

Episode 149: Pope Shark

Sally: Everybody Hates Rand is a Wheel of Time podcast that will contain spoilers for all 14 books. So if you're anti-spoiler, pause this, read all 14 books, and come back. We'll be here. Waiting.

Emily: Our title is a joke and is meant to be taken as such. In the context of this podcast, "everybody" refers to us and our cat. You are free to feel however you want about Rand, who is a fictional character. Don't DM us.

(theme song by Glynna MacKenzie plays)

Emily: What's happening?

Sally: Oh, um -- I wish I could say something, like, important was happening, but, um, my friend Julie just told me that, um, a -- a -- a friend of hers posted tasteful nudes on Instagram to celebrate the anniversary of her father's passing. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) Well -- (laugh) The end of that sentence --

Sally: (laugh) I know!

Emily: Like, gutpunched me.

Sally: It, like, takes you out like a train.

Emily: What the fuck.

Sally: Yeah. So Julie is like, "I'm literally dying," And I'm like, yeah, like, the secondhand embarrassment is horrific.

Emily: Is she legit like, "My poor dad," or is she like, "LOL, my dead dad"?

Sally: Well, she's -- her caption is like, "One year without the man who raised me. It's time for reflection --"

Emily: "In my nude body."

Sally: "And grief and celebration," in her, like, tasteful nudes. She's got, like, one of these --

Emily: Side-boobs.

Sally: Where she's -- yeah, like, kind of covering it, and then she's got, like, her leggies in the bathtub. Yeah. And it's like, if you want to post your, quote unquote, tasteful nudes on Instagram, please feel empowered to do so. Just do not connect them to the one-year anniversary of your father dying. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh)

Sally: Like, I feel like Freud would have a field day with this. (laugh)

Emily: If there was a tasteful way to do it, then I would fully put on Instagram the bruise that is currently on my ass. (laugh)

Sally: Oh, nooo. Did it finally show up?

Emily: Yeah, it's really hilarious-looking. The other -- last Friday, I sat up in my room watching "Kong: Skull Island" --

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) With Devin and Janet, which was fucking stupid, and then I get up to go downstairs when we're done talking, and immediately -- well, I pick up Tybalt to take him downstairs -- and halfway down the stairs -- I was in my sock feet on the carpet -- and I just, like -- (laugh) fell right on my booty.

Sally: It was so sad.

Emily: Um. And my butt was very sore for a couple of days.

Sally: Yeah, I bet.

Emily: It's much less so now, but there is a pretty funny bruise developing.

Sally: Is it -- how big?

Emily: Mmm.

Sally: This big?

Emily: Yeah, about that big.

Sally: Dang, girl, that's a big booty bruise.

Emily: It's, like, green. That's how my body bruises.

Sally: Ooh. That's wretched. You just got, like, a full green apple on your bum.

Emily: Yep. It's just like, "Heeeey."

Sally: We should draw a little stem and leaf on it.

Emily: (laugh)

Sally: That can be your tasteful way to do it.

Emily: "Look at this -- my one ass cheek with a bruise on it." (laugh)

Sally: Yeah. Very tasteful.

Emily: Oh, God.

Sally: I'm sorry about your bum bruise. One time, I fell down the stairs at my mom's house -- this was, like, right after we moved back from New York -- and she has wooden stairs.

Emily: Oh, yeah. Those are rough.

Sally: So I got, like, the nastiest bruise on my ass.

Emily: Ooh.

Sally: But I -- I understand your, like, impulse to be like, "I need to show people this bruise on my ass." It's like some switch is flipped in my brain --

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: And I'm like, "You wanna see the bruise on my ass?"

Emily: Well, it's like how, when you have any sort of injury, you say to everyone, "Do you want to see --" My -- my sister Anne is notorious for doing this.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: She says, "Do you want to see the gross --" Insert whatever injury she has --

Sally: Anne. (laugh)

Emily: She'll just, like, peel off her Band-Aid -- and I'm always like, "No," and then she shows me anyway. (laugh)

Sally: Yeah, well, that's sibling energy right there.

Emily: Yeah, it's just -- it's disgusting. And I get the impulse when it's bruises.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Less so with, like, open, gaping wounds.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: But, like, a bruise is just like, "You want to see something very funny?" Um -- what? Devin -- has been -- yeah. (laugh) Just cut it off right there.

Sally: (laugh) The nodding I just did was very patronizing. I'm sorry, Devin.

Emily: Well -- (laugh) He, um -- he asked -- he brought up -- have you seen the screencap from some animated, like, DC movie -- it's got, like, Harley Quinn in it or whatever -- and there's just, like, this anthropomorphic shark guy, whatever, and there's also, like, a grizzled, kind of Castiel motherfucker in, like, a trenchcoat, who is John Constantine --

Sally: 'Kay.

Emily: Who's a comics character. And the -- not just implication because it's very explicit -- is that he's, like, awkwardly seeing his ex, who is the anthropomorphic shark man. (laugh)

Sally: What?

Emily: So you're like, "Oh. John Constantine dated a shark ... man."

Sally: Cool.

Emily: Yeah, and you're like, rad, not only is he bisexual, but he's also into ... sharks.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Or something?

Sally: Hey.

Emily: Anyway, apparently Devin was watching that movie and was, like -- told me about it, and was like, "I would just kill for, like, a -- a -- a primetime drama of their relationship." Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Because it was definitely not, based on the characters themselves, just, like, a sex thing.

Sally: Ooh.

Emily: It was, like, a committed, loving relationship that just failed.

Sally: Aw, sad.

Emily: I'm like, "That's adorable, and I would write it if I could." And he's like, "Nothing's stopping you," and I'm like, "The amount of research I'd have to do to write any sort of comics-related thing is untenable."

Sally: What if we just made our own, and it was, um, some other gruff FBI-esque man, and he's dating, like, an anthropo -- po -- (laugh)

Emily: Oh, you're saying -- (laugh)

Sally: But it's, like, a different type of shark.

Emily: Just, like -- just, like, take that image --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And, like, roll with it.

Sally: And just, like, run with it. Yeah, but, like, instead of a great white or whatever, it's a hammerhead shark. Or --

Emily: Yeah, you're right. We could do that. It's basically what -- isn't there, like, an anthropomorphic shark guy in, uh, Breath of the Wild or something? With Link? Sally: Oh, I think you're right. I don't play the Zelda games, but I think --

Emily: What is it with twinks and giant sharks?

Sally: Well. Why don't you tell us? (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) I'll explore that. (sigh) Anyway, that was a sidebar that I can't wait to delete. What were we talking about? Bruises?

Sally: Bruises.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Um.

Emily: Bruises are fun.

Sally: Your character could be named, like, Jack Istanbul. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) Stupid. The adventures of Jack Istanbul and his -- the shark guy is named King

Shark, so it could be ... um ... Pope Shark.

Sally: (laugh) Jack Istanbul and --

Emily: (laugh) Why did I go from king to pope?

Sally: Maybe because of, like, Constantinople?

Emily: (laugh) Stupid.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: Ah, now this has to stay in. (laugh) Sorry, Devin.

Sally: (laugh) Um. This is Everybody Hates Rand. (laugh) And, against all evidence to the contrary, we are your friendly neighborhood Wheel of Time podcast. I'm Sally Goodger.

Emily: (laugh) I'm Pope Shark.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: I'm Emily Juchau.

Sally: No, this is Pope Shark.

Emily: Welcome to Pope Shark. Um. Fuck me running. OK.

Sally: (laugh) OK. Um, do I need to be closer to the mic? I tried to sit a little far away, 'cause I

was transcribing today, and my voice was very loud.

Emily: Last episode was really weird. It was picking you up a lot --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And me not so much. I don't know what the deal was.

Sally: So I'm trying to give you your screen time.

Emily: I don't need it. Um. I don't know, I think probably the mic is just ...

Sally: Present Mic.

Emily: Present Mic.

Sally: Now we've named it. It's Present Mic.

Emily: We can't go into a My Hero Academia tangent or we'll never leave. (laugh)

Sally: Maybe our next podcast will just be about My Hero Academia.

Emily: We'll have to wait a few years for all the good stuff to start coming out in the anime.

Sally: That is -- that is true. We could just read the manga.

Emily: (sigh)

Sally: You basically do.

Emily: I basic -- nah. Only for the last, like, few months. There's, like, a gap between where the

anime is and where --

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: I actually started paying attention to the manga that I have, like, no fucking clue, really.

Sally: It's OK. We'll just bring Ian in to tell us.

Emily: You're right, yeah. He could be our third co-host.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: That would be fun.

Sally: I mean, it would be fun. Except Ian would then realize what a flaming homosexual I am?

(laugh) I don't know if we've --

Emily: Yeah, that is a danger.

Sally: Quite had that conversation. (laugh)

Emily: 'Cause you'd be like, "I'm gay for everyone --"

Sally: Yeah, I'd be like --

Emily: "In My Hero Academia."

Sally: The bunny lady.

Emily: The bunny lady --

Sally: Is sexy.

Emily: She's, like, the definition of "step on me."

Sally: Yeah, like --

Emily: Or, like, "Crush me with her thighs."

Sally: Yeah, please crush my head between those thighs.

Emily: Rrrrggghhh. (laugh)

Sally: Um, and Ian would be like, "What?" (laugh) Um, so I don't know if that would work, but we could give it a shot.

Emily: OK. Fuckin' Lord of Chaos. Fuckin', uh.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: So we finally get to see the Saldaean horse stunts.

Sally: I know! Thank God. And Rand isn't even paying attention.

Emily: And there's, like, some random tangent about white stones? What was that about?

Sally: I don't know. I was like, is this the point?

Emily: What -- is -- happening with this subplot?!

Sally: I don't know.

Emily: I can't keep it straight.

Sally: It's like Robert Jordan went -- had some, like, bad edibles and was like, "This is what --"

Emily: It's like I'm reading the book for the first time. Except when I was reading the book for the first time, I was too caught up with the nine million other subplots to pay attention to this one.

Sally: Yeah.

ally. I call.

Emily: And now I'm like, "Ah, here's one that's actually mystifying."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: "Perhaps something will reveal itself to me at the end."

Sally: But seriously, I was like -- I was -- it was like I was reading it for the first time too. I was like, I do not remember these white stones.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: I don't remember the location where we're at, where nine thousand Saldaean cavalry are doing --

Emily: Somewhere outside of Caemlyn?

Sally: Are doing horse stunts.

Emily: Close enough for Rand to ride back, I guess.

Sally: Yeah. I mean, they're doing kick-ass horse stunts. Let's not skip over that. They are, like, doing flips --

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: And riding two horses with their feet on two saddles.

Emily: And the visual of Bashere just inspecting them while standing on his saddle --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Just, like, surveying his horse boys --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Is stunningly sexual.

Sally: I know.

Emily: I know we say this about Bashere all the time, but --

Sally: It is, like --

Emily: His vibes are so sexy.

Sally: Yeah. I mean, imagine this tiny man -- let's say Bashere is, like, five-four.

Emily: Yeah. I love that for him.

Sally: And he's just, like, this man with, like, a little silver in his hair, just, like, beautifully compact.

Emily: His big wife is going to pick him up --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Like he's a bundle of grapes.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And be like, "Hello."

Sally: And just devour him.

Emily: "My husband."

Sally: Yeah, and he'll be like, "Excellent." And he's just standing on a full-blown horse.

Emily: A full-ass horse.

Sally: Just standing on his two feet. As the horse is moving, and he's just inspecting his troops.

Emily: Anyway, this is why, when, if you ever get a graffitied Wheel of Time book from me, I cross out a lot of the country names and put in their real-world inspirations, like I just cross out "Andor" and put in "England." I frequently cross out "Saldaea" and put in "Mongolia," 'cause Mongolians were known for -- not their horse stunts specifically, but they were known for, um, having bows --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: That could be used, um, from horseback, and utilizing them to great effect.

Sally: Yes.

Emily: And I assume that, you know, if you're just, like, bored, living in the Mongolian steppes with your giant fleet of horses, that you would also start developing some sweet-ass stunts.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: But who's to say.

Sally: Are horses the, like, precursor to, like, doing cool skateboard tricks?

Emily: I feel like yeah.

Sally: Like, watch me kick-flip my horse. (laugh)

Emily: Yeah, like, if fuckin' Tik Tok existed back in the --

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: Days of Genghis Khan -- (laugh)

Sally: Um, I feel like Davram Bashere would do excellent on Tik Tok. Everyone would be like, "This is our hot dad."

Emily: Davram Bashere would have the most confusing Tik Toks.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Because -- (laugh) It'd just be, like, following Rand around --

Sally: Yeah. No, it would be so -- everyone in Wheel World --

Emily: All, like, blurry. (laugh)

Sally: Would be like, "Yes. Show me what the Dragon Reborn is doing today," and here's Davram Bahsere -- yeah, it's, like, slightly out of focus --

Emily: Flips back to front-facing, is way too close on his face. (laugh)

Sally: Yeah, it's, like, one eyeball and half his nose. (laugh)

Emily: He's like, what the fuck.

Sally: It would be so charming. (laugh)

Emily: God. Love him.

Sally: It would be so good.

Emily: (laugh)

Sally: Um, OK, anyway, Davram Bashere is out here being a sexual powerhouse.

Emily: Yeah, Rand uses his little spyglass to look at some rocks?

Sally: Yeah. (laugh)

Emily: Very unclear. And then Bashere's wife, who is there, is like, "Does he amuse you -- my husband?" And Rand's like, "Tell him that he's great. It looks great." And then leaves.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Without speaking to Bashere. Again, this is all some sort of subterfuge for, like, uh, disguising whatever is about to go down in Illian, which, again, we don't really know.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: It'll be a surprise to us, at least. Uh, Rand rides back to Caemlyn. He's got his usual honor guard of Aiel -- Maidens and ... Mountain Men or whatever.

Sally: (laugh) Yeah, I can't remember what they're called.

Emily: Um, on his way back, there is an assassination attempt. He, like, happens to look up and sees someone aiming a crossbow at him, so he immediately channels to stop them, but there was

another crossbow-man somewhere, another sniper who tried hitting him from behind. Luckily a Maiden spotted this and could only defend Rand by using herself as a human shield.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Which is sort of the gig when you're a bodyguard.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Sucks to suck. Um. But, of course, this immediately puts Rand into a depressive state, and he's pretty much emo throughout the rest of --

Sally: Yeah, well, also, a -- a -- a common woman died.

Emily: Yeah, he --

Sally: With a third crossbow bolt.

Emily: He finds out -- he finds out that -- he's like, "OK, I'm very sad about these Aiel men who died. Believe me, I am very sad; you'll just never see any evidence of it because I will continue to utilize them mercilessly throughout the text. But I am so sad about this one Aiel woman who had a beautiful smile, let me note, because women are only as valuable as they are beautiful when they smile." Um. He, like, memorizes her face or whatever, and then he happens to see that some random peasant woman got caught in the crossfire --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Which, yeah, sucks. If you try to assassinate someone in public --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Villagers are going to die. Um, and is like, "We have to, like, mm, send gold to her family or whatever." Which is, like, yeah, that's the decent thing to do, but --

Sally: You also don't have to, like, flagellate yourself with the memory of her face.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Because, as Emily has pointed out several times this season, Rand's increasing disregard for his own safety is, in fact, putting other people at risk. Like, we can't guarantee this wouldn't have happened if he had his, you know, more bodyguards with him. But, like, it would have been more eyes watching, you know?

Emily: It might have. Or just, like, why didn't Rand Travel directly to the palace?

Sally: Yeah, there you go. There's another one. Like, you don't need to -- you -- you don't actually need to be out in the streets if it's obviously a safety issue and people have talked about

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Like, we have precursors for this. Like, this isn't coming as a shock that anyone's trying to assassinate him.

Emily: Yeah. He also notes that Sulin -- he hasn't seen her for, like, eight days, and he's just like, "Ah, I wonder if I offended her," and it's like, fucking yes, you offended her. But he's like, "I don't care about that right now."

Sally: He doesn't care about anyone because he's a big, giant bastard man.

Emily: Yeah, he -- ugh. Oh, hi, Tybalt.

Sally: Hi, buddy. Tybalt looks very dashing in his blue sweater today.

Emily: Time to jump up.

Sally: Even though his chest hair keeps falling out of it and he looks very funny. You want to get on the chair? You sure can. There you go.

Emily: There he goes. Um. They find out that the would-be assassins were Children of the Light. I think four of them -- they catch four of them --

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: Amongst a -- a small band of people. Um. Rand says, "OK, execute these three, and send the last guy back to Pedron Niall and be like, 'Fuck you.'" Essentially. And Rand's like, "God, gotta add Pedron Niall's name to my list of fuckin' To Do."

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: When it's like, I know -- (laugh) I know there are reasons -- um. But it is a little bit frustrating when you have a character who can teleport and who has an army at his disposal when he is not actually taking care of issues as they arise.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: I know that it is a very complex political, international problem, that all of these are complex international problems. But, like we said with Masema, it's like a day out of Rand's life to go talk to the Prophet, and if you can't knock some sense into him, you arrest him.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And then you set -- then you allow the monarchs to disperse the cult mob.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And, I don't know, you take your army outside the Whitecloaks, and be like, "Hey, fuckin' knock, knock. Sorry if this is an invasion, but you did try to kill me."

Sally: (laugh) Yeah.

Emily: "And I -- I've invaded countries with -- literally --"

Sally: "I've invaded countries for less."

Emily: Yeah. "I invaded countries 'cause I heard a rumor that Morgase is dead, so."

Sally: From the same salesman that told Gawyn. (laugh)

Emily: Yeah. Just the same guy who's out there, like, "Morgase is dead."

Sally: (laugh) Spreading this rumor. He's just like, "I thought it would be funny. I didn't realize it would escalate."

Emily: (laugh) He's like, "I know she's dead; I killed her myself." They're like, "What?"

Sally: "What are you saying?" (laugh) Um. Yeah. No, it's very frustrating; throughout this chapter, we see that too, where, uh, Rand is just kind of, like, ignoring this plot with Bashere, doing the bare minimum there. Um, some Sea Folk come to see him in Caemlyn; he ignores them.

Emily: He puts that off. Yeah.

Sally: Yeah. He talks -- he does find time to talk to some noblewoman to make sure he and Elayne aren't related, though; he does fit that --

Emily: Oh, yeah.

Sally: Into his schedule; don't worry. Um, and then he's just like, "I'm gonna ignore everything happening in Caemlyn and just go back to Cairhien." Um, where he does meet with the Aes Sedai, but then Egg is like, "There are also Sea Folk here." And he's like, "I'll deal with that later." It's like, you're dealing with the Children of the Light later, the Prophet later, the Sea Folk later, the Shaido later; what are you dealing with? (laugh)

Emily: Literally. Like, what are you doing that can't be done by Berelain or other people, you know?

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Like, currently.

Sally: Yeah, like, give -- like -- it makes me so crazy.

Emily: This book -- yeah. These next few books, it's so difficult. Because Robert Jordan clearly enters this quagmire with Perrin and Faile and getting stuck in, like, plot hell with them for forever.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: But he does the same thing with Rand; it's just harder to spot because Rand has such a wide range of movement.

Sally: Yeah. Rand feels busy and looks busy because he's popping all over the place -- not even all over the place; between Caemlyn and Cairhien --

Emily: Yeah, and Illian, eventually, yeah.

Sally: And down to Illian, I guess, for the next little bit, and then he does his dumb shit with the Seanchan. But it takes him, like, two and a half books to even, like, actually do the next big thing, which feels like --

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Yeah, so he's just like, "I'm busy," and it's like, "Bitch, you ain't."

Emily: He's in, um, what, um, what I heard Travis Willingham describe in the latest episode of Critical Role as "analysis paralysis."

Sally: Ooh, nice.

Emily: This, Travis Willingham said immediately before prompting the rest of his party into fighting a dragon. He said, "You all are stuck in analysis paralysis; let's go, this is happening."

Sally: Nice.

Emily: And I want to say that to Rand, like --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: You just have to do some shit.

Sally: Yeah. Like --

Emily: Sorry if there are, like, consequences to you doing shit, but you are in analysis paralysis. Like, you can't just think about it forever.

Sally: Yeah. And I feel like I -- I feel like I'm having deja vu; I feel like I've said this on this podcast at least once or twice, but, like, the only reason Hamlet is an interesting play is that eventually Hamlet makes a decision.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: And is like -- and it also works because Hamlet is, you know, two hours long or whatever.

Emily: Short-form. (laugh)

Sally: Not, um, eight books or whatever of Rand sitting around with his dick in his hand, wondering if he and Elayne are related.

Emily: Yeah, if this was the only book wherein this was the case --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: I'd be at least somewhat interested in it.

Sally: Yeah

Emily: Because you could argue that, uh, similar to the way that we have Rand, uh, suffering really intense PTSD in book three -- although at least he's very goal-oriented PTSD --

Sally: Yeah. (laugh)

Emily: In that one, in this one he's also suffering a form of PTSD. Moiraine died in the last book

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And that was really traumatizing for him.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Among a lot of other things that have been happening.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: But, like, if -- but we're kind of stuck in this for the next three, four books.

Sally: Yeah. Yeah, and I agree. Like, if it was one book -- because this is the book where he's like, 'kay, he's ruling the Aiel, he's ruling Cairhien, he's ruling Caemlyn. Um, like, he's becoming an emperor, and I'm sure that's very taxing and confusing, so, like, I could get it if he's like, "I'm trying to figure this all out, and my, you know, political advisor, Moiraine, is dead, and that really sucks." But it's, like, this book into book seven into book eight.

Emily: Yeah, the point of what happens at the end of this book -- the box and shit, whatever -- the point of doing something like that to your main character is to prompt them to take different actions.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And Rand does start taking, uhhh, different actions, but they're mostly internal, I would say. He just starts thinking worse about himself, thinking worse about everyone.

Sally: Yeah, he becomes increasingly more paranoid, which is, again, understandable, if you got kidnapped and put into a box.

Emily: Yeah, again, internal journeys for characters are only compelling so far as they mirror external journeys.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Otherwise -- especially in longform.

Sally: Yeah, no, hundred percent. Like, I don't know how many times we can say this: like, the characters in Wheel of Time need to change more quickly than they do because the page length is extremely disproportionate to the time length.

Emily: Mm-hmm.

Sally: Like, just because it's only happening over the course of two and a half years or whatever -- like, we've already read, like, five thousand pages. I feel like I'm just saying the same things over and over again, but.

Emily: Well, so is Robert Jordan, so.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: Who cares?

Sally: Um.

Emily: Um, Rand is like, "I'm not gonna deal with the, um, Sea Folk." And he says Moiraine didn't teach him anything about the Sea Folk, which I think if we interrogated that line a little bit, uh, more -- if we were like, the things Rand is doing and not doing are those he feels he is prepared to do based on what Moiraine taught him --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: That could be interesting and a reflection of the trauma of her death, but, uh, no. He immediately skips off to meet with Elenia -- um, or Elena, I don't --

Sally: Whatever.

Emily: However her name is spelled. Who is really anxious to tell Rand just how, uh, prepared she is to be the queen of Andor, but Rand just wants to find out whether he and Elayne are closely related. Um, and he has a scare because -- (clears throat) -- uh, what's-her-name refers to Morgase and Tigraine as cousins.

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: And then Rand is like, "Wait, wait, wait, wait. You guys are nobility. If you were peasants, would you even be considered related?" and she's like, "No." And he's like, "Ah, thank fuck."

Sally: "Thank GOD. I can be horny in peace."

Emily: "I can be horny; I can do what I want again." He's like, "God, I hate myself." And then is like, "I'm going to Cairhien."

Sally: "Don't tell Aviendha."

Emily: (laugh) It's like, what the fuck? Uh, we then switch over to Egg, who is coming back to the, uh, Aiel camp after her weekly -- her morning canoodling with Gawyn.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: Which, I don't know what there is to say about that. They are literally just meeting to make out.

Sally: Yeah, and it's like, it's fine kids, do what you need to do, but it's also just ridiculous. (laugh)

Emily: Yeah, Egg's like, "How dare the innkeeper look at me like that," and I'm like, for all she knows, you're fucking in her dining room.

Sally: Yeah. Yeah, like --

Emily: Bruh.

Sally: Girl.

Emily: She's like, "I am so horny. I sat on Gawyn's lap," and it's like, OK -- OK?

Sally: OK.

Emily: It's not that -- (laugh)

Sally: It's not that scandalous.

Emily: (laugh) If she was like, "I sucked his dick so good," I would've been like, "Whoa, Egg!"

Sally: Whoa! OK --

Emily: This has been an escalation. (laugh)

Sally: (laugh) Yeah, but she's like, "I sat on his lap."

Emily: And then immediately got off when I -- (snort, laugh)

Sally: Probably felt his erection.

Emily: Eugh.

Sally: Listen, I'm just being practical.

Emily: Yeah, it's not like he's wearing a --

Sally: What kind of -- what kind of britches is he wearing?

Emily: You -- yeah, what do you --

Sally: Is he -- (laugh)

Emily: Smallclothes. What do -- what do those constitute? Sadly, when I picture smallclothes, I can only picture, um, uh -- Mormon kids will know what this is -- but garments.

Sally: Yeah. I literally had the -- I have the same thing.

Emily: It's particularly troubling when you've seen your dad a couple of times --

Sally: (gasp, laugh)

Emily: Just -- (laugh) My dad always --

Sally: (laugh) Time to roast Chris. Weekly time to roast Chris.

Emily: Yeah, this is a segment on the podcast. My dad's very modest; he doesn't even like taking his shirt off at the pool.

Sally: Ohh, baby.

Emily: Um. But occasionally, through eighteen-plus years of living with him --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: I'll, like, walk past him or whatever when he's in his undies, which for Mormon people who go and do certain rituals in Mormon temples -- uh, it sounds very culty to people who weren't raised in the religion and to some people who were raised in the religion, such as myself

-- uh, but my parents and my siblings have all done this, and they all wear, uh, what are called garments and which are basically just, like, underclothes. Other religions have this.

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: Uh, Orthodox Jews --

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: Have something like this. But they are particularly heinous-looking --

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: 'Cause they're literally just, like, white cut-off shorts and, like, white little cap-sleeve

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And I'm intimately acquainted with all of these, because for, like, three years, I did all the laundry in our house.

Sally: That's very tender of you.

Emily: Because it was, like, the only way that I could self-soothe my anxiety; I don't know what

Sally: I get it.

Emily: Was going on with me for --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: In high school. Especially 'cause I worked at a dry cleaners. You'd think I'd have had enough of laundry.

Sally: Maybe it just felt familiar.

EMily: Yeah. I was just like, mm, time to dissociate in the laundry room.

Sally: Do laundry, yeah.

Emily: My mom was like, "Fuckin' love this."

Sally: Becky was like, "Ahh. Yeet."

Emily: Yeet. Love having someone help with the laundry.

Sally: Especially because there's six people in that house.

Emily: Oh, yeah, there was tons. Always.

Sally: That's so many people.

Emily: Yeah. Anne changes outfits like four times a day.

Sally: (laugh) OK, good for her. But also, like, Anne. That's a lot of laundry.

Emily: (laugh)

Sally: Is it because she's peeing her pants?

Emily: (laugh) Things we've heard about my sister Anne in this episode alone: she always shows people her disgusting wounds, she changes her outfit so much, and she pees her pants all the time.

Sally: (laugh) We love her. She's beautiful and perfect.

Emily: Yeah, I can roast my sister Anne because she's actually a perfect being.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And if you met her, you'd be in love with her immediately, like everyone is.

Sally: I mean, yeah. She's literally so cute and pretty and sweet and smart. So we gotta get her where we can get her.

Emily: Anyway, the few times I've seen my dad in his garments, he's been, like -- he'll, like, spot me out of the corner of his eye --

Sally: Oh, no!

Emily: And immediately, like, hunch over like fuckin' Bigfoot, like, trying to shield himself. (laugh)

Sally: Oh --

Emily: And, like, scuttle away.

Sally: Like some sort of hermit crab without its shell. Oh, baby.

Emily: (laugh) Ahhh. So funny. Anyway, when I picture smallclothes, that's the visual I get.

Sally: I get too. They're always white. It's always the, like, short -- little -- little sleevies, little shorts.

Emily: Yeah, go to Disneyland, look for men in white T-shirts, and you can start spotting the Mormons 'cause you can see the garment lines.

Sally: 'Cause you can see it underneath it -- Um, I had a teacher in high school who, um -- like, all of the, like, very, um -- very religious Mormon girls would be like, "Oh my God, she started wearing her garments." And I was like, "What the fuck are you talking about?" They were like, "Look at her shirt; you can, like, see it."

Emily: About the -- (inaudible)

Sally: Yeah. 'Cause she was -- she was, like, really young. She was, like --

Emily: Ohhh.

Sally: Fresh out of college, and she was gonna get married --

Emily: Yep. That's what you -- what happens.

Sally: And so I think there was some change happening. But they were like, "Look at her arms." And I'm like, I'm not gonna just be like, "Yo, teach, can you just, like, flex for me?" (laugh)

Emily: Flex. Show us your garments.

Sally: Yeah. So. Anyway. You can spot 'em, though, if you know what to look for.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: It's like bird-watching.

Emily: Yeah. You'll just, like -- I -- when I was a kid, my dad would -- we'd be, like, on an elevator in our Disneyland hotel or whatever, and the other family would get off, and my dad would be like, "They were Mormons," and I'd be like, "What? Wot? How can you tell?"

Sally: He can smell 'em. (laugh)

Emily: Out in the wild like this?

Sally: I mean, it's also a good guess that any given day --

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: At Disneyland, most of -- (laugh) the clientele --

Emily: Now you can, like, spot 'em 'cause they're all in BYU apparel, but.

Sally: Yeah. They're very proud of that college.

Emily: I know. It's very --

Sally: Like, who's that proud --

Emily: Not much to be proud of.

Sally: Of a university.

Emily: Weird people. Who don't have personalities otherwise. (laugh)

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: OK. What was I saying? Egg. Underwear.

Sally: Um, yeah, Eggie's walking back.

Emily: Yeah. Eggie's walking back. Uh, there's not much to say about her and Gawyn canoodling; the status quo there.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Um, she gets back to the tents and finds out that all the Wise Ones are in a meeting, so all their apprentices are just having, like, a little day off.

Sally: Yeah. It's very cute.

Emily: They're having, like, a, uh -- a -- what were those called? A read-a-thon.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: So while Egg is chatting with these apprentices about various things, um, she finds out that Rand is in town. And she's like -- decides to get up and go see him. Um. And kind of, like -- I don't know what her -- I can't remember what her goal in particular is. She's very anxious to get to him for --

Sally: Yeah, I don't know why.

Emily: Um, maybe she doesn't want him to say anything about her?

Sally: I don't -- she, anyway -- she's --

Emily: Like, that's a -- that's a concern for her throughout is that, uh, one of the Aes Sedai will spot her or someone who is with them will spot her and connect her to the mysterious --

Sally: Green sister.

Emily: Green sister who is in the city. But she runs over to the palace, waylays a servant to escort her to Rand's, uh, chambers, which -- she goes into, like, the anteroom, and it is, um -- it's described as, like, a miniature throne room, and I'm picturing, like, the Hall of Mirrors in Versailles --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: 'Cause there's so many mirrors. Which is just, like, bizarre because this room has never been described to us in Rand's chambers in Cairhien --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Otherwise. And maybe I've just missed it. But, like, Egg talks about how she -- the Maidens never really announce her when she walks in, so she has walked in on Rand while he's in the bath before --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Which is actually genuinely hilarious.

Sally: I know. Like, why don't we get that scene?

Emily: We just -- he's like, "What the?"

Sally: "Come on!" (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) She's like, "Oh my God." Um. But, like, would he be having a bath in this room full of mirrors? I like to think Rand, egotistical as he is, even --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Would not --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Be down for that.

Sally: Maybe -- is there, like, another room?

Emily: I dunno.

Sally: That she can -- maybe -- maybe --

Emily: Who knows.

Sally: Yeah, but.

Emily: Weird nonetheless. Um. Egg is, like, covered in dust and sweat.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: She and Rand have a -- an otherwise charming interaction, I think.

Sally: Mm-hmm.

Emily: They actually treat each other like human beings, generally.

Sally: Wow.

Emily: I know: shocking. Egg is like, "This is what you have to do with the Aes Sedai. Just be, like, really, really humble; like, don't be a jerk to them. And you know that you can't --" Oh, I think what she was worried about -- 'cause she thought that Rand took Alviarin's letter at face value?

Sally: Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Emily: Which, I'm not sure how she got that impression?

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Maybe he said something in book five that --

Sally: I don't remember. But I remember him being like, "Fuck this."

Emily: Yeah, what -- in his head, he was like, "Well, these are clearly both --"

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: "Attempts at manipulation."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: So I dunno why she's so convinced that he is like, "Oh, yeah, for sure Alviarin is telling the truth."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Um. But she's like, "You know you can't trust Elaida or Alviarin. Like, no one here wants to help you; they just want to take you to the White Tower."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And he's like, "So I can trust your people? Who I literally have not seen or met?"

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And she's like ... "Shhhh."

Sally: (laugh) "Shut up."

Emily: She's like, "How dare you argue with me about --"

Sally: "Be quiet. Just, you're stupid. No one likes you." (laugh)

Emily: He's like, "It's good advice, Egg. Thanks." And she's like, "Oh, by the way, there's some, uh -- there's some Sea Folk in town who are interested in seeing you." And she tells us that she knows what's going on, and I presume this is because she knows via Elayne and Nynaeve, who were on that Sea Folk ship back in book four, that the Sea Folk have a Dragon Reborn, Car'a'carn equivalent. So I think Egg has guessed -- although Robert Jordan does not give it to us plainly because why would he give us anything plainly? I think she's guessed that they are just here to, like, greet Rand as the Coramoor and establish some sort of --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Bargain with him --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: About what that means. But also, for some godforsaken reason, she does not tell Rand this.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: She just, like, keeps it to herself and blatantly says that she is keeping it to herself. It's like, why? What possible use?

Sally: Because communication is never the answer.

Emily: I know, like --

Sally: Robert Jordan -- this is a fourteen-book theses to argue that communication is bad. (laugh)

Emily: He's like, "Uh, everything works out fine in the end as long as nobody talks to each other."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And it's like, sure, but it'll take us fourteen books to get there when it could have taken seven.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Buddy. Half the time. If people were just like, "Here's what I want; here's what you want. Here's what I know; here's what you know."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Let's hash it out. Let's put up a serial killer board, tracking the Forsaken --

Sally: Listen, Mat would love that.

Emily: And just knock them out. (laugh)

Sally: Yeah. Again, the Elite Forsaken Kill Squad.

Emily: Yeah, Mat would be, like, at home base, being like, "I have pinpointed Graendal's

location." And they'd be like, "Great, thank you, Detective Cauthon." (laugh)

Sally: Thank you.

Emily: Again, the argument for Mat as a detective.

Sally: It's so good. And he could just have his squad of elite assassins. Which I can't remember

who we said.

Emily: I don't --

Sally: Birgitte. Gaul.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Davram Bashere. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) I think we said anyone who isn't doing anything --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Elsewhere that we would like them to be doing something.

Sally: We're just going to collect all of the people we love.

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: And give them to Mat.

Emily: For his band of brothers.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: His fellowship of the ring.

Sally: Yeah, his manwhores of the realm.

Emily: His manwhores of the realm. (laugh) Stupid.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: Anyway, while Egwene and Rand are talking, there's a knock on the door, and one of the Maidens is like, "Hey, the Aes Sedai are here," and Rand's like, "Uhh, they're fucking early."

And Egg's like, "Oh my God; I have to hide."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And Rand's like, "Hold on." He's also periodically talking to himself, which is creeping Egg out. Um, but he's like, "Stand right here," and he, like, makes her invisible. He's like, "Just don't move, and they won't see you." She's like, "OK?" Um. Then the Aes Sedai come in. There are three of them: Coirein, the Gray, who's in charge of the embassy -- "in charge," in air quotes

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Galina, who I believe is actually in charge of the embassy, who's Red, and Nesune, who Egg knows and is Brown, I think?

Sally: Mm-hmm. Mm-hmm, mm-hmm.

Emily: Um, and they are followed by a bunch of young women who are carrying boxes of gold. And Rand, to his credit, immediately looks at all of their faces to see whether they're Aes Sedai. But Egg, over in her corner, thinks, "That won't necessarily help him because there are women who, um, are young enough that they don't -- who have been Aes Sedai for, uh, such a short amount of time that they have not yet achieved that look."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: But again, she does not tell Rand this. If I were Rand, I would just be like, "Hey, you could, uh, have men carry the gold."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: "I'll send some for you --"

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: "Next time you want to bring me presents."

Sally: Boom.

Emily: Boom. Problem solved.

Sally: Solution, baby!

Emily: Baby! Just three brain cells; that's all it takes.

Sally: He doesn't have that.

Emily: He's like, "Women are never threats to me."

Sally: He's like, "I literally --"

Emily: "Unless they look like my visual of --"

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: "Woman-threat."

Sally: He's like, "I just saw two women die, so I'm very sensitive about women, and I cannot say, 'No women."

Emily: Meehhhhhh.

Sally: It's like, just be like, "I have literally nine bajillion Aiel at my beck and call."

Emily: And it's also like, why are they employing women servants, like, to do heavy lifting?

Sally: Yeah. It is not in line with the gender --

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Structure of this world at all, so it should be, like, the number -- like, a huge red flag.

Emily: Yeah. You're just like, what the fuck? Aes Sedai never just use women -- it's not like Aes Sedai are so anti-men --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: In general that they're like, "We only employ women."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: There are male servants everywhere in the Tower.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: They have 500 soldier boys that are following them.

Sally: Yeah. Bring the frat house with you.

Emily: So yeah, huge red flag. No idea why no one picks up on it except that it's convenient for the plot. Rand has a brief conversation with the Aes Sedai, wherein he's like, "Please stop channeling," and they're like, "Uhhh," and he's like, "No, really. Stop," and they stop, and he's like, "Thanks."

Sally: And they're like, "Oh, shit."

Emily: And they're like, "Oh, shit." But then later they're like, "He can't actually --"

Sally: "It was a guess."

Emily: "He can't actually know." And Egg's like, "No, he gets the magic goosebumps."

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: "It's real. I saw it."

Sally: (laugh) Magic goosebumps.

Emily: His, uh, saidar senses are tingling.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: (sing-song) Duh duh duh!

Sally: That's the noise they make. That's what Lews Therin does. He, like, blows a kazoo.

(laugh)

Emily: (laugh, mimics kazoo fanfare)

Sally: Rand's like, "Oh, there must be channeling; the kazoo is out."

Emily: "Oh, fuck."

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) "His war kazoo." This has been a really chaotic episode.

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: But then the Aes Sedai are like, "Look at these -- look at these presents we've brought you. They're your shirty aren't they?" and Band's like "Yes. I am but a gready tyrent"

you. They're very shiny, aren't they?" and Rand's like, "Yes, I am but a greedy tyrant."

Sally: (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) "Shower me in gold. Stick dollar bills in my -- in my --"

Sally: "In my g-string." (laugh)

Emily: "My smallclothes."

Sally: Yeah, in my garments. (laugh)

Emily: Stupid.

Sally: I'm sorry to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints for using your --

Emily: Don't apologize to them.

Sally: You're right.

Emily: Um. (laugh)

Sally: Well -- apology rescinded.

Emily: Until they apologize for oppressing, uh, LGBTQ people.

Sally: You're right. So stick a -- stick a dollar bill in his garments, please. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) I can't think of anything less sexy.

Sally: Exactly. (laugh)

Emily: Which is the point.

Sally: (laugh) Just stick it -- tuck it in the little cap sleeve.

Emily: But Rand's, like, playing along, presenting himself as a power-hungry --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Uh, tyrant, who's only into gold. And these Aes Sedai are just like, "Oh my God, he's such an idiot." Which, to be fair to them -- (laugh)

Sally: He is, just not quite in the way they think.

Emily: Yeah, he's not the idiot that they think he is, but he does still fall into their trap.

Sally: Yeah. Because he's just is so dumb.

Emily: Yeah. And has no sense of self-preservation.

Sally: Yeah, and has just got the weirdest relationship to all women. (sigh) Bastard.

Emily: But he's like, "So what's the deal? Why are you here?" And they're like, "Well, we're here to escort you back to the White Tower." And he's like, "OK, great, well. When I'm ready to go to the White Tower --" He's like, "I'll definitely go to the White Tower eventually. I just have shit to take care of." And they're like, "Oh? Three days, perhaps?" And he's like, "How about I'll call you." (laugh)

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And they're like, "Oh." And he's like, "Dismissed." And they leave. It's a very brief --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Interaction. Um. And we see from the Aes Sedai point of view later that they're all pretty skeeved out by him. But, you know. That's pretty typical for Aes Sedai.

Sally: Yeah, he makes one little, like, "How's Alviarin?" And Galina's like, "She's fine."

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: And then she was like, "Wait, that was a mistake." (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) Well, I think it's, like -- the implication is that it's a ta'veren thing that she --

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Even talked at all.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And then everyone's like, "How do you even fucking know Alviarin?" And it's like, "They're Black Ajah together." But also, it's like, hmm, OK, weird.

Sally: Yeah, just more scheming.

Emily: Yeah. They also are like, "Some -- some Aes Sedai was also in the room with us, or some woman who can channel."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: They're like, "Moiraine's definitely still alive." And he's like -- Egg is like, "Mehhhh."

Sally: "No. Ehhhh, kind of."

Emily: "Ehhhh, kind of."

Sally: "You think this is a joke?"

Emily: (laugh) This is the third episode in a row we've referenced that animatic.

Sally: It's so funny, though! (laugh) "Who does this sound like?" "It sounds like Bruce!"

Emily: "It sounds like Bruce!" (laugh) "It sounds like Bruce!"

Sally: You guys, it's so funny. I can't even. I think it's only funny to me and Emily. (laugh)

Emily: (laugh) It's our very particular niche.

Sally: OK.

Emily: So after they leave, Egg and Rand sort of continue their conversation, uh, without any --getting anywhere, really.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Egg's like, "Please don't tell them I'm here." Or, no. She said that to one of the Maidens. She cannot bring herself to ask Rand that.

Sally: Oh, yeah.

Emily: Because -- I don't know. Power dynamics, whatever.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Then she's like, "Please be careful," and he's like, "Please be honest with me," and she's like, "No --"

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: And he's like, "Great, then no. Glad we had this talk."

Sally: She also, like, indirectly asks him about Traveling, and he demonstrates it on her shawl.

Emily: Oh, yeah, that is one of their more charming ... conversations.

Sally: And he's like, "Here is this. Here is Caemlyn. Here is Cairhien. And I just bend the shawl together."

Emily: "Bring 'em together and put a hole through it."

Sally: "Poke a hole." And she's like --

Emily: And she's like, "Ugh."

Sally: "A hole?!"

Emily: She's like, "Well, in my little thought experiments I've been doing with it, plus Tel'aran'rhiod, here's how I think it should be done," and he's like, "I don't -- I just bore a hole." And she's like, "OK. Men are weird."

Sally: Yeah. And it's like, but, Egg, that --

Emily: Which I think -- I think I referenced in the last episode that they'll be Traveling by the end of this. And I think Egg then takes her theory to Moghedien and is like, "This is what I want to do," and Moghedien's like, "Ah, shit, that's Traveling."

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: Basically.

Sally: Yeah.

Emily: So, yeah, thanks to Rand and Moghedien, Egg invents Traveling -- reinvents Traveling for women. Um. Those are those two chapters. (laugh)

Sally: Yeehaw, baby.

Emily: Yeehaw indeed. Especially given the horse stunts.

Sally: They are so good.

Emily: Um, next week is a single chapter, so here's hoping we find enough to talk about. I think in my reading schedule, we just kind of had to end up with a single chapter at some point, so this is it. Um. But, yeah, we'll be back next week.

Sally: We sure will.

Emily: Thanks to Glynna MacKenzie for our theme song. Thank you to you for listening. Thanks for following us on social media; thank you to our supporters on Patreon.

Sally: You guys are the best.

Emily: Do you have a sign-off?

Sally: I don't.

Emily: Fuck. (laugh)

Sally: (laugh) Um, what's something bad that's happened?

Emily: What is something bad that's happened?

Sally: Well, this morning -- this is very mild -- but this morning, um, it was very rainy and snowy in Utah today. And when I went downstairs to bring our recycling can in, the recycling had blown over, and the bag had blown, like, all the way down the driveway --

Emily: Oh, no.

Sally: Like, into the bushes. (laugh) So I had, like, my little towel on that I dry my hair with --

Emily: (laugh)

Sally: And I was, like -- I was wet. Obviously I didn't have a coat, 'cause I was just gonna pull it in. And so it was me, and then I was like, Tybalt's gonna run out --"

Emily: Yeah.

Sally: Bye! We love you!

Emily: Bye.
