompanied to the sacristy and collected by an adult (parent/guardian).

Glanfield Night Prayer

The Glanfield Children's Group, an integral part of the CA Pilgrimage for over 35 years, gathers each evening (except when the CA leads the Torchlight Procession) at 8.00pm on the ground floor of the Hotel Méditerranée. All are welcome!

Communion

If you require a gluten free host, please contact your diocesan or group director, or see one of the liturgy team before Mass.

Collections

Collections will be taken at each Mass. You may wish to spread your donation across the days. It is the CA's tradition to take a separate retiring collection, to support the ministry of the Glanfield Children's Group, after the Thanksgiving Mass on Thursday.

Weather warning

The weather in Lourdes is somewhat unpredictable but it can be very hot. In these conditions you can lose a lot of fluid, especially if you are working. It is important to drink plenty of water. Tap water is safe. The sun in Lourdes can be very strong. You should use sun cream and wear a hat. When abroad it is not uncommon to suffer from diarrhoea. The best treatment is to drink plenty of fluids and to rest.

Shoes and blisters

You will spend hours on your feet, so wear comfortable shoes and treat any blisters promptly. Simple plasters may be purchased in the local chemist (e.g. 88 Rue De La Grotte. "What three words" reference "held.monk.putty".)

Levy

To support the Sanctuaries and the CA we collect a levy of £30 per pilgrim -although there are exceptions. The levy is included in the charges made by Tangney Tours, but for all other CA pilgrims will be collected either by your group leader or individually, as appropriate.

Talks and other events

There will be an interesting programme of talk and other events. You are very welcome at these. Please look at the hotel notice boards for details of subject matter speakers, times and location.



GENERAL LOURDES DAILY TIMETABLE

Masses in various languages (in addition to the daily Pilgrimage Mass)

Grotto: daily at 6.00, 6.45, 7.30, 8.30 & 10.00am.

Daily Mass in English: 9am Chapel of Saints Cosmas and Damian. (6.15pm Vigil Mass on Saturday.

Details of Masses at other places are on noticeboards outside the particular venues.

Confessions (in English)

Daily in the Chapel of Reconciliation adjacent to the statue of the Crowned Virgin: 10am to 11.15am and 2.30pm - 6.00pm.

Washing in the waters of the Spring—Water Gesture

The baths are open 9am to 11.30am and 2.00pm -5.00 pm.

Our Lady told Saint Bernadette "Go, drink of the spring and wash yourself there". Although the Water Gesture, which has replaced immersion in the Baths, is simpler, queues may still be long. It is best to arrive 30 minutes before opening time. The gates may close up to 30 minutes before the advertised closing time, depending on the numbers already waiting. A full immersion bath may again be possible in particular circumstances, and is by prior application.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament

The Blessed Sacrament is exposed for silent prayer and adoration each day from 9am in the Adoration Chapel, on the left side of St Bernadette Church, until the 5.00pm Blessed Sacrament Procession. Exposition continues afterwards in the Adoration Chapel until 8pm. There is also Exposition at the Grotto from 11.30om to midnight.

Blessed Sacrament Procession and Blessing of the Sick

Daily at 5.00pm in the Basilica of St Pius X. (International choir rehearsal at 4.00pm) The procession starts from the Prairie, opposite the Grotto. We gather at 4.30pm by the river, just beyond St Bernadette's Church. In wet or very hot weather the whole procession may be moved to the Basilica.



Torchlight Marian Procession

Daily at 9.00pm. The procession starts from the Grotto. Look for our banners on the Grotto side of the bridge across to the Accueil/St Bernadette's Church. Anyone is welcome to join the choir on the steps in front of the Rosary Basilica at 8.30pm.

International Mass

Sunday and Wednesday at 9.30am in the (Underground) Basilica of St Pius X. Arrive at least an hour beforehand to be sure of getting a seat.

Rosary in English - At the Grotto 2.30pm on Monday and Wednesdays.



LOURDES 2024 PASTORAL THEME

"...come in procession"

"Come in procession" is the pastoral invitation for this year in Lourdes. It is said that in Bernadette's dialect, the word for "procession" and the word for "pilgrimage" are the same. What might that tell us, do you think?

One thing that you might like to reflect on is what "coming in procession" might do for us. And what, do you think, might it do for those who are with us in Lourdes as "assisted pilgrims"? Do you think that at home they often have the experience of being important, and that sense of identity that comes from being together in a crowd? How do you think they might be feeling in Lourdes today?

Is it a good thing to "come in procession"? What effect does it, or will it (if you have not been with us before) have on you? Bernadette heard the lady address her, with immense courtesy: will you do me the favour of coming here for a fortnight? How did the invitation come to us? Did we experience it as an invitation?

And many people experience this as a double "encounter", with God and with other pilgrims, slowly becoming part of a community. This is something that is very often lacking in our bruised and battered world. You might perhaps reflect that a really important moment in our pilgrimage to Lourdes might be when we accept the invitation to the sacrament of reconciliation. Confession in Lourdes can be a wonderful experience, especially for those who have not been for some time. And we might remember the Lady's request that Bernadette pray to God for sinners. That word certainly includes each of us.

Then there is that other aspect of "pilgrimage". The effect of it is very often to change us utterly; and we discover that this has happened to us when we get home, and see how we behave there, and how our lives touch those of others. Many people like to express this by way of candles, perhaps near to a cherished icon, or picture of the Grotto, or a tiny bottles of Lourdes water. You might like to give one of these to someone at home who is unable to be in Lourdes this year.

At the end of this year's pilgrimage, it will be good to ask "How did it change me?"

Daily Reflections from Fr Nick King SJ

Day 1 Saturday 24th August.

This is the beginning of our pilgrimage, and we shall not be celebrating the feast of the mysterious St Bartholomew.

Welcome mass: the blessing of the helpers' hands. This is a powerful gesture, reminding us that we are not here because we are so good at our normal Lourdes activities; we are here because our world is in need of it, and we cannot manage it without the blessing of God and the invitation of Our Lady.

Day 2 Sunday 25th August

21st Sunday of Ordinary Time

Ideally we should all join the International Mass, a wonderful statement of this very Catholic event that is a Lourdes pilgrimage. Have a look at today's gospel, and the temptation to abandon the Lord: the disciples grumble "this is hard talk. Who can listen to him?" Then, when Jesus asks if they are going to join the exodus, Peter (who does not always manage to get it right) responds on our behalf, "Lord – who else are we to go to? It is you who have the words of eternal life". Have you ever felt the temptation to jump ship? If so, try and make Peter's words your own: "we know that you are the Holy One of God".

Day 3: Monday August 26th

Today we can experience the invitation to look for God, to make a procession to meet him. The gospel for today tells us how to meet him: "I am the Vine, and you are the branches". What is our relationship to him? Does it change during our time in Lourdes? Today we have the pilgrimage "service of reconciliation". Would it help our pilgrimage/procession if we were to make use of this precious sacrament?

Day 4: Tuesday August 27th

This is the feast of St Monica; we are invited to hear her desperate prayers for her son, who became St Augustine. Our mass today will take place in the extraordinary setting of the Cite St Pierre. It will also be the annual mass for our Hospitalité. The gospel carries a striking invitation to recognise what are the things that really matter. Let us pray that like St Augustine we shall each learn

in Lourdes what they are.

Day 5: Wednesday August 28th

This is our "Grotto mass", and if we have grown into the atmosphere of Lourdes, we shall find ourselves deeply touched by being actually there where it all happened in 1858. Look at that lovely statue (though Bernadette said that it was nowhere near as lovely as the reality), and feel the unfailing invitation of the One who appeared there. And learn once more how to pray, just as Bernadette did in this place.

Day 6: Thursday August 29th

Today it will be our turn in the Baths, with the immensely moving "Water Gesture". We also have the wonderful "Service of Anointing", as we approach the end of the pilgrimage/procession. Note the lovely words of Jesus in the gospel for today: "come to me, all you who are weary and over-burdened, and I shall give you rest." Those words will be waiting for us when we get back to wherever this procession/pilgrimage started.

And our mass today will be the mass of thanksgiving, generously provided for by our children and their carers. Listen to Jesus' generous words in the gospel: "take it – this is my body".

Day 7: Friday 30th August:

SS Margaret Clitherow, Anne Line, & Margaret Ward. Many of us will be on the journey back when this mass takes place. What shall we take back from this procession-pilgrimage of ours? They are waiting for us, those whom we have to serve, in whom we find the presence of God, and our lives are transformed. Has this pilgrimage changed you in any way?

(Readings of the day)

First reading

Ezekiel 37:1-14

A vision of Israel's death and resurrection

The hand of the Lord was laid on me, and he carried me away by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley, a valley full of bones. He made me walk up and down among them. There were vast quantities of these bones on the ground the whole length of the valley; and they were quite dried up. He said to me, 'Son of man, can these bones live?' I said, 'You know, Lord.' He said, 'Prophesy over these bones. Say, "Dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. The Lord says this to these bones: I am now going to make the breath enter you, and you will live. I shall put sinews on you, I shall make flesh grow on you, I shall cover you with skin and give you breath, and you will live; and you will learn that I am the Lord."' I prophesied as I had been ordered. While I was prophesying, there was a noise, a sound of clattering; and the bones joined together. I looked, and saw that they were covered with sinews; flesh was growing on them and skin was covering them, but there was no breath in them. He said to me, 'Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man. Say to the breath, "The Lord says this: Come from the four winds, breath; breathe on these dead; let them live!" I prophesied as he had ordered me, and the breath entered them; they came to life again and stood up on their feet, a great, an immense army.

Then he said, 'Son of man, these bones are the whole House of Israel. They keep saying, "Our bones are dried up, our hope has gone; we are as good as dead." So prophesy. Say to them, "The Lord says this: I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this – it is the Lord who speaks."'



The 14 Stations of the Cross represent events from Jesus' passion and death. At each station we use our senses and our imagination to reflect prayerfully upon Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection.

The High Stations are only accessible for the physically able as they weave up along a stony path through a steep, wooded area. Please ensure you are wearing comfortable shoes and take a bottle of water. Sorry, no wheelchairs.

For our Way of the Cross, we use simple wooden crosses as we reflect on Jesus' journey.

The new Way of the Cross is found on the far side of the Prairie. Made for the 150th Anniversary of the apparitions in 2008, it is accessible for Assisted Pilgrims. The stations are unusual, beautiful sculptures, designed to be touched. A booklet about them is available in the bookshop. There is also another Way of the Cross, in glass, in the Underground Basilica.

THURSDAY 29th AUGUST

Visit to the Baths

Washing in the waters of the spring—the Lourdes water gesture

"Drink at the spring and bathe in it."

We gather at the raised altar opposite the Grotto on the far side of the river, at 8.30am

Liturgy:

Leader

Welcome everyone. As we move down to the Piscines together this morning, let us consider this as answering Our Lady's request "for people to come in procession; to drink of the spring; and wash themselves there".

We begin with an Invocation of the ninth apparition.

On the 25th February 1858, the occasion of the 9th apparition, Our Lady of Lourdes asked Bernadette to "Go and drink at the spring and wash yourself in it". After a moment of confusion, when Bernadette thought Our Lady was referring to the nearby River Gave, Our Lady made a sign with her finger directing Bernadette to go under the rock of the cave. Bernadette described the moment "I went there and found water which was like mud."

We can imagine that Bernadette came to a standstill at the end of the grotto on the left-hand side. Her face was full of sadness, suffering and worrying. She bent down to the muddy ground and started scratching the ground making a small crater. She draws from this mud which has become more liquid, tries to drink it but discards it once, twice, three times. At last, digging again she carefully draws from the dirty water and drinks from her cupped hand and drawing again she smears it on her face. Having done this Bernadette pulls some grass that was growing at the bottom of the grotto.

Finally, Bernadette returns to her home with her face still stained with red mud ignoring the crowd, accompanied by her aunt and godmother who were embarrassed by the gestures her goddaughter had made. Everyone in the grotto is bemused. In the town Bernadette is questioned and she explains the meaning of what has happened. "The Lady told me "Go and drink and wash yourself in the spring". Not seeing any water, I went towards the Gave, and she

pointed with her finger to look under the rock. Then she said' to eat of the grass that is there'."

Leader:

We now have readings for prayer and meditation.

First Reader:

On the last day of the festival, the great day, while Jesus was standing there, he cried out: "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said: Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water. Now he said this about the Spirit which believers in him were to receive."

PAUSE

Leader:

Let us spend time reflecting with our Pope on the meaning of water in Christian life.

Leader: The significance of water is more than merely symbolic. At Lourdes it is also; it is physically and bodily engaged with, as we pilgrims wash in it and drink it, an incorporation of the very object itself.

Today we do this contemplatively, in remembrance and imitation of Bernadette's initial instruction from Our Lady.

In the words of Pope Francis: "For us Christians, water represents an essential element of purification and of life. We think immediately of baptism, the sacrament of our rebirth. Water made holy by the Spirit is the matter by which God has given us life and renewed us; it is the blessed source of undying life. For Christians of different confessions, baptism also represents the real and irreplaceable point of departure for experiencing an ever more authentic fraternity on the way to full unity. Jesus, during his mission, promised a water capable of quenching human thirst for ever. He prophesied, "If any one thirst, let him come to me and drink". To drink from Jesus means to encounter him personally as the Lord, drawing from his words the meaning of life. May the words he spoke from the cross — "I thirst"—echo constantly in our hearts. The Lord continues to ask that his thirst be quenched; he thirsts for love. He asks us to give him to drink in all those who thirst in our own day, and to say to

them, "I was thirsty and you gave me to drink". To give to drink, in the global village, does not only entail personal gestures of charity, but also concrete choices and a constant commitment to ensure to all the primary good of water."

PAUSE

Second Reader:

Together, let us say The Apostle's creed.

All:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead;

he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.

Amen.

Second Reader:

Let us say Psalm 42 together

Third Reader:

Let us spend time reflecting on Jesus and the Woman of Samaria.

Reader: A Samaritan woman came to draw water and Jesus said to her 'Give me a drink.' The Samaritan woman said to him, 'How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria? (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans). Jesus answered her: 'If you knew the gift of God and who it is that is saying to you, "Give me a drink, you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water. The woman said to him, sir you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob who gave us the well and with his sons and his flocks drank from it.? Jesus said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again but those who drink of the water that I shall give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life. The woman said to him. Sir give me this water that I may never be thirsty again or have to come here to draw water.'

PAUSE

Leader:

Taking the spring water—practicalities.

After our preparation, we will now cross the river, and we will gather on the benches outside the baths and wait to be directed by the Hospitaliers. (HNDL) After a period of waiting (during which you may reflect further on the themes of our liturgy and other relevant gospel readings), you (with your group of friends or family, if you wish) will be guided to the bath area and welcomed into a cubicle. The curtains will be drawn behind you to ensure a peaceful area and quiet moment, just for you.

You will then be taken as a group or as an individual guided by the HNDL helpers to the top of the steps which go down to the bath. The baths themselves will be empty and you will be asked to remain on the top step. The helper will ask you

to face our Lady and quietly, from the depth of you heart, to present your petitions. You will then be asked to cup your hands.

One by one, the helper will pour spring water from a stone jug into your hands three times. You will be invited to wash your hands, to wash your face and then to drink.

A prayer of thanksgiving will then be said with the helper, before being directed to the exit.



FRIDAY 30th AUGUST

First reading

We preach a crucified Christ, the power and wisdom of God

Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed. The language of the cross may be illogical to those who are not on the way to salvation, but those of us who are on the way see it as God's power to save. As scripture says: I shall destroy the wisdom of the wise and bring to nothing all the learning of the learned. Where are the philosophers now? Where are the scribes? Where are any of our thinkers today? Do you see now how God has shown up the foolishness of human wisdom? If it was God's wisdom that human wisdom should not know God, it was because God wanted to save those who have faith through the foolishness of the message that we preach. And so, while the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

AN EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

You may like to use this to prepare for the Penitential Liturgy on Monday, or indeed at any time during the pilgrimage. When we approach the sacrament of Reconciliation, we confess sins that have broken our relationship with God and with our neighbour, where we have failed in genuine love. Ask the Holy Spirit to guide you as you reflect on your need for God's mercy.



- Do I put God first in my life, loving him and serving him?
- Is my life grounded in a daily encounter with Christ? Do I take time each day for prayer,
 - intimate heart-to-heart conversation with the Lord, listening to his word?
- Do I thank God for all his gifts? Do I show gratitude to all those who serve me?
 Do I share generously of my time, my talents, my treasure?
- Do I share my faith through my words and actions? Do I radiate the joy of Christ, or do I complain and focus on what is wrong in the world?
- Have I missed opportunities to nurture my faith, or wasted time that could have been spent serving God or with God? Have I neglected prayer, intentionally missed Mass, or ignored my need for Reconciliation?
- Do I truly love my neighbour as myself? Do I respect the rights and dignity of others?
- Have I responded generously and reached out to those in need the poor, the lonely, refugees, the marginalised, the outcast - and shown them love, compassion, hospitality and care; or have I avoided opportunities to serve them?

- Have I discriminated against others based on their gender, race, or religion?
- Have I given food to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, welcomed strangers, clothed the naked, visited the sick or those in prison? Do I recognise Christ in them?
- Do I give time to my family, friends and co-workers, accompanying them in their hopes and fears, joys and sorrows; or am I too caught up in my own life?
- Do I show love and respect to my parents, my spouse, my children?
- Have I lost my temper or used harsh words?
- Am I patient with other people's faults, realising how patient God is with my own? Have I been merciful, as the Father is merciful? Do I extend Christ's compassion and mercy to others or am I biased, quick to judge people and jump to conclusions?
- Do I forgive from the heart, pray for and love those who persecute me, or people I find difficult; or do I respond with anger, frustration and a desire for revenge?
 - Am I holding a grudge or refusing to forgive? Am I tolerant of those who annoy me?
- Have I been understanding when others let me down? Am I a peacemaker?
- Have I excluded others intentionally or hurt someone by my selfish behaviour?
- Have I judged others by appearance, said unkind things or gossiped about them?
- Have I been lazy and held back, affecting others or letting them take the strain?
- Am I honest, fair and just? Have I stolen or damaged another's property, or lied or cheated in order to gain material goods? Have I repaid those whom I have wronged?
- Am I driven by money or possessions rather than by love? Do I allow clothing, technology or other material things to take away from my relationship with God, or to replace God or relationships with other people? Am I jealous or envious of what others have - their goods, wealth or status?
- Have I acted in a way that might have led to infidelity?
- Do I care for and protect the environment, God's creation, our common home? Have I been wasteful in my consumption of the earth's resources? Am I greedy?





Catholic Association Hospitalité

The Catholic Association Hospitalité of Our Lady of Lourdes exists to bind together the volunteer pilgrims, who help in the service of all pilgrims – especially 'assisted pilgrims' – during the CA Pilgrimage: doctors, nurses, handmaids (female helpers), brancardiers (male helpers), chaplains, and praying members. The CA Hospitalité has a strong social and spiritual element and is affiliated to the <u>Hospitalité Notre Dame de Lourdes</u> (the central Hospitalité coordinating most volunteers in Lourdes throughout the year).

The principal aims and objects of the CA Hospitalité are:

- a. To serve assisted pilgrims going to Lourdes on the CA Pilgrimage and to help in the smooth running of religious and other activities involving CA pilgrims, under the direction of the Pilgrimage Director and Heads of Service.
- b. To strengthen the bonds between its members and to help them maintain their obligations as Christians and their devotion to Our Lady. This service consists especially of looking after the material needs of the assisted pilgrims although the obligation of a member of the CA Hospitalité is not limited to material work. Members will be expected to help all pilgrims to benefit fully from the religious and social benefits of a pilgrimage to Lourdes.

Volunteer pilgrims may apply for membership of the CA Hospitalité on conclusion of their first pilgrimage. The CA Hospitalité Council may admit to the membership any person who, in their opinion, renders suitable services to the sick. Following approval by the CA Hospitalité Council, applicants will be admitted to ordinary membership during their next pilgrimage to Lourdes, having made an Act of Consecration before the Chaplain. After working with the Pilgrimage for a further two years as members, helpers may apply for admission to full membership of the Hospitalité the following year. The CA Hospitalité Council may also invite 'Assisted Pilgrims' to become full members of the Hospitalité who support the organization through their prayers.

CA Hospitalité members are encouraged to take the Spirit of Lourdes home with them and to promote the CA pilgrimage, in particular by recruiting other volunteers and by making known the facilities provided for Assisted Pilgrims.

SOCIAL MEDIA AND PHOTOGRAPHY POLICY

Introduction

Social Media is a popular way to share experiences of Lourdes and to maintain friendships made on Pilgrimage. However, the Catholic Association (CA) has a duty to protect the dignity of its members, both those who help and those who receive help.

Social Media

Social Media are websites and applications that enable users to create and share content or to participate in social networking. These include Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, tumblr, Flickr, Threads, Instagram and others.

All pilgrims must keep an appropriate distance online, just as they would in the offline world. Technology increases the potential for messages to be taken out of context, misinterpreted or forwarded to others. CA members must be aware that messages published in the public domain are there permanently for others to access, change and share. The key principles in digital and social media use are the same as in any professional interaction. CA members:

- should reflect the positive message of the CA Pilgrimage;
- must ensure they are not put in the position of having to deal with situations or information that they are not confident or comfortable to deal with;
- should not disclose information that is financial, operational and legal in nature, as well as any information that pertains to our assisted pilgrims (APs) or volunteers.

Photography

Permission must be sought before photographing or videoing a particular individual, especially during religious services, remembering to take extra care with children and vulnerable adults.

Taking photos of people during Confession is never acceptable.

Copyright must be respected. Images and content produced by others must be credited.

Ensure permission is gained from an individual or their responsible adult before 'tagging' their image online. Any hashtag relating to the CA must not damage its reputation.

Reputation

All images in the public domain which could be linked to the CA must uphold its reputation as a caring, responsible, and sensitive organisation.

Inappropriate content such as racial, ethnic, sexual, religious, and physical disability slurs are not tolerated.











Catholic Association Code of Good Conduct

- We are called upon to be exemplary models of good behaviour and spiritual faith. All pilgrimage volunteers are committed to being positive role models and to build the confidence of vulnerable adults and children that we are working with on pilgrimage.
- Pilgrimage volunteers are expected to:

Promote Wellbeing

- Ensure the safety of all vulnerable adults and children by ensuring pilgrimage activities are safely planned and effectively supervised;
- Foster teamwork and co-operation between everybody, promoting trust and mutual respect;
- Discourage and stop rough or dangerous play, bullying, inappropriate language or other inappropriate behaviour;
- Treat all vulnerable adults and children fairly and not show favouritism;
- Be positive, approachable and promote the objectives of the CA pilgrimage always;
- Listen sensitively and encourage clear and respectful communication between pilgrims, adapting your style to meet individual needs and understanding;
- Respond to concerns and allegations promptly and appropriately in line with national procedures reporting safeguarding concerns to the Pilgrimage Safeguarding Officer.

Promote Safety, Autonomy & Dignity

- Prioritise the safety of vulnerable adults and children above all else taking (and following) necessary precautions to prevent harm eg; adequate supervision during the day and night and working in pairs especially supporting with intimate care.
- Ensure the rights and responsibilities of vulnerable adults and children are upheld;
- Promote the full participation and involvement of all vulnerable adults and children, recognising and addressing any additional or specific needs.

- Constructively challenge all discrimination and encourage all pilgrims to not discriminate on the grounds of age, gender, ability, social class, race, cultural background, religious beliefs or sexual identity;
- Respect, promote and support the right of vulnerable adults and children to make their own choices and decisions, provided this does not threaten the rights, safety and legitimate interests of others;
- Respect the right of vulnerable adults and children to personal privacy;
- Encourage vulnerable adults and children to take responsibility for their own self-care as far as possible e.g. assistance with toileting and dressing;
- Respect and listen to the opinions of vulnerable adults and children
- Encourage vulnerable adults and children to point out behaviors or attitudes that they do not like;
- Encourage vulnerable adults and children to take responsibility for their own conduct;
- Administer first aid in the presence of others, without removing the clothing unless necessary;
- Inform the CA Healthcare Team if you are concerned about the health of a vulnerable adult or child and call for aid from the emergency services, if required

Boundaries and Power

- Establish and maintain appropriate boundaries between pilgrimage volunteers, vulnerable adults and children.
- Not abuse the position of trust for personal benefit e.g. financial gain, sexual gratification;
- Be conscious of explicit and implicit power vested in the role of group leader or volunteer helper.
- Acknowledge the limitations of time, experience, skill and competence – know where and how to ask for support when needed;

- Deal with differences in opinion with respect;
- Work to people's strengths, and never bully, abuse, manipulate or denigrate.

Personal Conduct

- Attend/ complete relevant training offered.
- Act always in accordance with the core values of the Catholic faith and ensure that their behaviour does not bring the church into disrepute;
- Provide an example you wish others to follow;
- Dress appropriately and work in a way that is honest, reliable and transparent, never seeking to deceive or manipulate;
- Refrain from using blasphemous, violent, discriminatory, or offensive language and behaviour;
- Refrain from smoking, vaping, consuming excessive alcohol or using illegal drugs. When responsible for a vulnerable adult or child do not consume any alcohol.
- Not engage in any form of sexual relations (including verbal banter, flirtation, using one's gaze to signal attraction, etc.) with vulnerable adults and children, or adults for whom you have a supervisory or supportive role.
- To follow the direction of pilgrimage appointed leaders, including the Heads of Service, Team Leaders and Healthcare Professionals, ensuring promptness, reliability and diligence in the service of the assisted pilgrims and the smooth running of the pilgrimage.

Any breaches of the Code of Conduct will be addressed by the relevant Head of Service: Chief Brancardier/ Chief Handmaid, Chief Doctor/ Nurse etc. More serious or persistent breaches may result in formal action being taken to address the concerns. All concerns or allegations in relation to the abuse of a child or adult at risk will be dealt with using the national safeguarding policy and procedures in relation to the management of allegations and concerns.

WHAT TO DO...

If a pilgrim discloses to you abuse by someone else:

- Advise the person that you must pass on this information.
- Allow him or her to speak without interruption, accepting what is said.
- Do not investigate, i.e. do not ask questions.
- Alleviate feelings of guilt and isolation. Do not pass judgment.
- Let them know that they are right to have shared this information.
- Report the matter as soon as possible to the leader in charge of your group/ team, and/or the Pilgrimage Safeguarding Officer.

If you suspect a pilgrim is being abused emotionally, physically, financially or sexually, whether in Lourdes or in their normal environment:

 Report the matter to the leader in charge of your group/ team, and ensure it is reported to the Pilgrimage Safeguarding Officer as soon as possible.

If you receive an allegation about any pilgrim or about yourself:

- Immediately tell the leader in charge of your group/team, and/or the Pilgrimage Safeguarding Officer.
- Try to ensure that no one is placed in a position that could cause further compromise.

In all cases:

- Any discussion concerning possible abuse must be recorded in writing as soon
 as possible. The record should reflect the conversation as accurately as
 possible using the pilgrim's own words. The record should be signed and
 dated, noting the time and location of the conversation or incident, and
 include the names of anyone else present.
- The facts must be reported to the Pilgrimage Safeguarding Officer.
- The listener must refer, but not investigate, and should not contact the subject of the allegation.
- There must be no promise of confidentiality, as any information received may have to be acted on by other authorities.

Financial help may be available, either through your Diocesan/Group Director, or through any member of the Catholic Association Hospitalité.

Men and women of all ages and backgrounds come to Lourdes as volunteer helpers to answer Our Lady's request for people to 'come in procession' but, more importantly, they come in response to the command of her son Jesus to love God and to love our neighbours as ourselves (Mark 12:29-31). These volunteer helpers, who are pilgrims themselves, strive to encounter Jesus in each pilgrim, caring for their physical, emotional and spiritual well-being. The CA Hospitalité includes doctors and nurses, as well as non-medical helpers, who are known as brancardiers (male) and handmaids (female).

If you or a friend would be interested in coming on Pilgrimage next year as a volunteer helper, please let us know at: chiefs@catholicassociation.co.uk and someone will be in contact with you as soon as possible. The minimum age for helping is 16 and there is no maximum age. All are welcome and all have an important contribution to make to the community that we form during our pilgrimage week. Additionally, if you have children, the CA organises the **Helpers' Children's Programme (HCP)**, which offers a programme of activities for the children (0 - 16) of registered helpers and registered assisted pilgrims.

Getting around

What3words is an app you can choose to install on your smart phone. Every part of the world has been split into 3 metre squares. The system was originally designed for emergency services to find people when there are few identifying features e.g. on a beach or in a field.

Every square has been allocated three words to identify it. The three words allocated are apparently totally random and, as the squares are not very big, a site often has many squares near/ within it E.g. the three words "response.snooty.greeting" identify a square at the Crowned Virgin Statue in the Domain. "water.fizzy.kneeled" also identifies a square on the edge of the statue. Whilst both sets of words are randomly allocated, there does seem to be some influence on the second set!

Below, as a trial this year, we have listed the What3Words references for sites in Lourdes. If you find any do not correctly identify a site, have a site you would like to add or feel there is a better square for a site, please provide feedback to Paul Devereux, who can be found holding a guitar in the music group.
