MGs reporting: Proposal for Master Gardeners

Proposal for Master Gardeners taking over Fostering Mason Bees — by Billie Bevers

Take over approximately 40 locations within 4 counties. The process involves delivery (or they pick up at the demo garden) bees, boxes, and nesting material in early spring, and pickup of cocoons, boxes, and nesting material in June. The bees should be stored in a shed or other cool place until fall harvest. Once the harvest is completed, the bees should be refrigerated until spring when the process starts again.

What we will do:

Donate to the master gardeners 5,000 mason bees* for spring delivery. Donate to the master gardeners all necessary boxes and nesting material* for spring delivery.

Give the master gardeners list of foster names, locations, and bee data. Notify the foster list of change in process.

Donate non frost-free refrigerator space for mason bees for 2 years. Introduce master gardeners to wholesale connection for selling extra bees**.

Be "on call" for advice, assistance, and consulting.

Be available for trainings and talks.



We will continue to be Fern and Rosemary and to maintain our own bees and live up to our previous obligations.


