Rose Milkweed	Also called Marsh or Swamp Milkweed. Large rose-pink flowers with vanilla fragrance, attracts all kinds of bees and butterflies. This deer-resistant plant grows in full sun in moist to medium soils.		bag
Bee Balm (Monarda)	Violet flowers with distinctly aromatic leaves, favorite of butterflies, bees and hummingbirds. Blooms July through September. Full sun to partial shade. Grows on all but the wettest soils.



JNE	Stanley	The classic prune plum. Deep purple oval fruit with sweet golden flesh. Great fresh, dried or canned. Developed in New York in 1926.	Self-fertile	Early September

Tips for growing fruit trees

- Trees in our region may require 5 years to establish before starting to produce fruit.
- Prepare the soil before planting by mixing in compost, fertilizer, or well composted manure.
- Water well after planting and over the entire first growing season to promote root growth.
- Fertilize your soil based on soil test recommendations.
- Fruit trees that are heavy feeders: Honeycrisp, Fuji and Gala apples; Pear and Plum, Peach, Nectarine.
- Fruit trees that are light feeders: Cortland, Golden Delicious, Gravenstein, and McIntosh Apples; Cherry trees; Apricot.
- Fertilizers are typically applied during the early half of the growing season. Late season fertilizing
 promotes new growth too late in the season to withstand frost.



Conifers and Native Trees/Shrubs

VARIETY	DESCRIPTION	SIZE	PRICING
Northern White Cedar	(Thuja occidentalis) 40-60 ft, pyramidal shaped, grows on a variety of sites. Shade tolerant. Windbreaks, hedges and wildlife habitat.		
Red Pine	(Pinus resinosa) 50-80 ft; coarse, well drained sites. Can tolerate dry, windy or rocky sites. Shade intolerant, extremely cold tolerant. Windbreak, wildlife habitat.		
White Pine	(Pinus strobus). Up to 150 ft. Moist to somewhat poorly drained sandy/sandy loam soils. Shade tolerant. Food, nesting sites, wildlife cover.	2 to 4-inch Plugs	25 for \$15 100 for \$55
White Spruce	(Picea glauca) 90-100 ft, best on well drained soils. Shade tolerant. Windbreak, good winter wildlife habitat.		
Tamarack (E. Larch)	(Larix laricina) up to 65 ft; deciduous evergreen; slender pyramidal tree; tolerates standing water, acidic soils; prefers full sun. Turns golden in fall and drops needles each year.		
Black Cherry	(Prunus serotina) grows in in both lowland and upland woods; one of the largest of native cherries, to 50-75 ft; profuse clusters of fragrant white flowers; ripens late summer, dark purple-black edible fruit.		
Northern Red Oak	(Quercus rubra) native woodland tree to 75 ft., broad and rounded when open grown. Dark, lustrous green leaves turn brownish red in autumn. Acorns mature in early fall	2- 3 feet bare root	5 for \$15
American Hazelnut	(Corylus americana) native multi-stemmed shrub, 8-16 ft; dry or moist thickets, woodlands and wood margins, valleys, uplands and prairies; 1/2-inch egg-shaped edible nuts in leafy husk; may be roasted, ground into flour; coveted by squirrels and birds.		
Redosier Dogwood	(Cornus sericea) bright red twigs and stems, fast growing, multi-stemmed, deciduous shrub; 4-5 ft. with spreading habit; flat topped clusters of tiny white flowers in late spring; clusters of whitish to bluish tinged late summer fruit which is attractive to birds; good fall color.		
Mountain Ash	(Sorbus americana) medium sized tree up to 30 ft; feathery leaves; clusters of white flowers in May to early June; bright red berries last into the winter, eaten by birds.	bare root	5 for \$10
Highbush Cranberry	(Viburnum Trilobum) native ornamental to 12 ft. with maple-like leaves, white lacecap flowers May to June; shiny bright red berries, edible but not tasty, preferred by wildlife.
