

Dance Resources





- Ailey All Access allows viewers to stay virtually connected to the company's
 performances. For a limited time, full length videos of their repertoire are
 available on the All Access page. Upcoming release dates of their ballets are
 listed.
 - Every Wednesday livestream conversations with company members are available on <u>Ailey's Instagram page</u>.
 - The Revelations workshop is a 13-minute video with company member, Hope Boykin. Viewers learn some of the ballet's iconic phrases while getting tips on how to execute the movement.
- Ailey Extension is a branch of Ailey that provides prerecorded and live classes.
 Live classes are available on the Instagram and YouTube pages of the respective teachers which are linked on the Extension page.
- Suitable for middle school students and older



- Free Livestream Classes on <u>Ballet Hispanico's Education Instagram</u>. The age range for these classes encompasses the school's curriculum. Schedule is available on Instagram and changes every day.
- As part of Ballet Hispanico's <u>Community Engagement efforts</u>, they have provided the NYC DOE's <u>Blueprint for Teaching and Learning in the Arts: Dance Grades K-12</u>. This is potentially very helpful information for teachers who are developing curriculums. This would have to be revised to better suit the virtual learning curve we are experiencing today.
- Appropriate for a variety of ages 3+

National Dance Institute

- National Dance Institute has committed to providing <u>virtual Live dance classes</u> through their social media platforms. Weekly schedules are posted and are subject to change. The classes are fun, relatively simple and on the shorter side of duration. These are parent friendly classes as well.
- Readily accessible for all ages

The New Victory Theater

- The New Victory Theater's Family Engagement programming has released a series of weekly themed activities, New Victory Arts Break, designed to be enjoyed at the comfort of the viewer's home.
- Just Move! Week is a great activity-based resource for parents or caretakers who
 are interested in moving with children ages 4-14. Daily themed activities are
 planned with different age groups in mind and explore cultural differences and
 technology. The activities are supplemented by videos of performances, texts and
 guiding questions to prompt conversations between children and adults.


- New York City Ballet has an ongoing <u>Podcast Series</u> of 20 episodes with the Artistic Director and guest commentators. These snippets of information are a great way to delve into the history of the company and ballet in the US.
- Short length videos are posted on the <u>NYCB Video Page</u> as a means to enrich the viewers understanding of what goes on in and outside the City Ballet company.
- The New York City Ballet <u>Repertory page</u> archives more than 400 ballets and provides snippets of videos and production history of the dances. This is great for research and planning.
- Best for an older audience and ballet fanatics




- Resource List is aimed at engaging and advocating the arts and culture sector. The Online Teaching, Learning and Gathering section (page 9) of this Google Doc is great for teachers who are figuring out how to develop a virtual curriculum.
 - Under the General Pedagogical Information, The Moving Dance-Based Pedagogy Online Part 1 & Part 2 are hour long videos that tackle how to teach dance virtually. While these videos seemed to be aimed at higher learning dance education, the ideas can be applied to enrichment and overall dance education.
 - Articles such as <u>Going Online in a Hurry: What to Do and Where to Start</u> give great insight into jumpstarting virtual teaching.
- Mark Morris also provides <u>Free Online Classes</u> on their <u>YouTube page</u>. These are broken up by age group (children/adult AND <u>movement classes for people living</u> <u>with Parkinson's</u>).
- Best for teachers and artists












Music Resources



 York's most famous venues. Each guide focuses on a different type of music –
 Rhythm and Blues, Latin Music, Classical Music, Blues, Jazz and Tap Dance.







Theater Resources




















Visual Arts Resources



The Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum offers a number of online resources, including digital tours and free downloadable resources for teachers. These resources could be great for middle school aged students.

- Materials for Educators filterable by themes, artists, mediums and class subjects.

- A map and pronunciation guide for each artist's name is also available through the Museum.
- Hilma af Klint: Paintings for the Future Materials
 - Figuration Activity
- Selections from the Permanent Collection Materials
 - <u>Create a One Act Play</u> Activity (written instead of performed, for remote learning purposes)
- <u>Digital tours</u> are offered for K-12 classes with a variety of focuses the Museum's collection, architecture, and global contemporary art. These cost a small fee but are adaptable to support specific curriculum areas.

The Museum of Modern Art offers a number of online resources, including videos on their YouTube channel, podcasts such as *A Piece of Work* (hosted by Abbi Jacobson) and their Magazine Podcast, "Museum From Home" Digital Magazine, and the MoMA Learning site.

- MoMA Learning provides slideshows, worksheets, and other resources for downloading and customizing – perfect for use in remote teaching.
 - When paired with the <u>MoMA's Online Collection</u>, students can do assignments while viewing the relevant works on the website.
 - o These resources could be great for middle school aged students.

Brooklyn Museum offers a robust collection of downloadable teacher resources. These resources could be great for middle school aged students.

- Downloadable Teacher Resources, categorized by time period and medium.
 - Many artists in the Museum's collection and exhibition history deals heavily with social-political content, making these resources perfect for engaging students in critical thinking and multi-disciplinary subject matters.

Studio Museum in Harlem offers a robust collection of downloadable lesson plans for teachers to access and utilize as they see fit.

- Downloadable Lesson Plans
 - For example, the *Turning Heads* (Derrick Adams) Lesson Plan can be done with basic and found materials, such as whatever writing utensils are on hand, and even cardboard cut out or torn from food packaging. This resource could be great for middle school aged students.
 - For example, the On My Street (Jordan Casteel) Lesson Plan can be done with basic drawing materials such as pencils – no markers necessary if students don't have them on hand. This resource could be great for elementary school aged students.











Visual Arts Resources















Eyeball It! Art 4 Kids is a free, unique series of studio art projects for elementary school-age children to do at home with a parent or other interested adult - including painting, drawing, sculpture, and collage. While some of these activities do require artmaking materials, some are drawing based, or could be adapted to use trash/nature/found materials.

- Projects are available for download, and there are instructional videos on the website accompanying each project.
 - o The website may require that each user fills out a brief form, but very little information is asked, and it is free.

The Noguchi Museum offers biographies written by audience age group, as well as downloadable curriculum guides for teachers. These resources could be great for elementary school aged students.

- Noguchi for Educators
 - Mining Art: Basalt, Granite, Marble was created for students in grades
 - The activity "Woman" could easily be adapted for remote learning, using torn paper or food packaging, and basic writing utensils.
