

Dean's Message

As I write this, a mid-September heat wave finally has abated and St. Louis is enjoying the cool nights and warm sunny afternoons that make early autumn such a delight in the Mid West. The tang of fall is in the air, the revitalized Missouri Tigers are preparing to take on the awesome Sooners of Oklahoma, and the Class of 1982 is hard at work trying to solve the mysteries of immunology, biochemistry, dental morphology, and all the other subjects of first year dental study.

We welcomed our 113th graduating class to the School at the end of August with a 2-1/2 day orientation program and then, right after the Labor Day weekend, the new students plunged into their work. They're a fine-looking group: 85 bright, attractive young men and women, and we expect very good things from them.

always a delightful event with bountiful food and spirited volleyball and softball games and we are most grateful to Anna Mae Ballard, president of the faculty wives' group, Judy Barnes, picnic chairperson, and all the members of the organization for all the hard work that produced another successful and much appreciated picnic.

Speaking of our students, I have seldom seen our senior students so enthusiastic as they were after our Big Brother reception on September 6. Our new Big Brother program, chaired by Dr. W. Neal Newton, pairs senior students desiring to participate in the program with alumni in the St. Louis area. The aim is to develop a warm personal relationship between the two and also to give the dentist-to-be a firsthand look at the operation and management of a private dental practice. Participating in the new program are 76 senior students, well over 90% of the class, and an equal number of dedicated alumni.

The Big Brothers and Sisters and the students assigned to them were brought

together at a wine-and-cheese reception on September 6 and, as I have mentioned, there was a fine reaction from all concerned. Several students sought me out afterwards to thank the School for setting up this new program (really, it is our alumni who deserve the credit) and to say how much they are looking forward to it. We hope this Big Brother program will be creating such enthusiasm for many years to come.

In my last message, I mentioned our plans for the renovation and enlarging of the senior lab on the first floor of our Carlyn H. Wohl Research Building. Bids for that work have been accepted and submitted to the WU Board of Trustees for final approval. Construction is scheduled to begin around October 1 and the project should take about nine months. Meanwhile, our new audio-visual production studio has been completed on the third floor. The spacious new A/V facility gives us firstrate quarters for still and film photography and TV taping for

production of self-instruction materials, as well as a new darkroom and an office for our illustrator. Plans for our eventual expansion into the old A&P bakery east of the School are still being developed by our architects. Modification of our business office, just off our ground floor patient waiting room, also is in the works.

Our Department of Community & Preventive Dentistry, under Dr. Shirley Pierce, has begun a four-month pilot program to provide free dental care for the children of migrant workers in the Bootheel area of southeast Missouri. A vehicle on loan from the State of Montana travels to various schools to provide the dental treatment, which is paid for by the migrant worker center at Southeast Missouri University.

Meanwhile, Dr. Pierce's department is operating two more remote units in outstate Missouri. One alternates each year between southeast and southwest Missouri and this year is stationed at the regional center for the developmentally disabled in Springfield. Volunteer dentists of the Springfield Dental Society help man that unit. The other mobile unit will be spending October in Nevada, Mo. after a very productive month in the Osage Beach area. These latter two units are funded by the Missouri Elks Clubs.

The students and energetic young faculty members of Community & Preventive also continue their valuable services at the juvenile detention center and Herbert Hoover Boys Club in St. Louis.

We're delighted that several of our alumni have become members of our full-time faculty: Dr. Gordon Thompson '52, Operative Dentistry; Dr. Groves Cook '71, Endodontics; Dr. Michael Italiano, '78, Community & Preventive; Dr. Earl Sandroff '78, Removable and Fixed Prosthodontics; Dr. Robert Rizzuti '78, Oral Diagnosis & Radiology. An addition to our full-time periodontic faculty is Dr. Yusuf K. Eratalay, a native of Turkey, and formerly a post-doctoral student in our Department of Oral Pathology. We heartily welcome these new full-time faculty members along with the several new part-time members of the faculty.

A large and convivial gathering was present at our reunion cocktail party during the Mid-Continent Dental Meeting in St. Louis and we look forward to more such pleasant encounters with alumni and friends of the School and their spouses at our social events at the ADA annual session, the New York dental meeting, and the Chicago Mid-Winter Meeting. I hope to be seeing you!

Undergraduate Students Also Benefit from our Graduate Programs

The School of Dental Medicine is fortunate to have four approved graduate training programs in the specialty areas of Orthodontics, Oral Pathology, Oral-Maxillofacial Surgery and Endodontics. The presence of these programs add significantly to the depth of the educational experience of the undergraduate dental student.

The recently formed Craniofacial Anomalies Institute along with the Cleft Palate Institute and their affiliation with the School of Dental Medicine provide much needed treatment to patients with these deformities. The experience derived by the dental student when exposed to these special areas brings together a multiplicity of services including Pedodontics, Maxillofacial Prosthetics, thodontics, Oral-Maxillofacial Surgery, Plastic Surgery, Pediatrics, Speech Pathology and Otorhinolaryngology. During rotations on the hospital service, dental students have their views expanded regarding the role of the dentist in the hospital environment.

Radiation Oncology is a very active service at Barnes Hospital and a close relationship exists among Radiation Therapy, Oral-Maxillofacial Surgery and Oral Pathology. Joint communication among Plastic Surgery, Otolaryngology, Radiation Oncology, Oral Pathology and Oral-Maxillofacial

Surgery preempt definitive treatment protocol. Head and Neck Tumor Morbidity Conferences are held weekly and are attended by rotating dental students. Here, valuable experience is gained in the management of preand post-radiation patients, as well as insight as to the complications that can develop after radiation therapy.

Maxillofacial Prosthetics plays an important role in the final rehabilitation of the post-surgical head and neck cancer patient. Complex cases are reviewed and an extension of the student's knowledge of prosthodontics is made to the ultimate care of these patients.

During the past three years, the second and third level dental students have been granted the opportunity to participate in a hospital oriented clinical rotation. During the rotation, the students are exposed to all aspects of hospital protocol including admission procedures, management hospitalized patients and record keeping. The dental student is provided the experience of visiting the operating room and learning surgical scrub and sterile technique. In addition, participating in the outpatient Oral Surgery Clinic, under the supervision of the oral surgery resident broadens the exposure to a variety of pathology and minor oral surgical techniques.

The Hospital Clinical Rotation is generally well-received and appreciated by the students. Plans for expansion of the program are being considered since the need for expanded dental care of the hospitalized patient exists; and adequately trained dentists are required to provide this service. Although these rotations do not provide all the necessary training, it is hoped that the experience will engender a desire in the student to pursue an advanced training program in one of the dental specialties.

Alumni Meeting March 16-17, 1979

Outstanding clinical presentations by guest clinicians and members of the Washington University faculty will highlight the 113th annual meeting of the Dental Alumni Association. The meeting will be held in St. Louis on Friday and Saturday, March 16 and 17, 1979. Headquarters hotel for the annual meeting again will be the plush Breckenridge Inn in St. Louis County, scene of the last two annual meetings, which has received almost unanimous approval from alumni for its comfortable accommodations and excellent food.

All the traditional features of the annual meeting are included on the schedule for the March session, along with a renewed emphasis on clinical programs. Special tribute will be paid during the meeting to the reunion classes of 1929, 1954, and 1969—the 50, 25, and 10 year classes.

As in recent years, an outstanding Continuing Education course will be offered at the School of Dental Medicine on Thursday, March 15, as an optional preamble to the alumni meeting. Many alumni have taken advantage of the opportunity to come to St. Louis a day early and obtain continuing education credits in addition to attending the alumni sessions.

The course on March 15 is titled "Oral Medicine and Clinical Pharmacology" and will be given jointly by Dr. William K. Bottomley, Chairman of the Department of Oral Diagnosis, Georgetown University School of Dentistry, and Dr. Sam V. Holroyd, a Captain in the U.S. Navy Dental Corps and currently head of the Educational Programs Development Department of the Naval Health Sciences Education & Training Command. Tuition for the fullday course will be \$90, which includes luncheon. A printed leaflet describing the course in detail will be available around December 1. Anyone interested in obtaining such a leaflet can write at that time to the Department of Continuing Education, Washington University School of Dental Medicine, 4559 Scott Ave., St. Louis, MO 63110.

Drs. Bottomley and Holroyd will be the featured clinicians during the alumni meeting also and each will give a presentation that will be separate and distinct from their joint course on Thursday. On Friday, March 16, Dr. Holroyd will present the morning program on "Local Anesthetics & Vasoconstrictors (Drugs, Problems & Solutions)" and "Special Topics: Treatment of Acute Necrotizing

Ulcerative Gingivitis & Prophylaxis Against Subacute Bacterial Endocarditis.''

The Friday luncheon will include the annual business meeting of the Dental Alumni Association and the annual report on the School by Dean Selfridge.

Friday afternoon will offer a double option: three short courses to be offered by faculty members of the School of Dental Medicine and the annual open house and tour of the School. Chartered buses will be available to bring alumni to the School for the courses or the tour. The short courses, each lasting from about 1:30 to 5 P.M., will be presented by Dr. Hugh Berry, Chairperson of the Department of Endodontics, Mohamed Marzouk, Chairperson of the Department of Operative Dentistry, and Dr. Warren H. Speiser, Visiting Lecturer in Removable Prosthodontics. A fee of \$20 will be charged for each short course and enrollment in each course will be limited to 15 alumni. Registration forms for the annual meeting, including the short courses, will be mailed to all alumni early in

The traditional banquet of the alumni meeting will be held on Friday night at the Breckenridge. The banquet program will be highlighted by the tribute to the special reunion classes and the installation of the 1979 officers of the Alumni Association. Music for dancing will be provided after the program.

The traditional Past Presidents breakfast will open the Saturday morning, March 17, schedule while other alumni will gather for an eyeopener coffee. The morning clinical presentation will feature Dr. Bottomley speaking on "Treatment of Common Oral Lesions." Being planned for Saturday at Noon is a luncheon

honoring the alumni participating in the School's new "Big Brother Program" and their assigned senior students who will attend the luncheon as guests of their Big Brothers. All other alumni, of course, will be invited to attend the luncheon.

"We have had comments from some alumni indicating that the annual meeting should provide more intensive clinical offerings," Dr. Neal noted, "and we have endeavored to meet those requests in planning our next meeting. With the fine help of Dean Selfridge, we have secured two nationally-respected clinicians in Drs. Bottomley and Holroyd and are delighted that they will each present an excellent program during our meeting, in addition to their jointly-given course at the School on March 15. In addition, the three short courses to be offered at the School on the afternoon of March 16 will give this alumni meeting a clinical depth of interest that should have wide appeal to our alumni. We are looking forward to one of the best, and best-attended, annual meetings in many years."

Dean Selfridge Honored

Dean George D. Selfridge has been selected as the "Alumni Man of the Year" by the Dental Alumni Association of the State University of New York at Buffalo. He was presented with the prestigious award on September 30 during a dinner dance highlighting the Greater Niagara Frontier Dental Meeting sponsored by the Dental Alumni Association of SUNY at Buffalo. The dental meeting was attended by several hundred alumni of the Buffalo dental school along with many other dentists from Western New York and Canada.

Dr. Selfridge was honored by his fellow alumni for his outstanding career as a practitioner and administrator in the Navy Dental Corps, his imaginative and vigorous leadership as Dean of our School, and his service to the dental profession through his work in organizations such as the International College of Dentists, of which he is now Vice-President.

Dr. Selfridge received his dental degree in 1947 from what was then the University of Buffalo Dental School. He attended dental school under Navy auspices and then entered the Navy Dental Corps for what was to be a career of more than 28 years. He retired from active duty two years ago with the rank of Rear Admiral after serving as commanding officer of the National Naval Dental Center to accept the position of Dean here.

Dr. Frank H. Foerster, class of 1912, passed away on August 11 at the age of 90. Professor Emeritus of Clinical Prosthetics, Dr. Foerster retired in 1947 after teaching for thirty five years although he continued his private practice of dentistry in South St. Louis for ten more years. He served on the staff of Lutheran Hospital for many years and was on the Selective Service Board during World War II.

Dr. Foerster was a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon honorary fraternity and a Fellow of the American College of Dentists. He was also the recipient of Washington University's Distinguished Faculty Award at the Founders Day Ceremony in 1959.

A teacher who inspired great respect and deep affection, he served his Alma Mater with devotion. And in appreciation for his long years of service to the teaching of fixed prosthodontics and for his generosity, the Junior-Senior Frank H. Foerster Laboratory was dedicated to him in 1962. By coincidence, the lab is now to be extensively enlarged this coming year.

Congratulations also to Dr. Kazanoglu on his recent election as an Associate Member of the American College of Prosthodontists Dr. Roger Adams, Assistant Professor of Oral Diagnosis and Radiology, is working with two medical colleagues from the Mallinckrodt Institute of Radiology, Drs. William A. Murphy and Louis A. Gilula, on the development of a large display on Magnification Radiography of the Temporomandibular Joint. The free. standing display, measuring 16 feet wide by 8 feet high, will be shown first at the meeting of the Radiography Society of North America in Chicago in late November and then will be sent on a one-year tour of medical and dental meetings by Pfizer, Inc. The display stems from a research study conducted by the three scientists on how the microfocus x-ray machine developed by Pfizer can be used for an unprecedented examination of the temporomandibular joint. They modified the x-ray machine for use with a positioning device for which they have applied for a patent. That positioning device also will be the subject of a paper to be presented at the RSNA meeting in Chicago. The big display will have eight panels on the principles microfocus magnification, the positioning of the patient, a film screen and dosimetry study (work was done on this with the 3-M Company to reduce the radiation dose to the patient), two panels on the radiographic anatomy of the TM joint, arthography and its application with the machine, and two panels of case reports.

Playing an important role in generating kphotographic materials for the display were Steve Amsden and Marcy Hartstein of the School's audiovisual department, Dr. Adams, Murphy, and Gilula have been invited by a California physician, Dr. Don Resnick, to contribute a chapter on TMJ radiography to his textbook on joint radiography, to be published in 1980 Dr. Samuel E. Guyer, Chairperson of of Fixed Department the Prosthodontics, will present two papers Second International at the Prosthodontic Congress to be held in Las Vegas on October 19-21. The first paper is titled "An Intra-Oral Occlusal Adjustment Technique for Complete Dentures" and the second essay will be on "Pontic Design." All the essayists at the Congress were required to submit papers for publication prior to the meeting. They will be published in the

Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry. On October 8-10, Dr. Guyer attended the annual meeting of the Federation of Prosthodontic Organizations in Chicago. Dr. Guyer was president in 1975 of the Federation, which is composed of 20 prosthodontic organizations.

A new scrap gold collection program enabling WU dental alumni to contribute their precious metal scrap for the benefit of the School of Dental Medicine will soon be established. Similar scrap gold programs in conjunction with Jelenko are being successfully used as alumni fundraising projects by the dental schools of Northwestern University, Columbia University, the University of Maryland at Baltimore, and Fairleigh-Dickinson University, among others.

Continuing Education

The rapid expansion and improvement of the Continuing Education program at the School of Dental Medicine, begun two years ago by Dean Selfridge, has resulted in a burgeoning schedule of 22 courses during the 1978-1979 academic year. Plans for Dental Explorer Post

Orientation for New Students

The Class of 1982-the new First Level class at 84 new dental students -arrived at the end of August for the annual period of orientation and registration. The new students are the cream of the crop-they were chosen with great care by the faculty and students of the Admissions Committee from a field of 3,300 applicants. The number of applicants represented a decline from the previous year's total of 3,700 in keeping with a national trend of a leveling-off of applications to professional schools. There still, however, was an awesome ratio of some 40 applicants for each available place in the entering class. This stiff competition guaranted that each successful applicant for the class would have impressively high qualifications for dentistry.

Geographically the new class again is dominated by Californians, with that state having 36 representatives. The rest of the geographical breakdown (this is based on the class as it stood August 23) showed 12 students from Missouri, nine from New York State, five each from Illinois and New Mexico, three from Arizona, two each from Hawaii, Washington, and Kansas, and one representative of Utah, Minnesota, Florida, Wisconsin, New Jersey, Nevada, Hong Kong, and India. Ten of the new students are women.

Several of the class members bear familiar names—they are the brothers or sisters of present students at the School or recent graduates. Lisa Schnaidt is the sister of Third Level student Laura Schnaidt, James Nativi is the brother of recent graduate, Dr. Paul Nativi, Bernard Ku is the brother of Dr. Irene Ku of the Class of 1978. Michael Favero and Paul Bozoian of the incoming class are the brothers of Paul Favero and Steve Bozoian of the second Level class. Ronald Parkin is the brother of Dr. Ralph Parkin, also of the Class of 1978. Another member of the class, Robert Lowe, has done some research in Microbiology at our School while a WU undergraduate.

Orientation activities began with an introductory meeting of the new class. The rest of the morning was devoted to registration, picture taking, and tours.

The next day the new students were welcomed by Dean Selfridge and heard talks by a number of School faculty members and staff members on various aspects of the School. Instructors of first term courses for the First Level were on hand to briefly describe their courses and what will be

That afternoon the First Level students reported to the Health Service for physical exams while their spouses returned to the School for a brief orientation meeting and tours. Orientation visits to the Library and LRC also were on the docket for the new students after their physicals. That evening, the Second Level class and the student wives' organization held a reception for the new class at Olin Hall.

The last activity was a Personal Awareness Inventory testing of the new class conducted by Mrs. Natalie Simmons. After that, the new students enjoyed the holiday weekend as they prepared for the start of classes on Tuesday, September 5.
