## KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



### Martina Jelley, MD, MSPH, FACP

Dr. Jelley is a Professor of Internal Medicine and the Julian Rothbaum Chair for Community Health Research at the OU School of Community Medicine in Tulsa where she also serves as Assistant Dean for Clinical Research. Dr. Jelley's interests include intimate partner violence and adverse childhood experiences, focusing on the adult health effects of these problems. Dr. Jelley is working with a multidisciplinary team, using simulation to help trainees in health programs improve skills in counseling adults with childhood trauma and practicing trauma-informed care. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the Academy on Violence and Abuse and is a co-founder of the Trauma-Informed Healthcare Education and Research Collaborative.



### Julie Miller-Cribbs, PhD, MSW

Dr. Miller-Cribbs is a Professor and Director of the Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work at OU. Her current research amplifies factors pertaining to vulnerability, strengths, and functioning in the arenas of diversity, health, and community life. She is particularly interested in health disparities and access to health care and improving social work education in the state of Oklahoma. Her publications have appeared in various journals, she has authored educational material utilized in textbooks and course outlines related to cultural diversity, and she is the author of three books. She has taught at both the MSW and doctoral level primarily in the areas of Social Welfare Policy, Health Policy, Advanced Social Work Practice and Research. She has received awards for her teaching and research, served as chair or member on 10 dissertation committees, mentored medical and nursing students, and multiple graduate research assistants.

## KEYNOTE SPEAKERS (CONT'D)



**Frances Wen, PhD**

Dr. Frances Wen, a clinical health psychologist, has worked in academic primary care for over 15 years. Her main research interests focus on the health effects in adulthood of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), and on training health care professionals to work with adults affected by ACEs. She has contributed to over a dozen grant-funded educational, research, and program projects. She is principal investigator of a NIH-funded qualitative community-based participatory research project examining psychosocial factors impacting older adults' access to and refusal of home- and community-based services. Dr. Wen is the Director of Research in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Oklahoma School of Community Medicine in Tulsa, OK. She also directs the behavioral health curriculum in the residency program in her department, within which trauma-informed care is a major thread.



**Kim Coon, Ed.D.**

Dr. Coon is a Professor and the Director of Psychotherapy Education in the Department of Psychiatry at the University Of Oklahoma School Of Community Medicine. She received her bachelor and masters degrees from the University of Oklahoma, and her doctorate from Oklahoma State University. She is a Diplomate of, and is certified as a cognitive therapist by, the Academy of Cognitive Therapy. Dr. Coon is a fellow in Rational Emotive Behavioral therapy granted from the Albert Ellis Institute, and has extensive training in cognitive behavioral therapy from Harvard Medical School Bipolar Research Program and The Beck Institute. Her research interests include trauma-informed education for providers and her focus for patient care is the treatment of anxiety and mood disorders.
