# **Foundation Announcements**

### **Art Fuller (Master Gardener Foundation of Cowlitz County, President)**

March is almost over and spring has arrived, which means our gardening season is getting ready to start, our Communication, Demonstration Garden, Education, Farmers Market, Greenhouse, Plant and Insect Clinic, Plant Sale and State Representative teams are fully engaged and are ramping up to support all the upcoming events. This is the busiest time of the year and your support is greatly appreciated. You will have many opportunities to log in certifying hours into GivePulse.

So, before the season really starts to kick off, I would like to share and reflect on some of the accomplishments we have completed.

Our 18 Zoom and live gardening workshops given Jan - Mar have once again been well received by 757 listeners, not only from Cowlitz County but throughout the state and some out-of-state participation. Our membership has grown to 88 certified Master Gardeners with our foundation at 46 strong. Gary Fredricks has a great Master Gardener volunteer certification program started with 34 members working on their WSU Master Gardener certification and are actively engaged along with our certified Master Gardener volunteers and Foundation members in making our program a huge success county and statewide. The Seattle Northwest Flower and Garden Festival booth that was supported by us, 11 other counties and the Master Gardener Foundation of Washington Stated was a huge success with approximately 3000 contacts. **Thank you for all you do to support our great program.** 

As we start into the gardening season, I would like to remind everyone to have patience and do not rush the season, work smarter not harder and enjoy the upcoming season.

### **Gardening tip:**

Most of us have got tomatoes and peppers already started and they have germinated. A lot of gardeners up-pot their tomatoes and peppers from seedling trays to 4 inch pots to gallon pots. Wait a little longer on some before up-potting and transplant them from the trays to gallon pots. The reason for waiting a little longer especially on tomatoes is to get the tomatoes a little bigger. Then bury your tomatoes to leave about one inch of stem and leaves above the soil level and compare the growth results to see which gives you a better plant. You will be surprised at the results. I have been up-potting from seedling trays to gallon pots for many years, saving me a huge amount of time skipping that intermediate potting.

The Winchell's conducted an experiment on peppers and here are their results. Both peppers were started at the same time. The pepper on the left was transplanted into a four-inch pot then into a one-gallon pot. The pepper on the right was planted directly from the seedling tray to the one-gallon pot. As you can see the growth difference between the two plants. There is no comparison!


# MGs reporting: Gardening Warm-Ups

# MGs reporting: MGFWS Awards

### **Master Gardener Foundation of Washington State Awards**

The State Master Gardener of the Year (MGoY) Award is to identify and reward the active WSU Extension Master Gardener (EMG) Volunteer who has best demonstrated a commitment to the Master Gardener Program, provided leadership at the state and county levels, has had significant statewide or broader impact on the MG program, and has left a lasting contribution to the WSU EMG Program. The State MGoY Award is focused on recognizing volunteers that have had a positive impact on the WSU EMG Program across the state. The recipients of the State MGoY Award in the past and future have and will make contributions in a number of areas, having had a positive impact regionally to statewide. The award's recipients have provided leadership within and outside their own county. They have used their own skills of teaching, mentoring or developing ideas, served on committees and project teams for the WSU EMG Program, MGFWS or the AEC. Every nominee's contribution is unique and no candidate is expected to have contributed in all of the Master Gardeners Program. All nominations are accepted. However, the nominee with the greatest breadth and depth of contributions and positive impacts will likely receive the annual award. The only sure disqualifier is when no one becomes the nominator and does the hard work of preparing and submitting a nomination!

<u>The MGFWS Ed LaCrosse Distinguished Service Award</u> recognizes a person who has had a significant statewide or broader impact on the WSU Extension Master Gardener Program or who has acted on behalf of the MGFWS board with commitment. Their contributions have value and are sustainable and replicable across the state. Their contributions have become a lasting legacy. Nominees need not be a WSU Master Gardener.

The MGFWS Media Award recognizes an individual who frequently contributes to one or more Washington media covering garden topics, education, demonstrations, etc. emphasizing the WSU Extension Master Gardener Program and making a significant and enduring positive impact on the program. The recipients show mastery of one or more forms of media – print, radio, web, social, photography, film, video, music, and/or mobile apps. They have attained prominence in their chosen media as evidenced by shows, followings, views, publishing, sales, etc. The key elements of the recipients work distinguishes their contributions as uniquely worthy.


