This second annual report of the 2021-2022 school year shows improvement and dedication to the safety and security of students and staff in the Commonwealth. Administrators, teachers and students have embraced the commitment needed to maintain a safe learning environment for all who work and learn in our school buildings.

The tragedy in Uvalde, Texas reminds us that all safety mandates must be followed to maintain the integrity of a layered security approach. The School Safety and Resiliency Act (19RS SB 1) provides a commonsense approach to building security, mental health advocacy, emergency planning, law enforcement engagement and staff training.

After tragedies like Uvalde, it is natural that legislators, parents, and the public ask what can be done to enhance school safety to better protect students and staff moving forward. The Commonwealth of Kentucky prioritizes school safety and has established a strong prevention plan that is working, as demonstrated in this report. While our compliance numbers are high, we must continue to work to fill the gap to 100% compliance. Our goal is always the safest learning environment for our children.

The Office of the State School Security Marshal (OSSSM) recommends that teachers and staff have a plan for critical incidents in schools, for districts to maintain emergency operations plans, and that teachers continue to secure classrooms, external doors, and front entrances. We also need to continue working together to assign a school resource officer to every campus in the state and fulfill the goal of one school-based mental health professional for every 250 students.

We look forward to continuing our partnerships with our educational heroes as we create a better Kentucky.

SAFETY & SECURITY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2022-23

- Continue work toward 100% compliance with School Safety and Resiliency Act mandates.
- Continue work toward the goal of one Mental Health Professional for every 250 students, as funds and personnel become available.
- Continue work toward assigning a fulltime, certified School Resource Officer to every campus where one (1) or more school buildings are used to deliver instruction to students on a continual basis.
- Foster a school climate where students and staff affirm the importance of controlling access to exterior doors, as well as closing and locking classroom doors during instructional time.
- All school staff who have contact with students complete the mandatory response to active shooter training and work together to maintain and update the best plan of action to protect students and staff.
- Ensure schools have the most up-to-date Emergency Operations Plan which includes consultation with first responders and procedures for reunification.
- Ensure all classroom doors with windows are equipped with blackout material to safely cover the windows during a building lockdown.
- Work toward training all front office staff
 to properly use security features such as
 the electronically locking door, camera and
 intercom systems. Staff should also be trained
 on the proper way to check-in a visitor, ensure
 proper ID is shown, and learn the reason for
 the visit.
